Celebrating a 100 year Partnership

An exhibition celebrating the centenary of the official affiliation between Roseworthy Agricultural College and the University of Adelaide will be open to the public from August 9th at the Roseworthy Campus of the University of Adelaide.

In 1905, at the initiative of the then Principal, Professor Arthur James Perkins, Roseworthy College became affiliated with the University of Adelaide. For many years students in the Faculty of Agricultural Science spent their second years at the College and took selected Diploma lectures.

A change in 1944 saw the College giving special lectures for about one quarter of the University course. In 1956 a new course for the degree in Agricultural Science began in which work taken at Roseworthy College comprises one day a week in Third Year and, in Fourth Year, 1½ days per week for students taking Animal Husbandry II.

Students in Agricultural Science were required to have certain experience in farm work, some of which could be undertaken at Roseworthy College. Men holding the R.D.A. could pass through the degree course in three years.

Matriculation.—Men who held the R.D.A. with honours could thereby matriculate at the University of Sydney in the faculties of Agriculture and Veterinary Science. At the University of Adelaide, the Diploma with honours did not guarantee matriculation but could be regarded as ensuring special consideration by the Matriculation Board for the applicant concerned.

The exhibition features photographs, correspondence, diaries, record books and other memorabilia from 100 years of events and activities at the College and has been assembled from the University Archives.

It will be on display at the Roseworthy Information Centre from 8.45am to 5.00pm Monday to Friday until September 30.

It will then be moved to the National Wine Centre in mid-November, in the lead-up to the actual centenary on December 5th 2005.

This issue of the Digest is again filled with the

current activities of ROCA. The Committee has received gratifying comments about recent issues. Our interaction with Roseworthy and University officials continues at a high and productive level. The recent constitu-



tional changes of the Alumni Association (see Page 7) enables ROCA to continue working for mutual benefit while better allowing us to continue with our own activities.

December 7th 2005 marks the centenary of affiliation between Roseworthy Agricultural College and The University of Adelaide. On that date in 1905 a formal arrangement was put in place for the university to recognise the academic achievements of Roseworthy graduates and for Roseworthy to teach students enrolled in university agricultural science courses, the latter arrangement continuing until the 1960's. This occasion is being celebrated by a display set up by the University Archives. It was launched in the Barr-Smith Library in May, is now at the Information Centre on Roseworthy campus, and will be featured at the Australian Wine Centre in December.

We are most concerned about the costs of production and distribution of the Digest. Members will be aware that their \$60 life time membership fee is now rapidly eroded in meeting operational costs. While there is no crisis, your Committee is assessing future funding so that the way ahead is sound.

The Committee is reluctant to change the existing fee structure. The response to members' voluntary contributions to supplement ROCA costs launched in 2003 has been very good. Further contributions will be welcomed.

As a result of an in depth membership analysis (see Page 5), we note that recent graduates are down in our numbers. We are undertaking a strategic plan to recruit new members over the next 5 years.

Member support and encouragement in recruitment is welcomed.

In the coming months we plan to list these members on the website in the hope that they can be located.


1958 GRADUATES

ROCA MEMBERSHIP - What of the future?

Selected extract from ROCA Constitution

5.2.1 Ordinary Life Member

Subject to the approval of the Committee of the Association and upon payment of all prescribed fees the following persons may become Life Members:

5.2.1.1 Students who have received tuition at the Campus for the equivalent of one academic year;


5.2.1.3 Agricultural Science Graduates and Non-Graduates of the Adelaide University prior to 1956;

Until 1989 it was a straightforward matter to satisfy Clause 5.2.1.1., as every graduate had spent at least one academic year at the College. Even those who did not graduate usually were covered by the clause. However, since 1990 a couple of issues have made it more difficult to identify those who satisfy Clause 5.2.1.1.

Many of the courses are no longer tied to a particular campus, so that graduates are not classified by the University in any way that lines up with Clause 5.2.1.1.

In addition, prior to 1990 there was one graduation ceremony, held at Roseworthy, which all graduates attended. Now, there can be up to four ceremonies in any one year.

The following chart shows the numbers of graduates recruited from each graduating year with their esti-



mated ages at the present. The spike of 195 is the 1991 graduate group who are now about 36 years old. Your Management Committee is addressing this matter, and has appointed a sub-committee to conduct appropriate research. This group, headed by Peter Day, has come up with a Five Year Plan to address the matter.


This was considered at an extraordinary meeting of the Management Committee held on Monday 8th August.

While this is a complicated matter requiring continued attention, the Committee has decided to take immediate steps in attempts to broaden the scope toward the expansion of ROCA membership.


These include:-

- targeting graduating classes through direct contact, attendance at dinners and in mail outs.
- focussing on 10 and 25 year graduates, and
- accessing graduate networks

- ROCA provides worthwhile incentives for becoming a member.



AN END TO MULESING?

Readers who saw the 21/8/05 edition of LandLine on ABC Television will, no doubt, have opinions about the US-based group "People for the Ethical Treatment



of Animals" [PETA], and their campaign against the Australian wool industry. This debate will not be canvassed here, except to report that Ian McLachlan of Australian Wool Innovation stated that the Australian wool industry has an absolute will to get rid of

mulesing [as currently practised] by 2010, and before, if possible. At the same time he reaffirmed that AWI would proceed with legal action against PETA, despite the decision by the minority group, Australian Wool Growers, to do a deal with PETA.

However, two matters arose from that program that deserve reporting in such a publication as this. Both of these issues relate to the possibility of dispensing with the traditional Mules operation.

The first concerns information from Neil Smith on Calcookara Station, Eyre Peninsula. Three years ago Neil and his wife Pat noticed a couple of rams with absence of wool in the breech. So naturally, they were named Kojak and Garrett, the "bare-bottom" boys. Kojak's bare area extends right down inside the leg and up to the anal area, with the scrotum being completely bald. Garrett has a little more wool in the breech, but it is easily pulled out.

Professor Phil Hynd, Director of Roseworthy Campus, is almost certain this is an inherited characteristic.

which means that mating bare-breeched rams with

bare-breeched ewes should produce bare-breeched offspring. "Unfortunately a genetic alternative to mulesing will take time - years, maybe even decades to flow through the entire Australian flock," Professor Hynd said.



In the meantime, however, he has another promising project on the go, which it's

hoped, will provide a solution much sooner. "It's based on a discovery that came out of pure science in our laboratory," said Professor Hynd. "We found a protein which seems to have the same effect as mulesing. It causes the skin to contract and to enlarge the bare area around the breech, which is what we need."

The protein is called **collagenase**. It is a naturally occurring enzyme, but the injection of large doses into the skin breaks down the collagen in the skin, forming scar tissue and contracting the region.

Professor Hynd was then asked whether he really believed he had discovered an alternative to mulesing.

"Yes, we have," he said,
"but it's still in the research phase. We need a
simple applicator. We
need to prove that it
works in all conditions,
in all sheep types and in
different environments.
It's a big ask, and that's
why mulesing hasn't
been replaced yet."



There are at least four applicators being produced by manufacturers, and field trials are expected to begin in October. While some of the factors getting this process to market are completely out of Phil Hynd's hands, he is really feeling the pressure to make it work.

OTHER CAMPUS NEWS New Farm Manager



Tracking Roseworthy Graduates by Denys Slee

I knew my father went to Roseworthy but wasn't sure of the year he graduated.

So what to do? Perhaps ring around and see if any family members could help or alternatively, go to the college (now university campus) and look on the boards in the dining room.

Neither of these was necessary as the query was solved with one phone call to University of Adelaide Reference Archivist, Helen Bruce, who told me that Clem Slee graduated in 1939 with an RDA.

It is this type of query that Helen

is handling since the first complete list of graduates was finalised earlier this year - a list containing the names of more than 4,000 graduates from 1886 to 2003.

Former ROCA president, Wilf Bowen, Sue Coppin from the University Archives and ROCA Digest Editor, Ron Tuckwell, were the driving forces behind this major work which will be a very useful record for ROCA and the University. And information on it is

also in demand from individuals.

"Most of the people seeking information are involved in family history searches," Helen said. "I have had queries for information as far back as 1907."

Helen said that not only was information available about those who have graduated but also who enrolled but left for one reason or another before graduation. This latter data is held in student enrolment records at the university.

"Then there has been a request for the complete list of graduates," Helen said.

"This isn't available yet as some of the data is being fine-tuned but once we are satisfied that it is correct as possible, consideration will be given to putting it on the University's Website. There won't be any privacy considerations as the names of graduates and the year they graduated is a matter of public record anyway."

IDENTIFYING THE UNKNOWN

The photo shown here is one of hundreds being added to the archives at the University of Adelaide – all the photos having some connection to Roseworthy College.

The work is being done by a team of ex-graduates who meet on Tuesday's at the University's North Terrace campus. In this labor of love they have had to use many and varied techniques to have people and places shown in the photos identified.

One of these is to copy a photo and send it to a person who is recognised and ask that person to identify the "unknowns". This was the case with the photo accompanying this article where mid-1960s students Nick Brooks and Vic Patrick were identified at an RAC sports

day but not so a runner in one of the events. A copy of the photo was sent to Nick who, while helping with the identification process, revealed that he had some memorabilia which might be useful for the archives.

Nick also said that PIRSA in Mt Gambier was holding a box of Roseworthy-linked material which is thought to be associated with the operations of the former southeast sub-branch of ROCA.

Nick has offered to collect the material when he is next in the south-east and bring it to the University for classification.
