Thank you for your letter of 22nd July. I submit the following names for consideration. They are all missionaries of the Methodist Church and in explanation attention perhaps should be drawn to the fact that from 1855 the New South Wales Conference was in charge of missionary work in Tonga. The Vice-Consuls and later the British Agents and Consuls were recruited from either the Western Pacific High Commission Service or the Fiji Service and were not Australian.

Moulton, James Egan, b. 4 Jan., 1841 at North Shields. 1863-5 first headmaster of Newington College. 1865 went to Tonga, Principal of Tubou College. President of N.S.W. Conference 1893 and of Newington College. 1895 Chariman of the Tonga District. Retd. to Lindfield 1906, d. 9th May, 1909.

Baker, Shirley Waldemar, b. 1835 at Brimscombe near Stroud, Gloucestershire. Emigrated to Australia about 1863 where he studied pharmacy and also for the Wesleyan Ministry. In 1860 he was sent as a missionary to Tonga. Prime Minister 1880, deported in 1890 by order of the High Commissioner. Retired to N.Z. Returned to Tonga 1900, d. Ha'apai in 1903.

Note: The quarrel between Baker and Moulton over their respective churches has its repercussions today.

Watkin, Jabez B. b. at Eifuka, Ha'apai. Entered the Methodist Ministry in 1863 and spent three years in Queensland, appt. to the Tongan mission in 1866. President of the Free Church of Tonga. d. ?

Rev. Rodger Page and E.E.V. Collocott would be worthy of inclusion if they are dead. Page was for a long time the power behind the throne until he retired and Collocott's anthropological writings are of some value but I have been unable to ascertain from here whether they are yet dead.

I have included Baker, but I am afraid I should not have connected him myself with Australia, but both Moulton and Baker are included in the Australian Encyclopedia, Moulton I think with more justification. Baker's connections were much more with New Zealand than with Australia if one excepts his bitter controversies with the N.S.W. Conference.

Rev. A.H. Wood who was principal of Tubou College, Tonga from 1924-37 if he is dead might be worthy of a mention for his contribution to education. Watkin, I admit is very dubious.

I hope this arrives in time for your meeting.

Herewith the cards covering individuals in:-

- (a) Eastern Polynesia (Tahiti and other Society Islands, Marquesas, Tuamotus, and Pitcairn);
- (b) Micronesia (Mariannas, Pelews, Bonins, Carolines, Marshalls, and Gilberts); and
- (c) the Central Pacific (Ellice, Tokelaus, Phoenix, and Line Groups);

who have:-

- (a) spent 5 years or more of their life in Australia;
- (b) made, in my submission, sufficient contribution to the history of the Pacific Islands to warrant inclusion in any Biography of Island Notabilities; and have
- (c) enough documentary material extant relating to them to enable a short biography to be prepared.

You will observe that a number of cards contain incomplete entries. This is due to the absence of any records at Canberra from which even the briefest biographical data may be compiled.

I have been unable to collect any particulars at all concerning the following persons, whom I suggest should be included when someone can be detailed to get them:-

- ③ (i) Crook, William Pascoe (the missionary, whose visits may not in fact add up to the necessary five years);
- ③ (ii) Folger, Michael, the 'unprincipled scoundrel' of the Daphne;
- ③ (iii) Murray, Dr, of Carl notoriety;
- ④ (iv) Walker, Theodore, who hung the Tahitian from the yardarm; and
- ④ (v) Smith, Capt. John, who financed early trading to the Gilberts.

The same remarks apply to the following eight, who engaged in island trade but seldom, if ever, visited the islands themselves:-

- (2) (i) Birnie, James;
- (4) (ii) Eagar, (?);
- (iii) Kable, (?);
- (iv) Lord, Simeon.
- (1) (v) Reibey, Mary;
- (vi) Reibey, Thomas; and
- (vii) Underwood, Joseph.

I feel, however, that biographies of these people should essentially be written by Australian historians, as their island trade usually formed only a small part of their business activities.

I hope to give you cards on:-

- (i) Buffett, John; and
- (ii) Nobbs, G.H.;

at the meeting.

If you glance at the cards you will, I think, appreciate my view that the best thing to do with any biographies which may be prepared would be to keep them for eventual inclusion in the Dictionary.

For there is nothing to link this heterogeneous collection; they are too few to be of use to the island historian (just an odd one or two, compared with the hundreds of figures who had no link with Australia) and for the most part they have no significance in Australian history (Joseph Bach, sent to a seminary here to recover from a nervous breakdown, possibly never even spoke to an Australian; and Stewart was only a clerk in a wine merchant's shop for a few years before he escaped his creditors by leaving the country).

I hope that I have done all that was expected of me (as far as can be done without visiting Sydney, where the records are).

DICTIONARY OF BIOGRAPHY

Professor Douglas Pike, head of the Department of History in the University of Tasmania, has been appointed General Editor of the Australian Dictionary of Biography.

This Dictionary is being prepared under the auspices of the Australian National University, with the co-operation of State universities, historical societies, and individual workers. One of its facets, now in progress, is the compilation in typescript of a Biographical Register, which will refer to persons of lesser importance than those mentioned in the Dictionary and which will be available for consultation by research workers.

Members of the Society are invited to help this project by supplying information of a biographical character from their own researches, particularly regarding persons whose careers may not be widely known. What is wanted at present is material, not articles.

The National Committee of the Dictionary is also anxious to establish a registry of Australian portraits, and therefore wishes to learn of the whereabouts of any historical portraits of interest.

Members who can help in this project are invited to write to the Secretary, Australian Dictionary of Biography, Department of History, Australian National University, P.O. Box 4, Canberra.

To facilitate collection of material, the A.D.B. has been divided into periods covering 1788-1825, 1826-1850, 1851-1890, etc. and work has now progressed to the point where the names of inclusions for Periods I and II can be circulated for information.

This guide and the attached sample articles are offered to help authors and to simplify the work of editing. By following them much time and expense will be saved.

Biographies should be fresh and independent both in information and critical assessment. As the Dictionary will be used for reference, readers will expect to find the familiar fact and quotation, but where the figure has been controversial, they will also look for some account of the main viewpoints,

FORM:

Where possible, articles should be submitted in duplicate, on quarto paper, with double spacing and margins on both sides.

CONTENT OF BIOGRAPHIES:

Full name; years of life in parenthesis; occupational description; birth (place, giving town and State, or country; date only if either month or day is known); parentage (including mother's maiden name), with a brief comment if either parent had some historical importance; education; chronological sketch of career, distinctions gained; assessment of work and personal character; family details including marriage (parentage of wife and her place of origin), and children (with a short account if either spouse or child deserves historical comment); death (place and date); religious denomination; publications; portraits and their location; select bibliography.

COMPOSITION:

Where necessary, consult F. Howard Collins, Authors and Printers Dictionary 10th ed. (Lond., 1956).

DATES:

The month, fully spelt out, should always precede the year and the day, where used, should always precede the month.

(e.g. March 1880; 15 July 1886.)

NUMBERS:

Numbers up to one hundred should be spelt out; any larger numbers should be given in figures.

(e.g. eighty-seven; 1,750.)

Avoid sentences beginning with a number in figures.

BIBLIOGRAPHY(a) INCLUSIONS:

The principal secondary sources and manuscripts should be included, together with major references in all previous biographical dictionaries and collected documents, but not those in general histories. Private information or personal knowledge should be cited when appropriate.

(b) FORM:

Books and articles should be cited in the following way:

JEFFCOTT, SIR JOHN WILLIAM (1796-1837), judge, was born in 1796, the eldest son of William Jeffcott, merchant, of Tralee, County Kerry, Ireland, and his wife Harriet Jane Hoare. He was educated by private tutor and at Trinity College, Dublin (B.A. 1821; M.A. 1825). Called to the English Bar at the Inner Temple on 10 February 1826, he applied for a legal post in the colonies and on 20 February 1830 was appointed Chief Justice of Sierra Leone and the Gambia. He carried out the duties of Chief Justice for two years; and in April 1832 returned to England on leave of absence, which was extended from time to time on medical grounds. In April 1833 he agreed, though in ill health, to return to Sierra Leone for a short period. On 1 May 1833 he was knighted, and was about to embark to return to Africa when in a duel at Exeter on 11 May 1833 he shot and mortally wounded Dr Peter Hennis, a young physician of that town. After the duel Jeffcott embarked and sailed for Africa before he could be apprehended. He was seriously ill when he reached the Gambia, and, upon medical advice, proceeded to a neighbouring French settlement, and thence to France, without resuming his judicial duties. The seconds in the duel were tried for murder at Exeter in July 1833 and were acquitted. A warrant had been issued for Jeffcott's arrest on a charge of murder. No one wished, however, to press the charge against him and it was arranged that if he returned to England and stood his trial for murder, no evidence would be tendered against him. He surrendered at Exeter Assizes in March 1834, was arraigned upon the charge of murder, and no evidence being tendered, was acquitted. He had been removed from his position as Chief Justice, and from 1834 to 1836 was unemployed.

In May 1836 he was appointed Judge of the colony about to be founded at Spencer's Gulf. On his way to the colony, he spent several months as the guest of his kinsman William Kermode, at Mona Vale in Van Diemen's Land, and became engaged to be married to Kermode's daughter Anne. Reaching South Australia on 21 April 1837, he held the first criminal sessions in the colony on 13 May 1837. Having in the meantime lost all his belongings through the wreck of the ship in which they were being sent to South Australia, he returned to Van Diemen's Land for some months. He came back to South Australia in October 1837 and set up the Supreme Court of the colony. He supported Governor Hindmarsh in his quarrels with Government officials, but, dismayed at 'dreadful dissensions' in

the colony, sought to obtain a judicial post elsewhere. Having obtained leave to proceed to Hobart to consult with the Judges there upon legal difficulties which had arisen in South Australia, he was, on 12 December 1837, accidentally drowned while on his way to Van Diemen's Land, by the upsetting of a whaleboat which was being taken through the mouth of the River Murray. His body was never found. In all, Jeffcott spent only a few months in South Australia, and could not leave any great mark upon the history of the colony. He was an able lawyer, whose promising judicial career was ruined by the fatal duel; and his principal claim to distinction, perhaps, is that of being (it would appear) the only British judge who has ever stood in the dock charged with murder.

WOLLASTON, JOHN RAMSDEN (1791-1856), first archdeacon of Western Australia, was born in London on 28 March 1791. He received his education at Charterhouse, where his father, Edward Wollaston, was a master, and his maternal grandfather headmaster. Proceeding to Christ's College, Cambridge, Wollaston became a Master of Arts of that university and took holy orders. In May 1819 he married Mary Amelia, youngest daughter of Colonel Gledstanes, by whom he had five sons and two daughters. Finding his cure of West Wickham, Cambridgeshire, insufficiently well provided for his growing family, Wollaston applied in 1840 for the position of chaplain to the Western Australian Land Company's proposed settlement at Australind on Port Leschenault. While the Company let it be known in its advance publicity that Wollaston's services would be available to the settlement, they gave him no appointment, and it was eventually the Home Government that assured Wollaston of an official stipend if he went to Western Australia.

Wollaston arrived at Fremantle on 19 April 1841, unpropitiously at a time of considerable financial stringency. Governor Hutt (q.v.) had adopted a policy of declining to subsidise ministers of religion of any denomination; even for the Church of England an exception was made only for the Colonial Chaplain, J. B. Wittenoom (q.v.). In these circumstances, not merely was the Church as a whole languishing for want of finance and buildings, but Wollaston himself was informed that he would

receive no stipend until he had a church of his own. Wollaston responded by purchasing land at Picton, between Australind and Bunbury, and planning the construction of a church on this site. Consecrated on 18 September 1842, Wollaston's church stands to this day, the second oldest in Western Australia. A small wooden building with a thatched roof (later replaced by shingles), the church was designed by Wollaston and very largely built by himself and his sons.

Such enterprise was remarkable in a newly arrived clergyman, no longer young, and not by temperament readily adaptable to the change from English village life to a pioneering society. It contrasted with the apathy and neglect which had tended to characterize the Anglican community under Wittenoom's well-meaning but unenterprising guidance. Stimulated by the activity of Roman Catholics and Nonconformists, Wollaston soon took the initiative in revivifying the organization of the colony's Church of England. On 1 February 1842 he convened a conference of the colony's five clergy at Perth, at which the Church's problems were assessed and a statement drawn up urging Bishop Broughton of Sydney to visit Western Australia and set matters in order. The sequel was discouraging; Broughton could not come, and Wittenoom failed to respond to Wollaston's suggestion that clergy conferences should become an annual event. Moreover, Wollaston's congregation was declining after the failure of the Australind scheme. But his continued labours as a parish priest earned him the name of a 'worthy, laborious, energetic, excellent missionary'.

Wollaston's opportunity came in 1848. A new and more sympathetic governor, Fitzgerald (q.v.), transferred him to the parish of St John's, Albany, and in the same year the colony was visited by Bishop Short (q.v.) and Archdeacon Hale (q.v.) of the new diocese of Adelaide. Impressed by Wollaston's qualities, Short appointed him archdeacon of Western Australia early in 1849, an office which he discharged ably and zealously until his death in 1856. During these years Wollaston, despite increasing age, covered many hundreds of miles on horseback in the course of duties which included five visitations throughout the settled areas of the colony. Growth in population and the transportation of convicts from 1850 increased the Church's responsibilities, especially as the Anglican clergy had to serve many Protestants without ministers of their own. Through his own efficiency and the good relations developed with the Government, Wollaston

successfully met this situation. During his time the number of Anglican clergy increased from five to ten, and the regularity of services in the colony's major centres was improved greatly. He established the first Anglican mission to Western Australian aborigines at Albany in 1851. The temporal affairs of the Church were regulated by the passing in 1853 of an Act drafted by Wollaston, providing for the management of each church by trustees elected by the parishioners, and assuring each incumbent of a dwelling place, garden and glebe.

Wollaston was not personally ambitious, and would willingly have resigned in favour of an archdeacon based on Perth, but his ultimate aim was the establishment of a bishopric in Western Australia. Soon after his arrival in the colony he encouraged a movement among settlers to set aside gifts of land for the endowment of a see. The scheme had little success until it came under his oversight as archdeacon; by 1856, 1,300 acres had been subscribed. Meanwhile, in 1854 arrangements were begun for founding a diocese at Perth, with Archdeacon Hale as first bishop. But before the necessary formalities were completed, Wollaston had died at Albany, on 3 May 1856, shortly after returning from his fifth pastoral visitation.

Diffident, pessimistic, at times inclined to be censorious of his colleagues' shortcomings, Wollaston yet proved outstandingly effective in strengthening the framework of the infant Church in Western Australia. His recently published journals reveal not merely an observant commentator on colonial manners and character, but a man whose qualities of humility, common sense and devoted perseverance enabled him to give purpose and order to a very isolated branch of the Anglican communion. The Church of England in Western Australia has recently commemorated his name in a theological college.

Dear Mr Nairn,

I have been carefully through the article on George Lewis Becke but find it so imperfect that I can only advise that it should be re-written.

I am a bit surprised that anyone purporting to be an expert on Becke should write an article on him without apparently bothering to read:-

- (1) Michener, James A. and A. Grove Day, Rascals in Paradise. London, Secker and Warburg, 1957.
- (2) Day, A. Grove, Louis Becke. New York, Twayne Publishers, Inc., [1966].
- (3) Ingram, Margaret A., "Louis Becke, a Study". M.A. thesis. University of Hawaii, 1937.
- (4) Trapp, Phyllis B., "Some Account of the Writings of Louis Becke". Jacob Joseph Scholarship thesis, Wellington, N.Z., 1931.

These are surely ~~ther~~four main authorities on Becke, and especially of course (2), which is now available in an Australian edition. If the writer had not wanted to go to the trouble of borrowing these works on inter-library loan, she could easily have asked for the loan of copies from my own library.

I know you would not expect me to correct every apparent mis-statement in the draft submitted by Mrs McClements. The following, however, seem to me to be among the more obvious points requiring revision:-

- (1) Para. 2 - "his mother...whose father may have been one of the famous Beilby glass enamelling family": his maternal grandfather was apparently "Charles Beilby, well-known Sydney merchant in the 1830's"...
- (2) Para. 4 - why not state that the Earl of Pembroke's introduction, though based on material supplied by Becke, is largely fiction: see my article in the Pacific Islands Monthly XXVII(3):87.
- (3) Para. 5 - "They arrived in San Francisco 130 gruelling days later": the Lizzie and Rosa took 84 days and the voyage was uneventful.
- (4) Para. 5 (last sentence) - he could not have done much trading if he was back in Sydney 19 months later.
- (5) Para. 6 (first three sentences) - this appears an inverted and rather vague account of a well-attested episode in Becke's career.
- (6) Para. 9 - why say "there is evidence that he married a native girl in 1881" when the fact of his marriage is attested and the girl's name known.

I feel, however, that the article suffers from what is left out as much as from its errors: for example his period as a trader in the Ellice Islands; his shipwreck on the Orwell at Beru; and his later employment (see my review in the Journal of Pacific History II:226). Furthermore it does not seem to give a very clear-cut picture of Becke's life.

I understand that the policy of the Dictionary is to have each of its articles written by the world's leading authority on the person concerned; if this is so I wonder why this article is not being written by Professor Grove Day rather than Mrs McClements, whom I have never heard of in connection with Becke though I have been a student of the writings by and on him for at least the past thirty years.
