





In August last year student government for the people purportedly made the transition to government by the people: with the advent of the Student Association (replacing the Students' Representative Council) the people became the government. "Purportedly" is not, said cynically but apprehensively, since the new structure requires that "the people" become involved, PARTICIPATE.

The Association has positions that are to be filled by students intent on carrying out specific policies in particular areas of student interest. In the postal ballot the general masses choose who shall spend the student money to carry out what policies.

STUDENT ORGANISERS:

The Central Executive Committee provides the bureaucratic expertise needed to keep the Association functioning. The full functions of the C.E.C. and its members are set out in the Constitution. Briefly, the C.E.C. to some extent acts as the channel between students and outside bodies; it arranges election of students to various bodies where appropriate or refers matters to other Committees when necessary. The President's functions include acting as spokesman for the Association and chairing General Student Meetings and actively furthering student welfare as he sees fit.

The Vice-President normally stands in when the President is unavailable and helps him in his work, mainly in student welfare.

The General Secretary is largely responsible for keeping the vast bureaucracy of the Association viable, directional and creative.

The Co-ordinating Treasurer is responsible to the Union Council for an accounting of the Association's finances, and prepares annual budget submissions with the other Committee Treasurers to get the annual grant from the Union. He is one of the cheque signatories for all Committees.

The Communications Officer is very important. He ensures that students are kept informed of what every Committee is doing and liases among committees.

STUDENT AGITATORS:

The Public Affairs Committee holds office to "create and maintain student awareness concerning social and political issues". It also provides a body to help ad-hoc interest groups, e.g. Movement Against Apartheid, get funds from the General Reserve Fund. It also does the hack-work in particular student campaigns but it mainly operates through the medium of General Student Meetings. It cooperates closely with the Local A.U.S. National and International Officers.

The A.U.S. Committee may never meet except to work out how much finance it needs but it provides a means for the election of some important student office holders. A.U.S. makes some valuable contributions to student welfare in the form of co-ordination of information and action on student interests. The Local A.U.S. Secretary handles communication between A.U.S. and Adelaide and sees that Adelaide students' interests that can be helped by national action are pushed as far as possible. For those interested in travel and greater knowledge of foreign students visiting Australia, the positions of Local Travel Officer and Incoming Delegations Officer should provide a fair bit of scope.

The Incoming Delegations Officer is a position for people who want to help delegations of students on official, or otherwise, tours to have an enjoyable time in Adelaide. This may mean arranging accommodation (e.g. billets) and tours around South Australia. Quite a good social life occasionally.

The Local Papua and New Guinea Officer is someone interested in T.P.N.G. and wants to increase student awareness of Australia's great colonial outpost. He may be active in finding out what students think is the best policy for Australia and T.P.N.G. and doing something about it. He will be engaged in the VIIIage Exchange Schemes designed to get Australians into T.P.N.G. to see what it's like and indigines into Australia for the same purpose.

The Local National and International Officers are concerned with politics and policies on their respective levels. They are concerned with the creation and implementation of A.U.S. policy and action for a better world in the legislative arena.

The Local Travel Officer administers the A.U.S. travel schemes (very attractive cheap tours) with the help of the professional travel officer on campus. He also administers the Student Travel Loan Fund, a marvellous means of spreading the cost of travel.

The Cultural Affairs Officer is an A.U.S. portfolio that helps with Adelaide coordination of Aquarius ventures

He acts in concert with the Social Activities Committee.

The Friendly Society Officer works to get cheaper medical benefits for all students through the implementation of an A.U.S. Friendly Society in S.A. as they already have in other States.

The Education and Welfare Committee's function is to "promote and co-ordinate student interests in the fields of education and welfare both on and off campus." Its composition includes all interested students. In relation to this committee especially, activities should be organised so as "to allow maximum student participation in all decisions and spread power and information as evenly and as widely as possible, stop as much as possible the formation of elites and have the widest feasible publicity and advertisement of meetings and relevant information."

AND GAMES FUN HAPPY STUDENTS:

The Social Activities Committee exists to organize those things students think should be done to amuse, entertain and enjoy themselves. The five members of the Social Activities Committee (plus any friends they want to co-opt) organize Balls, Freshers Camps, Orientation Week or Prosh if students elect them and vote them money to do so. The counter-culture could get under way through this body.

ON DIT EDITORS

The Publications Committee consists of people elected as On Dit Editors and people who want to produce those very important publications the Union Diary and the Orientation Handbook. All of them have some responsibility for making sure students know how the Association's Committees are operating.

BE REALISTIC DEMAND THE IMPOSSIBLE

In a community as small as the University the possibility exists for an almost Utopian democracy. It is believed that the new Student Association approaches that ideal more successfully than anything yet devised, despite the horrible tourisms of University realpolitik (even Athens under Perikles had Its problems!). THE KEY TO THE CONCEPT IS PARTICIPATION AS OPPOSED TO REPRESENTATION. The Student Association consists of every student in this University. The positions and committees that you annually elect are not "representatives" with "power" and "responsibility", for no one can purport to make decisions in your name: they are merely the machinery to enable you to make the decisions.

What this system lacks in efficiency it makes up with participation in decisionmaking. All students have the power to call General Meetings and referenda, and all students shoulder the responsibility for the decisions that the Association makes. There is no "passing the buck" to the so-called representatives; it is up to you to get involved in your own affairs.

Until recently students were virtually powerless in this University. Their participation in decisionmaking consisted of token representation on a handful of irrelevant committees. Over the past year the Students Association, despite the abysmal ignorance and apathy of the rest of the student body, has secured meaningful representation on a number of vitally important University bodies, culminating last week in the inclusion of eight students on the Education Committee - probably the most vital and most important in the University. On the one hand, student troglodytes who selfishly regard the University as a training school disgorging passports to technocratic affluence will not be very interested in their newfound ability to transform the ethos of their degree-factory, or even to rearrange its bankrupt priorities. On the other hand, nor will most of those who are resigned to the belief that the University is merely an ideational tool of the capitalist system want any part in its structure of government - this would be a serious violation of some antiseptic correct line mystique.

The number of students sandwiched between these two positions - the inert vegetable and the brickwall ideologue - can be counted on the toes of a sloth. It is imperative that the positions set out in this broadsheet be filled and used to our fullest advantage. There must be people interested in one or two of the activities mentioned who haven't yet been moved to follow through their inclinations. Don't fall for the delusion that you have to be some sort of "heavy" to participate - for most people in the present Students Association it was their first foray into student affairs.

If enough of us do enough things there will be a minimum of "bureaucracy" (that notoriously evil phenomenon) and a maximum of good fun; above all, of course, some vitality will be injected into this constipated campus, which should not only mean a fuller enjoyment of University life, but the inception of forces of change that could not be deflected by the ubiquitous combination of reactionary pressures, both inside and outside the University, hand in hand with student indifference.

Union Reform:

At the meeting in the Union Hall on Thursday 31 . August about sixty Union Members passed the reformed Union Constitution with two minor amendments.

These amendments need to be ratified by the Union Council at it's next meeting and then the new Constitution will be forwarded to the University Council for approval. This will probably be in early October.

If all goes as planned, the new constitution will come into force on the first of January 1973.

Subject to agreement by the Union Council it is planned to hold the coming elections under the provisions of the existing Constitution.

This Council would probably remain in office until the middle of second term 1973 when the elections will be held under the provisions of the new Constitution.
