Proposals for Extension.

Arrangements have been completed which will anaugurate a forward step in regard to agricultural education in this State. Land adjacent to Urrbrae, Fullarton, is to be utilized for an agricultural high school.

This announcement was made by the Commissioner of Public Works (Hon. M. McIntosh) on Friday prior to his departure for Canberra. It was known that negotiations has been proceeding between the University, the Department of Agriculture, and the Education Department for the full utilization of the magnificent property held by the Education Department adjacent to the Waite Institute.

Some years ago, Mr. McIntosh said, 114 acres of land was handed over to the Education Department by the late Mr. Peter Waite for agricultural high school purposes, and this area was increased by the purchase of an adjoining 20 acres of prehard land. 


