With the impending departure of Francis I feel that, since New Guinea is an area of special research interest for the School, this Department should if possible include a New Guinea specialist on the staff. At the same time I submit that we can probably only afford one and that he should essentially be a historian; any special interest in current affairs should be based on a thorough knowledge of New Guinea history in all its aspects.

From a review of Paul's writings it does not seem to me that he exhibits that historical base, outlook and interest which should be a sine qua non for permanent appointment to this Department of History (involving in his case, I suppose, a possible 30 years of further work with the A.N.U.).

I suggest that Paul's interests and methodology are primarily those of a political scientist and that he would appear better suited for a position in the Department of International Relations, where his letter indicates they have a particular interest in what he is doing.



Dear Mr Fisk,

You will recollect that last year I asked to be permitted to retire from the Publications Committee on the grounds that my lack of expertise on academic affairs made it difficult for me to contribute effectively to the general work while my specialized knowledge of publishing, mainly connected with government publications and the productions of the South Pacific Literature Bureau, merely duplicated that possessed to a greater degree by Professor J.W. Davidson.

It was considered at the time, however, that it would be preferable if I remained for the time being on the Committee as Editor of the Pacific History series, but that I need not necessarily attend meetings unless some matter concerning these publications was on the agenda.

The first and second volumes of the Pacific History series are now in process of completion, work on two more has been commenced, and negotiations are under way with the author of a possible fifth. On reflection, however, I suggest that my being on the Committee might well prove a handicap rather than an advantage in any discussion on the merits of these works, and that in any case should my presence be required at any time I can always be requested to attend as an ad hoc adviser.

~~This being~~ so I feel that I am, by unnecessarily remaining a member of the Committee, adding to its undue weighting in the field of historical studies, ~~as against disciplines "of a more theoretical and discursive sort",~~

as mentioned by Professor P.H. Partridge in his letter to you of the 7th August, and thus preventing the appointment of one of the representatives of other disciplines recommended by the Heads of Schools.

I should therefore, though with regret, like to tender my resignation from the Publications Committee.

COPY OF LETTER DATED 7 AUGUST 1964 FROM PROFESSOR P.H. PARTRIDGE
TO CHAIRMAN, PUBLICATIONS COMMITTEE

Thank you for your letter of August 6, concerning membership of the Publications Committee. Looking through the names of the present ten members of the Committee, it appears to me that the Committee is very heavily weighted on the side of historical studies, including Economic History; no fewer than four of the ten members have this background and interest. While agreeing that members ought not to be appointed to the Committee as representatives of particular Schools, it appears to me that there may be a case for holding that the different types of intellectual interest ought to be represented; problems of publication tend to be somewhat different in different disciplines. For this reason, I think it is perhaps a pity that there is no one at present on the Committee concerned with subjects (and therefore with publications) of a more theoretical and discursive sort; and also that disciplines which normally are not concerned with matters of an exclusively or predominantly Australian interest are poorly represented. I have in mind disciplines such as philosophy, economics of the more general and theoretical kind, political theory, social theory, political science, the history of ideas, and so on. It is probably true that members of the University whose work lies in these areas have not often been clients of the Committee; for several reasons, they have usually sought to make independent arrangements with commercial publishers or have preferred to publish outside Australia.

However, I can see at least two reasons why it might be useful to have some representatives of disciplines of this type on the Committee. Firstly, I think it would be a welcome departure if more works in the fields I have mentioned were to be sponsored by the Publications Committee; and secondly, I am inclined to think that it would be an advantage for the Committee sometimes to have the views of this kind of scholar on matters of general publication policy, and also occasionally in discussions as to whether the Committee should lend its assistance to the publication of a particular book or thesis.

Looking at the members of my own School from this point of view, the names of Professor Passmore, Mr Benn, Dr Kamenka, Mr Burns and Dr Rigby are among those that immediately occur to me; I can think of names of similar people in the School of General Studies. So far as your point concerning a lawyer-member is concerned, the obvious thing would be to bring Professor Sawyer back on to the Committee if he is agreeable. He has the legal competence you need; and he also has the very great merit, from my point of view, of speaking for a kind of interest within the social sciences which is at present very sparsely represented on the Committee.

The Department of Pacific History proposes to provide adequate outlets for the results of current and future research by :-

- (i) the issue of The Journal of Pacific History; and
- (ii) a related "Pacific History Series" of book-length studies;

and at the same time to establish a centre for the location and cataloguing of manuscript source material.

As Secretary-Assistant to the Editor of the Journal the person appointed will be required to deal with letters connected with subscriptions, and other correspondence of a routine character; sending out prospectuses; replies to enquirers; acknowledging subscriptions; preparing and forwarding reminders of subscriptions overdue; sale of back numbers and offprints; soliciting of advertisers; maintenance of subscribers' cards (names, addresses and financial state); maintenance of proper books of account; banking of payments and issue of receipts; operation of bank account; preparation of cheques for payments due; preparation of tax schedules; as well as with the checking and preparation of manuscripts for publication, proof reading and forwarding of proofs.

The Assistant will also be expected to help the Editor in his work of keeping in touch with Consultants, Correspondents and Committee; soliciting contributions and importuning authors to meet publication dates; preparing news and other features; searching for, copying and annotating key archival material for publication; forwarding works for review and reminders to the reviewers; preparing the proposed survey of periodical literature; preparing advertising copy and inserting advertisements; and conducting the more important business letters with publishers, advertisers, etc.

As Editorial Assistant for the Pacific History Series the principal duties of the person appointed will be to prepare manuscripts generally for submission to the Publications Committee or commercial publishers, including where necessary the preparation and checking of footnotes, references, illustrations, maps, bibliography and index; and to conduct any necessary documentary research in connection with the above work.

As Compiler of the Manuscript Catalogue, the successful applicant will assist in conducting correspondence on the location of manuscript material relating to Pacific History throughout the world; to record the information in proper bibliographic form on author and subject cards, and to prepare bibliographic lists for publication and for forwarding to enquirers.

The above duties will be performed under the ultimate direction of the Head of the Department, Professor Davidson, and in immediate collaboration with Mr H.E. Maude as Joint Editor of the Journal and General Editor of the Pacific History Series.

ANNUAL REPORT

A. Activities during 1963

(1) H.E. Maude

Previous research, concentrated on the pre-contact and early contact history of the Central and Eastern Pacific, was extended to include the whole Pacific area, with special emphasis on early trade. During the latter part of the year work was concentrated on a detailed study of the first European contact group, the beachcombers.

(2) Noel Rutherford

Worked on the location and examination of source material in Australia relating to Shirley Baker, Premier of the Kingdom of Tonga. This was followed in November and December by documentary research in the Western Pacific High Commission archives in Fiji and in Tonga itself, where in addition descendants of the Baker family and others connected with events during his Premiership were interviewed.

(3) Peter France

Commencing work in Canberra during August on the Development of Land Tenure in Fiji, Peter France was engaged in examining documentary sources in Sydney, Melbourne and Canberra itself before leaving for Suva in December to commence his field survey, which is expected to be based mainly on the records of the Fiji Lands Commission.



Allardyce, C.M.G., of Fiji, were destroyed by his second wife, I gather in the face of the remonstrances of his daughters. They have now been presented to the Department of Pacific History for preservation by his daughter Mrs C.T. Butler, of 16 Bracken Lane, Fern Tree, Hobart, Tasmania.

2. I enclose copies of the relevant correspondence with Mrs Butler, from which you will see that I have duly thanked her and said that we will catalogue the items and send her a copy; and then place them in a special box file labelled the "Allardyce Papers". I also attach a note to the Departmental Assistant re the cataloguing.

3. I'm afraid that there is not much of historical interest in the collection but would urge that it be received and preserved if only because the more we get the more we shall attract. The Grimble and Arundel Papers proved goldmines, the Allardyce Papers a disappointment, but whether good or bad they will all help the Department to become recognized as the proper depository for the papers of those who have played a prominent part in Pacific affairs.

When the cataloguing is complete we will send you a copy officially, which will also serve as a receipt.



Dear Mr Maude,

I fear that my stepmother has been extremely thorough in her lamentable zeal for destruction. The boxes have at last arrived from England and very little remains. Copies of lectures - the slides mentioned cannot be traced - there are receipts from the British Museum ^{of material} given and some from the Aberdeen Univ. ^{of} material loaned, wh. if of any good, you might be able to collect. There is no mention from the British Museum of the collection of weapons, I do not know if they have them in Cambridge. Also in the box were 2 small clubs, one with hobbles on it and one plain, an "1 v." splitter and a wabrus tick marked "Fiji". Also a piece of Cooper. I will send these on to you at the first opportunity. I am hoping to hear of some one going to Canberra who will take it personally. All Father's notes & diaries must have been destroyed, he must have had diaries as at the time he started writing of his early life in Fiji for family circulation. but he was discouraged by my step mother & did not go on with it. I am sending everything up to you. If there is anything of interest please keep it and what is not, return at your convenience. I know I have some early photographs here but, though I have searched for them all day,

I have not yet found them. When they do turn up, I will send them on to you.

If you are going to England in Dec. would you have time to get in touch with my sister? If anything is on loan that you would like, she might be able to help you get it, and she may have a few more Fijian things. Her name & address: - Mrs. ~~C. J.~~ ^{et} Woodward - no 2. Atudley - Bishops Down Park Road - Tunbridge Wells - Kent. -

I hear that Mrs. McMahon is moving house. If so, she may be sending some of her Fijian ~~things~~ things to her son in O. Land, so you had better get in as soon as you can.

So glad to hear that Mrs. Maude is alright again. Please remember us to her. I hope you have a wonderful and successful trip. If any of the clubs etc are of use to you please put them in in Father's name, as I know he would have liked to have helped you work in any way he could.

Dear Mrs Butler,

Thank you for your letter of the 17th and for so kindly sending Hazlewood's Grammar and Dictionary and the History of England. I will see that they are presented in your name to the most suitable Library, i.e. the one where they will be most useful to the greatest number (either the A.N.U., National or Mitchell), but for the moment I am taking the liberty of keeping them by me as Hazlewood in particular has some pages of information which I am anxious to copy out for my own studies in Pacific history.

I was most interested to hear that most of your father's collection went to the British Museum, with a portion to the Museum at Cambridge. I take it that this refers to his collection of material objects, and if so they could not have been placed in better hands.

His papers, reports, correspondence, etc. are, however, more valuable for posterity than any collection of material culture, and I can only hope that your stepmother was anything but thorough in her lamentable zeal for destruction.

Your father played a most important and honourable part in the history of Fiji and every scrap of his papers should, I feel strongly, be deposited in some recognized institution where they will be indexed, catalogued, filed and preserved for all time; even what seem to be trivial notes and private letters have value, if only as a background.

This is a duty which your stepmother owes to your father as well as to humanity. Of course, if considered necessary, anything particularly personal can be marked "not to be opened for 30 years" or "not to be quoted without the permission of the family", or some such stipulation.

When I suggest the A.N.U. as a suitable depository it is because we possess the only Department of Pacific History in the world, where there are always staff and students working on the detail of Fijian history. Furthermore, we already possess similar collections such as the Arundel and Grimble Papers; steel cabinets for housing them and a full-time custodian. But alas your stepmother may have left but little to preserve.

Some time ago Bill Hamilton passed on a letter from you about some Fijian material with a Mrs McMahon in Gordon and I have been hoping to get down to Sydney with some spare time to contact her ever since, but things

have been rather hectic lately owing to the Pacific Science Congress in Honolulu and the consequent papers which had to be prepared.

Now that is over I have only one more chore and am then free to tackle such things; meanwhile many thanks for the tip.

I'm glad to say that Honor has quite recovered her health and spirits and we are both looking forward to our year in England and the States hunting for just such material as your father's papers: to try and get them into safe archival care. We leave by a Winhelmsen cargo boat on or about the 20th December.

Again many thanks for sending the books and for your efforts to retrieve what you can of your father's papers.
