2. As you have already learnt, a dentist's mechanic resided in Pitcairn Island for a number of years; he has, however, recently left. There is undoubtedly much scope for dental work in the island as will be seen from the following quotation from a recently published medical report by Dr Duncan Cook, of New Zealand —

"The teeth are bad, few reaching the age of twenty without requiring either a complete or partial artificial set, and children suffer from caries at a comparatively early age. The soft tissues are healthy, few cases of pyorrhoea or sentic gums being seen.

Much has been written on the teeth of the islanders, but the almost universal loss of the front teeth in adolescence emphasises their unfortunate dental conditions which would be less conspicuous were early dental treatment available.

Mr. J.S. Nettl, in his general report, adds the following

remarks -

Mr Richard Roby, 1020, Broadway, Oakland, California, U.S.A. remarks -

"My medical colleague deals in his report with the interesting question of dental caries among the I have read carefully the old naval people. accounts on the island to trace when this loss of front teeth was first reported. The first reference I can find is in a report from Captain Dyke of H.M.S. "Comus" dated the 23rd November. Commander Knowling of H.M.S. 'Icarus', in his report of the 31st March, 1901, again mentions this defect. It is not unreasonable to infer that the loss of teeth was not common In previous generations. Little definite information on the matter is obtainable from the islanders themselves whom I have questioned. have had ample opportunity of observing the dietary habits of the people and the complete absence of oral hygiene. The diet is seriously deficient in fats; this, and the lack of a tooth brush, or a substitute therefor, is bound to affect the teeth of any people. Non-Pitcairners, resident for any period, who adopt the local diet are soon troubled with dental caries and a loss of teeth. This is an interesting fact in view of the theory advanced that the defect is due to inter-marriage."

- 3. It would not, however, be possible to obtain a money income from dentistry on Pitcairn as there are under 200 residents and there is very little money on the island. In 1937 the total income of the entire community, in money and kind, was estimated at approximately £1,800 to £2,000 (say about \$6,000) and this figure has been considerably reduced since the outbreak of war. Any dentist would probably have to take his fees largely in vegetables and other garden produce. The islanders are all members of the Seventh Day Adventist Church.

KING'S REGULATION

TO PROVIDE FOR THE DECLARATION OF CLOSED DISTRICTS IN THE PITCAIRN GROUP OF ISLANDS.

Made by His Britannic Majesty's High Commissioner for the Western Pacific under the provisions of the Pacific Order in

In the name of His Majesty George the Sixth by the Grace of God of Great Britain, Ireland and the British Dominions beyond the Seas King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor

- 1. This Regulation may be cited as the Closed Districts (Pitcairn SHORT TITLE. Group) Regulation 1938.
 - 2. In this Regulation:

INTERPRETATION

- "licence" means a licence granted under the provisions of this Regulation:
- "licensee" means a person holding a licence which has not expired or been revoked:
- "the Pitcairn Group" means the Islands of Pitcairn, Henderson, Ducie and Oeno and the rocks, reefs and shoals in the territorial waters thereof:
- "vessel" includes anything made or used for the conveyance by water of human beings or of property.
- 3. The High Commissioner may by proclamation declare the POWER TO Pitcairn Group or any part or parts thereof to be a closed district. DISTRICT.

LANDING IN CLOSED DISTRICT PROHIBITED.

- 4. No person shall land from any vessel or aircraft in a closed district except:—
 - (a) a person permanently residing in the closed district;
 - (b) a Government Officer or person acting under the orders of the High Commissioner in the course of his duty;
 - (c) a licensee;
 - (d) the holder of a permit issued under section eight hereof.

LICENCE TO LAND IN CLOSED DISTRICT. 5. The High Commissioner may grant or renew a licence to land in a closed district and may, if he thinks fit, prescribe the conditions upon which such licence is granted or renewed and may also, as a condition precedent to the grant or renewal of such licence, require the proposed licensee to furnish security either in cash or by bond for the observance of the prescribed conditions.

APPLICATION FOR LICENCE.

- 6. Unless the High Commissioner shall otherwise direct, an applicant for a licence shall submit with his application:—
 - (a) a certificate signed by a medical practitioner, qualified in manner approved by the High Commissioner, of freedom from communicable disease, for every person to whom the application relates;
 - (b) a reference as to character signed by two persons being either Justices of the Peace, ministers of religion, bankers, or qualified legal or medical practitioners to whom the applicant is personally known;
 - (c) a statement of the applicant's financial means;
 - (d) a statement of the applicant's reasons for desiring to land in the closed district and the period for which a licence is sought; and
 - (e) an undertaking to leave the closed district at the first available opportunity after the date of expiry of the licence, if granted.

REVOCATION OF LICENCE.

- 7.—(1) The High Commissioner may at any time revoke a licence by notice given to the licensee either in writing signed by or on behalf of the High Commissioner or by telegraphic or wireless message.
- (2) Such revocation shall take effect from the date of receipt of such notice by the licensee or from such later date as the High Commissioner may by such notice prescribe.

ISSUE BY
THE CHIEF
MAGISTRATE
OF PERMITS
TO LAND.

8. Subject to any orders given by the High Commissioner, the Chief Magistrate of Pitcairn Island, after satisfying himself that any vessel or aircraft is free from communicable disease, may issue to any of the officers, crew or passengers thereof a permit to land in the closed district and to remain therein for any period not exceeding twelve hours.

PENALTY FOR LANDING WITHOUT LICENCE OR PERMIT. **9.** Any person, not being a person excepted under section four hereof, who lands in a closed district, and any person who remains in a closed district after the expiry or revocation of his licence or permit shall be guilty of an offence; and in addition to any other action taken by the High Commissioner or any person serving under his orders in connection with such offence.

OFFENCE BY LICENSEE OR HOLDER OF PERMIT. 10. If a licensee or the holder of a permit commits a breach of any of the conditions upon which the licence or permit was granted or does any act calculated to disturb the peace of a closed district or to cause the inhabitants of such district to be disaffected towards in addition to any other penalty, shall be liable to forfeit any security furnished by him.

11. A person guilty of an offence under this Regulation shall CONVICTION AND be liable, on summary conviction thereof before the High Commissioner's Court, to pay a fine not exceeding one hundred pounds and the costs of the prosecution and, in default of payment, to suffer imprisonment, with or without hard labour, for any period not exceeding six months either in Fiji or in such place within the limits of the Pacific Order in Council 1893 as the High Commissioner shall direct.

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PITCAIRN GROUP.

Notice to Applicants for a Licence to land in any Island of the Pitcairn Group.

1. The Pitcairn Group includes the Islands of Pitcairn, Henderson, Oeno, and Ducie. Landing in any of the islands mentioned is prohibited by King's Regulation No. 3 of 1938, the Closed Districts (Pitcairn Group) Regulation 1938, except under Licence granted by the High Commissioner for the Western Pacific or under Permit issued by the Chief Magistrate of Pitcairn Island. The penalty for landing without a Licence or Permit is a fine not exceeding one hundred pounds and the costs of the prosecution and of any action by the Authorities in connection with such offence, and in default of payment imprisonment with or without hard labour for any period not exceeding six months.

2. Permits to land for any period not exceeding twelve hours may be issued by the Chief Magistrate of Pitcairn Island to the officers, crew, or passengers of any vessel, on his being satisfied that such vessel is free from communicable disease. The fee for such permits is 2s. 6d. each.

3. Licences to land in any island of the Pitcairn Group may be granted by the High Commissioner upon such conditions as he may prescribe. Such Licences are usually issued for a period of six months in the first instance, but may be renewed by the High Commissioner for further periods and subject to such conditions as he may prescribe. The fee for a Licence to land is one pound and for a Renewal of a Licence to Land ten shillings. The following are the conditions upon which Licences to Land are at present granted, but such conditions may be amended or added to by the High Commissioner at any time:—

This Licence is issued under Section 5 of the Closed Districts (Pitcairn Group) Regulation No. 3 of 1938 and subject to the provisions of that Regulation and to the conditions specified below which have been prescribed by the High Commissioner for the Western Pacific under Section 5 of the said Regulation, that is to say:—

CONDITION 1.

That the Licensee is in good health and free from all infectious and contagious disease and shall produce a certificate to that effect signed and dated by a duly qualified Medical Practitioner after a medical examination carried out not more than three days before the date of the embarkation of the said Licensee on the voyage to the island or group of islands to which this Licence relates. Such certificate shall be delivered to the Chief Magistrate of Pitcairn Island on the arrival of the Licensee at that island.

CONDITION 2.

That the Licensee shall possess and produce to the Chief Magistrate at Pitcairn Island a valid passport or other recognized and authentic travel document.

CONDITION 3.

That the Licensee shall furnish security in cash or by bond to the satisfaction of the High Commissioner in the sum of......pounds in the currency of......

for the proper observance of these conditions.

CONDITION 4.

That the Licensee shall pay a fee of one pound (£1) of an approved currency for the grant of this Licence and a fee of ten shillings (10s. 0d.) of an approved currency for each and every renewal of such Licence, and shall pay such fee to the High Commissioner or to the Chief Magistrate before landing in Pitcairn Island.

CONDITION 5.

That the Licensee shall be of good behaviour during his/her stay in the island or group of islands to which this Licence relates and shall at all times observe and obey all laws and regulations therein in force and refrain from offending the susceptibilities, religious or otherwise, of other residents therein.

CONDITION 6.

That the Licensee shall entirely support himself/herself during his/her stay in any island under the authority conferred by this Licence and shall not in any way become dependent for sustenance or support upon the community.

CONDITION 7.

That the Licensee shall, if at any time requested so to do by the Chief Magistrate of Pitcairn Island, leave the island or group of islands to which this Licence relates by the first available opportunity irrespective of whether the period of stay authorized by this Licence has or has not expired.

CONDITION 8.

That upon the expiration of the period covered by this Licence and any renewal thereof, or upon being notified of the revocation of this Licence, the Licensee shall by the first available opportunity thereafter leave the island or group of islands to which this Licence relates.

CONDITION 9.

That upon the departure of the Licensee from the Closed District this Licence shall cease and determine absolutely irrespective of whether the period for which such Licence was issued or renewed has or has not expired.

CONDITION 10, &c.

(Such other conditions as the High Commissioner may see fit to prescribe, whether generally or in any particular case.)

- 4. Section 10 of King's Regulation No. 3 of 1938 provides that if a Licensee or the holder of a permit commits a breach of any of the conditions upon which the licence or permit was granted or does any act calculated to disturb the peace of a closed district or to cause the inhabitants of such district to be disaffected towards His Majesty's Government, he shall be guilty of an offence and, in addition to any other penalty, shall be liable to forfeit any security furnished by him.
- 5. Applications for Licences to Land in any of the islands of the Pitcairn Group should be submitted in the annexed form. Omission to furnish any particular required will only result in delay caused by a reference back to the applicant, or the application may be refused on the ground
