The Minister explained on Thursday that the offer was the tentative one to which he referred in a statement on the previous day. Under it the Commonwealth would supply the radium for a temporary period on less onerous conditions than were attached to the original offer (which involved so large an expendithat the Government with unable to comply been them). It was hoped by the Government that during the period of the loan there would be such developments in the whole matter in Adelaide as to enable the scope of the use of the radium to be considerably extended.
