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- 1813 - Peter Dillon, then an officer on the Hunter, drops Martin Bushart and a Lascar named Joe on Tikopia, p.38.
- 1826 - Dillon, in command of the St. Patrick, finds them still there, having been treated with great kindness, p.38.
- 1827 - Dillon, in command of the Research, finds 5 Europeans on Tikopia, who said that they had deserted from a whaler, p.39. Dillon's description of the Tikopians mentioned.

Visit in 1875 on Queensland labour ship (not recruiting  
labour there). Chief named 'Sam', who had been to  
Fiji, could converse in Fijian.

Dillon II: 112 5 large double canoes from Tanya "committed dreadful  
outrages, destroyed the plantations, rolled the houses, violated the  
females, and murdered the males."

Dillon II: 170-1 Trade between Tahopia and Vanikoro.

Dillon II: 268-9 Roturans and Tanyans drift to Vanikoro  
Islands from Tahopia.

292 Tahopian on Manne

309-10 Strait (Lecothole) lines for Vanikoro.

Evidence in 1827 after departure of Diller.

Some described with mention of flowers, and lengths, small & diameter of 4 knuckle dials in form round island, surrounded by most of pit 4-500 feet in 4 valleys depths and with chief.

Hotel Tower corner 19.9.29: 32

"When Capt. Diller of the Antislavery Society from Hobart Town to Tasmania in 1827 in mind of the remains of La Perouse after Capt. Diller, he found on that island four men named T. Reader and James Carter, who had belonged to the Harriet when in 1826. It appeared they had another named Hamilton, and that name with one other to dead, but gave a rise from the confusion having got a brand full casks left them to fill others in other. In the meantime, however, a gale blowing at which continued to blow for a month, and the vessel was not again seen. It will be interesting to the owners of the Harriet to know these circumstances."



Tahopia

117. Infant description of Lascar Joco 4 years on Fiji (where he named a Tahopiar?) also he lived on Lakemba, Kao, Takudrene, Mbeu, Novala, Kardava and Vatu Lela (3-4 months on each and 21 months on 'Voukia').

125. Nature of Uvea accompanied chief to Vanukoro. Had drifted to Tahopia. 30 days on 10 accounts.

110-111 Baskant returned to Vanukoro on the Governor Mucapané en route to Rotuma and Targatapa. Baskant named to a young and pretty New Zealander of 18 years.

112-113 Islands known to Tahopians (list) also on p. 133.

113 Haniet people had been 9 months on Tahopia.

118. Chief unwilling to let Baskant go because of his possessions and arms.

133. Taumako considered the same as Kennedy Island of the Tontilus.

TUCOPIA (SANTA CRUZ IS)

20-9-1813 Martin Buxton, wife & Lascar "Joe" left there  
by P. Dillon, who picked them up again in May 1826.  
In Dec 1827, Buxton returned to Tucopia
