

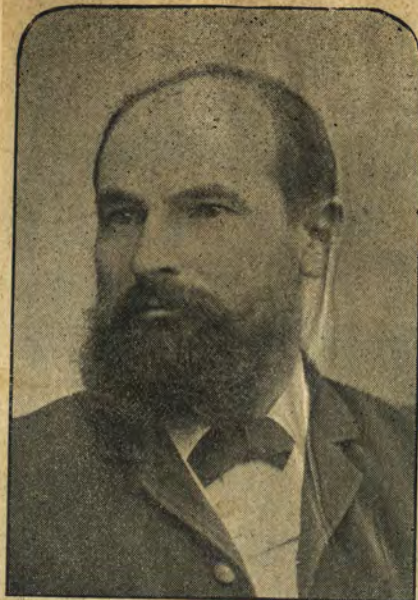

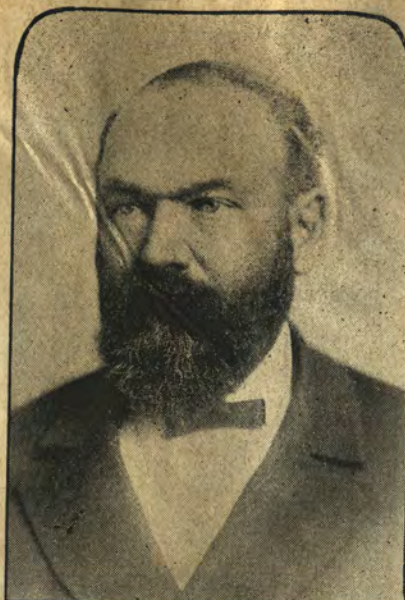

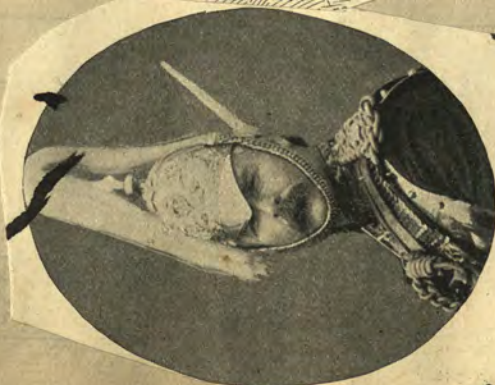

OUR ARMY. South Australia's Strength.

With the latest district military orders are issued particulars of the annual establishment of the Commonwealth military forces of South Australia for 1966-7. The grand total of permanent, militia, and volunteer forces is 2,074, comprising 1,366 militia, 647 volunteer, and 61 permanent soldiers of all ranks. Of the volunteers, the infantry regiment number 511, the Scottish Infantry 120, and the Army Nursing Service 16. The largest division of the troops is the militia portion. This consists of the newly-formed Sixth Light Horse Brigade (16th and 17th Light Horse Regiments, numbering 582; the Third Infantry Brigade (10th A.I.R.), 511; Garrison Artillery, 105; Field Artillery, 76; Army Medical Corps, 70; Corps of Signallers, 31; Army Service Corps, 8; and Veterinary Department, 2.

A serious motor-car accident occurred on the Great Bath Road at Slough on Saturday afternoon. James Preddy, a road mender in the employ of the Slough Urban District Council, being knocked down and killed. The car contained Mrs. Angus, of Belgrave-mansions, Grosvenor-gardens, the owner, and a Miss Deane, and was being driven by John Lauchlan Plant, the lady's chauffeur. Plant states that while running through Slough at about sixteen miles an hour he saw Preddy, who is over 70, working in the road. He blew his horn when about thirty yards away, jammed on the brakes and swerved to the off-side, thinking the old man would get on the near side path. He however tried to cross the road, and was caught by the car and dragged nearly forty feet.

The same!"

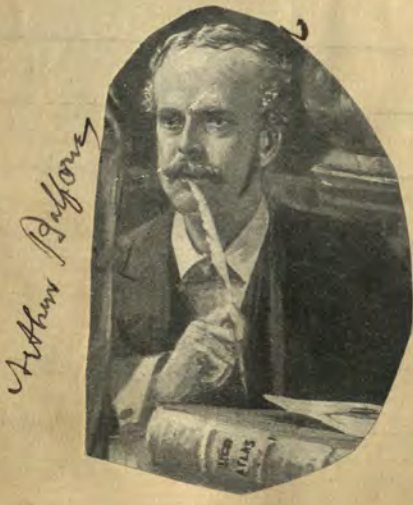

1851 THE WHIP. Mr. Thomas Henry Brooker was first returned to the House of Assembly as junior member for the District of West Torrens in 1890. Since that time he has twice been re-elected at the head of the poll. Mr. Brooker was born at Kensington, England, on December 30, 1850. He arrived in the colony when only four years of age, and has resided in the District of West Torrens ever since. He began life in the employ of Mr. Thomas Hardy at Bankside, and has

for several years past carried on a business of his own as a salesman and wood merchant. In 1885 he was elected to the Hindmarsh Corporation as member for Brompton Ward, a position which he occupied for five years. In 1891-2 he was elected without opposition as Mayor of Hindmarsh. He was a Vice-President of the Homestead League, and did all that lay in his power to further the blockers' system. Mr. Brooker succeeded Mr. Butler as Government Whip last year, a position which he held until a week ago, but which he fill once more.

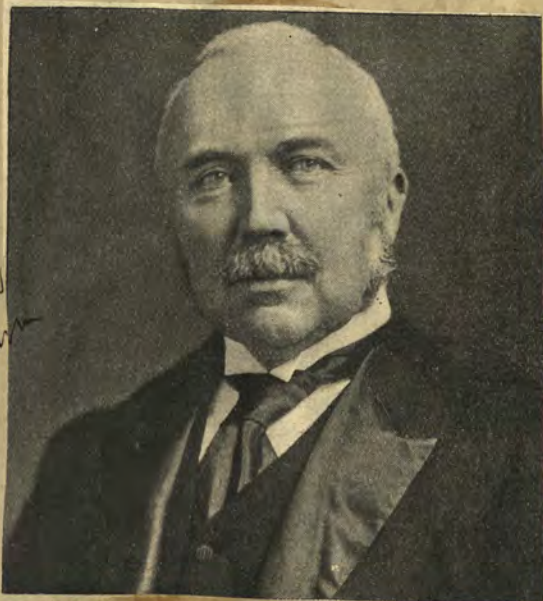

Mr. J. L. Bottrill, of Payneham, writes: "I thought the following particulars concerning our family might prove of interest to your readers. My parents were among the earliest arrivals, having come to the colony by the ship Duke of Roxburgh, July, 1838. They had 11 children, nine of whom were born in the colony, and are all living at the present time, the youngest being 50 years old. All are residents of South Australia, namely, Mrs. J. Thorpe, and Mr. Stephen Bottrill, of Kangarilla; Mrs. Wood, of Gladstone; Mrs. E. Eagle, of Wandearah; Mrs. E. Macklin, of Sturt; Mrs. R. Woolcock, of Parkside; Mrs. Mutton, of Millicent; Mr. Sam Bottrill, of Petersburg; and Mrs. Steer, Mrs. E. E. Middleton, and myself. There have been 107 grandchildren, 86 of whom are still living, and great-grandchildren, 153, of whom 123 still live. I think you will agree with me that it is exceptional for such a large family to remain intact up to the ages we have been spared to see."

Mrs. Susannah Pennock, 21 years old, of St. Louis (America), has just given birth to her third set of twins. Mrs. Pennock's mother gave birth to six sets of twins, and bore 24 children altogether. One of Mrs. Pennock's sisters has borne six pairs of twins, and another sister four pairs. Thirteen more of her mother's children had three sets of twins each, or a total of 39, making 58 sets of twins, or 116 children in all. Mrs. Pennock was born in Sweden.

Lancashire, for some unexplained reason, can boast of producing more twins than any other county in the United Kingdom. London comes a good second, and Yorkshire an indifferent third. For the last five years 668 twins have been born annually in Lancashire, Liverpool being responsible for 110 of these. Manchester every year adds to the population 79 twins, Salford 31, Bolton 23, and Blackburn and Preston 18 apiece. At the bottom of the twin-bearing counties comes Rutland with only ten in five years.

CHAMPION CHOPPING. 18

A NEW RECORD.

LAUNCESTON, November 29.

The annual carnival of the Australasia Axemen's Association was commenced a Uiverstone to-day, and about 3,000 people were present. The Champion Chop aroused great enthusiasm. A splendid exhibition was given, and the competitors finished their blocks in considerably under the record held by Reeves. The performance of the champion, W. H. Chellis, was particularly good, as it lowered the record by fully half a minute. Results:—

Champion Chop.—W. H. Chellis (Deloraine), A. Bryan (Victoria), Thomas Rent Sprent, and J. M. Mackinalty (Victoria). The other competitors were James Fraser (Western Australia), W. and C. Heckenberg (N.S.W.), J. Buckingham and Chutton (Tasmania). Favouritism was divided between Chellis and Petitt. Bryan was the first to finish the forescarf, but was soon followed by the favourites. The Victorian kept the advantage till the last half-minute when Chellis's better condition began tell, and his block fell 4 sec. before Bryan. There was about the same time between the second and third men.

FIFTY YEARS AGO.

—Saturday, November 7, 1857.—

The first European child born in South Australia attains his majority to-day. On November 7, 1836, the wife of Mr. James Hoare, now residing at Penwortham, gave birth to a male child. It has been supposed by many that Mr. Finnis's eldest daughter was the first South Australian child, but this is not correct. Miss Finnis (now Mrs. Morgan) was born a few days after the birth of the male child above referred to; so that Mr. Finnis is the father of the first daughter born in South Australia, and Mr. Hoare of the first son. It is also worth of note that Mr. Hoare, whose son comes of age to-day, was in the employ of Mr. Finnis at the time of receiving the national honour of being made the father of the firstborn South Australian white child.—The steamer Marion has brought from Port Augusta copper ore from the recently discovered mines in the far north. REMARKS BY MR. G. H. JENKINS.

Mr. George Jenkins, who recently relinquished his position as the first clerk of the House of Representatives, in order to resume his post as Clerk of Parliaments in the state of Victoria, was presented on Monday by the officers who served under him during his connection with the Commonwealth Parliament with a memento of their esteem. The memento took the form of a large framed photograph of the Parliamentary staff for the House of Representatives. Mr. Jenkins, in thanking the staff for their present, alluded to a statement by Mr. W. A. Gale, the second clerk assistant, that just before the recent visit of the Duke of Cornwall and York it was almost impossible to see him (Mr. Jenkins) owing to the crush of anxious visitors to the Commonwealth offices. “I have found,” said Mr. Jenkins, “that in a pure democracy there is always the greatest anxiety on the subject of precedence. Every day I found 40,000 people waiting to see me. Half of them wanted invitations, and the other half wanted to sit on the dais with the Duke and Duchess. Some of the bitterest enemies that I have made during the whole of my long official life were made because I could not, and would not, put them on that dais. First of all, everybody came for their invitation cards. Afterwards, three-quarters of the number came back and said, ‘Here, you can take back those entire cards, Mr. Jenkins. We could not possibly accept them. Mr. Smith is in a row in front of us, and Mr. Brown, to whom we do not speak, and who is much lower in the social scale than we are, is two rows in front of us.’ It was not much wonder that Mr. Gale found it difficult to see me.” (Laughter.)—The “Argus.”

DENSE FOG IN LONDON. Nov 1899.

The densest fog which has been experienced this year prevailed in London from an early hour this morning. Vehicular traffic was conducted with the greatest difficulty, and there was great delay in the railway traffic. The firemen on the river telephoned to Commander Wells that the fog was so dense that it would be impossible to utilize the river floats if they were wanted, and the Free Ferry at Woolwich had to be stopped, to the great inconvenience of many people. The London firemen received several "calls" just when the fog was at its densest, and had to proceed at walking pace, in some instances carrying torches in front. Brixton Hill and one or two other favoured spots enjoyed an immunity from the fog.

Traffic is completely suspended at the entrance to the Thames to-day. Communication with war vessels in Sheerness Harbour is only maintained by means of fog signals.

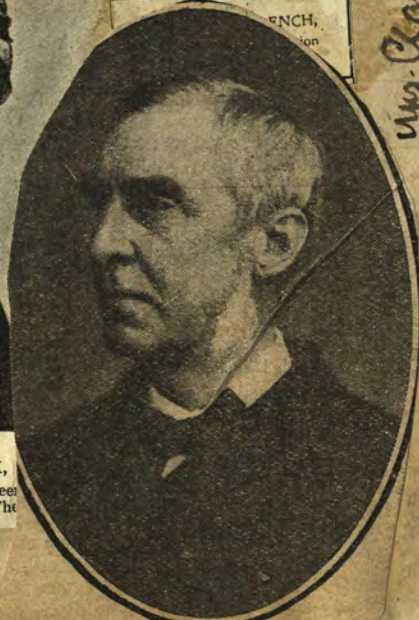

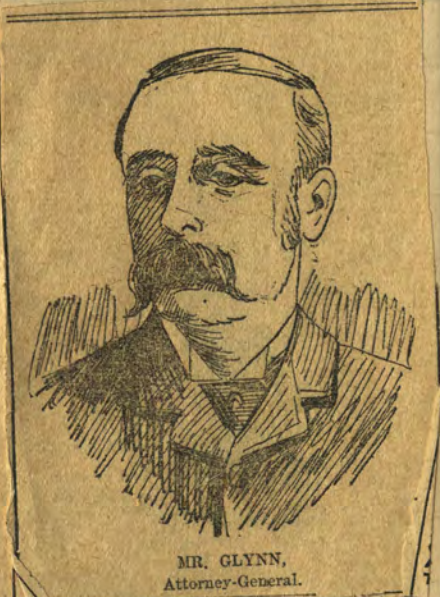

THE ATTORNEY-GENERAL.

The Hon. John Hannah Gordon, M.L.C., the Attorney-General and Government representative in the Council, was born in Scotland, 1850, and admitted to South Australian Bar, 1876. He was elected to the Legislative Council for Southern District, May, 1888, and still sits for that constituency. His first Ministerial experience was that of Minister of Education in the Cockburn Ministry, which lasted from June 27, 1889, to August 19, 1890, and he filled the same office in the Holder Ministry from June 21 to October 13, 1892. He

was a delegate to the Australasian Federation Convention, Sydney, in 1891, and also a member of the last Convention, when the Kingston Government took office he accepted the position of Chief Secretary, and retained that post from June, 1896, to February, 1896. THE ATTORNEY-GENERAL.

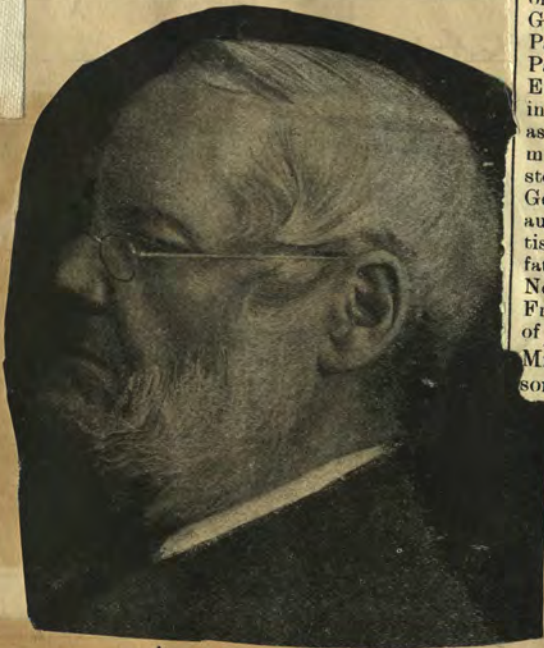

lated into a foreign tongue. Nearly every piece produced on the English stage was, in fact, a translation from the French. Oxenford's 'Twice Killed' has been generally looked upon as an original work; and when a one-act opera by Grisar, on the same theme, was produced at Paris, under the title of 'Bon Soir, Monsieur Pantalon!' people said that at last a modern English piece had been translated or adapted into French. But Oxenford, learned and witty as he was, had no invention; and the whole merit of 'Twice Killed' lies in its excellent story. It is really an adaptation from the German, and it is interesting to know that the author of the German piece was a skilful dramatist and successful publisher, Herr Goschen, father of the English statesman of that name. Neither in connection with the English nor the French version of the piece did the name appear of the true author. *Subscribed to the*

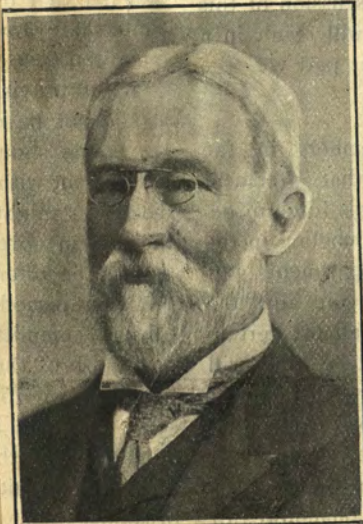

ADVICE TO CEREAL GROWERS.
 To the Editor.
 Sir—With your permission I would like to tender to cereal growers some scientific advice which, if acted on, will result to their personal advantage, as well as that of the State. General rains will occur from the 11th to 17th inst., heavy in places in the northern areas, but not so heavy in the southern parts. Winter rains will set in, with hailstorms and boisterous winds, during the first week of April, and that month and the early part of May will be fairly wet. Latter part of May and early June rather dry and some frosts. Heavy rains in the middle of June. July not very wet. August will be a wet month, but during September and October the rains will be rather scanty. Next summer will therefore set in early, and late-sown crops will stand a poor chance. Sow early if you want a crop.—I am, &c.

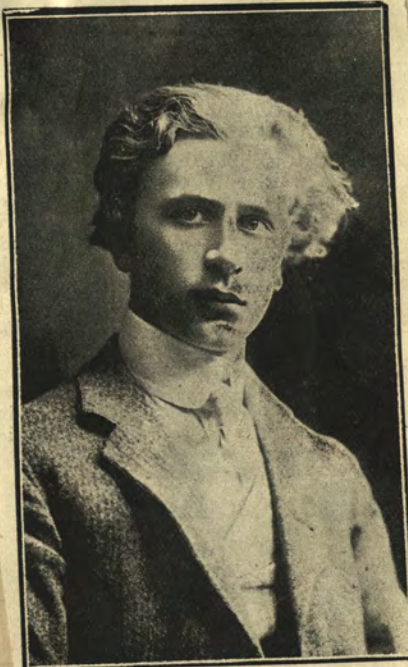

 Agency of the National Bank. The money has been invested at current rates of interest on fixed deposits in various banks at an average rate of 6 per cent. per annum. The quantity of water available at the 31st March, 1907, from all the Board's sources of supply was equal to 67 million gallons daily. The consumption of water during the year has not come up to the quantity estimated. This was principally owing to the exceptionally rainy season experienced, which very materially reduced the demand for water from the Board. The average daily consumption of water was 2,787,000 gallons, as against 2,531,001 gallons for the previous year 1907-6. Reference was made in the previous report to the properties that became vested in the Board under section 22 of Ordinance 48 of 1904, and to the question of the liability of the Board to pay transfer duty on such properties. The properties have now all been registered in the name of the Board under an order of Court. The Treasury have commenced an action to obtain a decision of the Supreme Court as to the liability of the Board to pay transfer duty. This action was heard on the 10th June, when judgment was given in favour of the Board, with the Government.

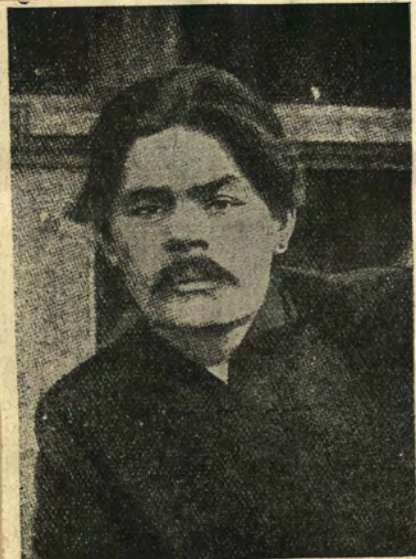

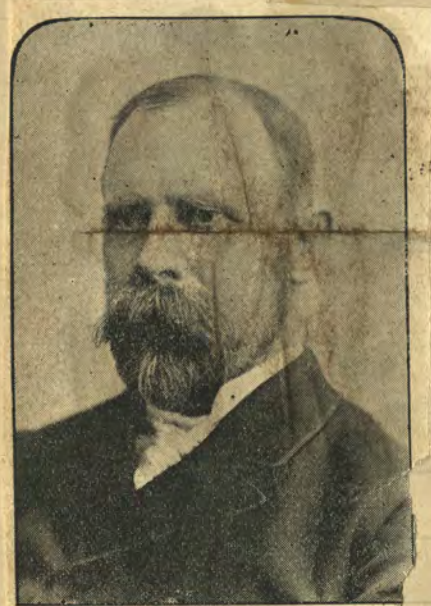

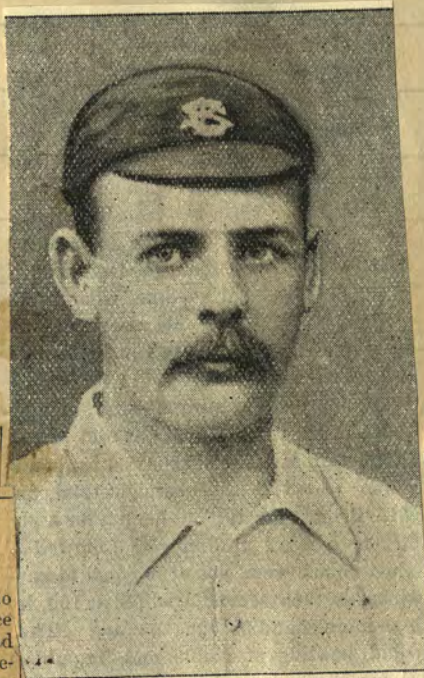

THE NEW MINISTRY.

THE PREMIER-TREASURER.

The Hon. Frederick William Holder, who has been three times Treasurer of the province and once Premier, is once again at the head of a Ministry, and Chief of the Finance Department. Mr. Holder has sat for the Burra since 1887. Dr. Cockburn selected him in June, 1889, as Treasurer in his Ministry.

In the second session of the Fourteenth Parliament Mr. Holder moved a motion of no-confidence in the Playford Government; he was unsuccessful, but established his position as Leader of the Opposition. As soon as Parliament met in 1892 he ousted that Government. His Administration had a short-lived but troublous existence till October. In June, 1893, the Kingston-Holder Government was formed. Mr. Holder was Commissioner of Public Works, but in 1894, when Mr. Playford became Agent-General, Mr. Holder took the Treasuryship. Mr. Holder was born at Happy Valley, South Australia, in May, 1850. His father was a State school teacher, and the son followed the same profession for many years, holding various appointments under the Education Department. His last school was at the Burra, where he first entered public life. For a considerable time he conducted the "Burra Record," of which he was the proprietor.

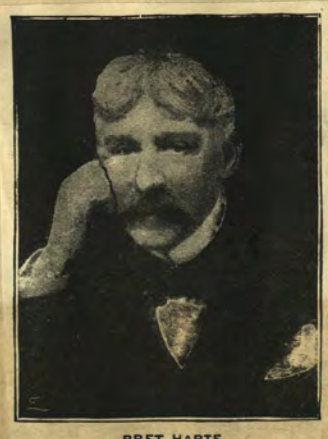

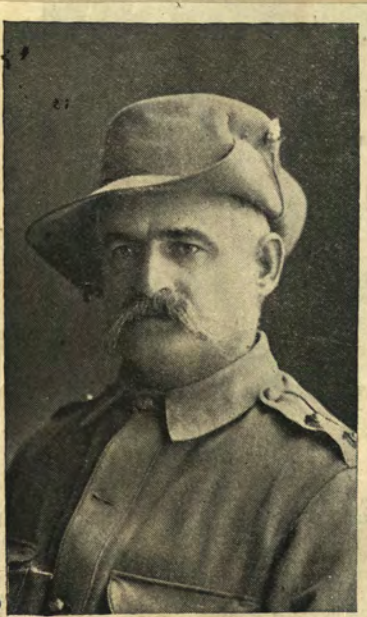

SCOTLAND'S HEROES.

TEN TO ENGLAND'S ONE.

Heroes continued

Where do heroes most abound in the British Isles? Statistics have not previously brought much light to bear upon this question. It remained for the Carnegie Hero Fund to settle it, and this it does in no uncertain manner. The annual report of the fund shows that the average number of heroes to the acre in Scotland is nearly twice what it is in England, four times what it is in Ireland, and three times what it is in Wales.

In other words

Scotland has ten heroes in every million. England and Wales one and a fraction per million.

It is curious to examine the accompanying map, and note the distribution of the nation's heroes. They cluster thickly around Dunfermline and the south-west corner of Scotland, thinning off towards the north-west, and disappearing in the extreme north. There is a slight revival of heroism, however, in Stornoway (one), and in the Orkneys the brave keen air produces five.

Heroes seem to shun the west coast of Ireland, and Cornwall and Devon and all the southern English counties are quite unheroic. England's most heroic place is Tottenham.

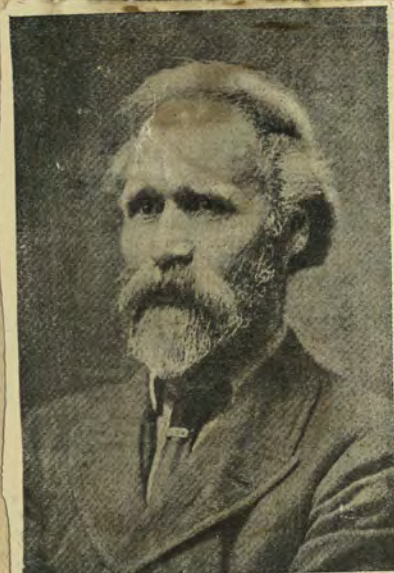

The Carnegie Hero Fund is administered from Dunfermline, Mr. Carnegie's native city and the home of Scottish Kings and heroes. King Robert Bruce is buried there. The trust was instituted in September 1908, and the report just issued shows the first year's working. Mr. Carnegie's generous gift reached the figure of \$250,000, which yields an annual income of £12,500 for the purposes of the fund.

During the year ending September last 195 cases of heroism were reported to the trustees as worthy of recognition. Awards were made in eighty-eight cases. An analysis of these eighty-eight awards proves

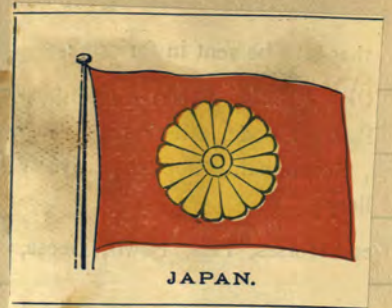

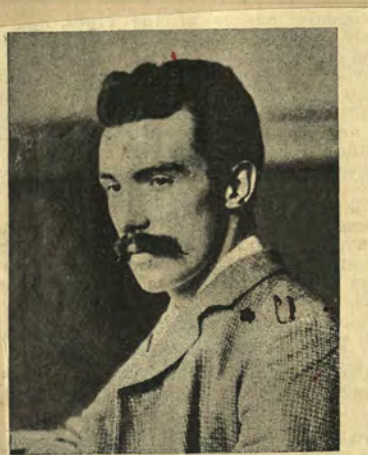

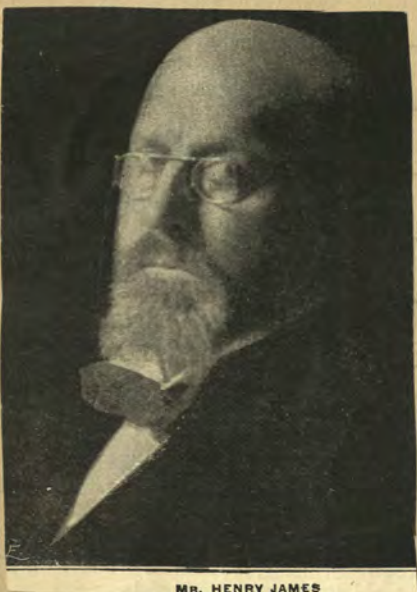


THE CHIEF SECRETARY.

He first became well-known to the public through the prominent position he took in connection with the Literary Societies' Union. Mr. Jenkins had nearly always identified himself with local questions, and in December, 1885, had no difficulty in gaining the popular vote when he offered himself as Councillor for Unley Ward. After two years' service he was chosen as Chief Magistrate of the Town of Unley, no one venturing to enter the lists against him. One year of office was, however, sufficient for him, and he declined an invitation to stand again. In 1886 he unsuccessfully contested the East Adelaide by-election; but at the general election in 1887 he was returned for the Sturt on the Protection ticket. In the House he has worked energetically, and has done useful service, particularly for his district. He held office in the second Playford Government, and when the Kingston Government came into power in 1893 he was appointed Government Whip. When next year the Ministry was reconstructed owing to the appointment of the Hon. T. Playford as Agent-General he was given the portfolio of Commissioner of Public Works,

his strong management of which was not at all appreciated by the Labour Party. He held that office until the defeat of the Kingston-Holder Government. He was out of office one week, but returns as the head of a new department.

Jem Mace, the Famous Pugilist,
Applies for Old Age Pension.

Into the Goswell-road post office yesterday walked a stalwart, broad-shouldered old man, with white hair and moustache. He came to sign an application form for an old age pension, and gave his name as Jem Mace, born at Beeston, Norwich, April 8, 1831.

The old man with the well-brushed silk hat was, indeed, none other than the famous old pugilist, and former undefeated champion of the world, who now, within a few weeks of his 78th birthday, finds himself fallen on hard times.

Despite his advanced years, Mace is as hard as nails, and as jolly as a sandboy, and he was delighted to chat with a "Daily Chronicle" representative who sought him out in his Islington haunts. He was at his prime in the sixties, and boasts 500 fights with only two defeats.

"Careful living and keeping off the drink is the secret," he said. "In the old days men trained harder, and went through ordeals that would kill present-day boxers. There's all the difference in the world between the old fights with bare knuckles and glove contests to-day, which are mere pleasure outings."

Mace is still active and keen. Within the last fortnight he has been giving exhibitions of boxing at Hull and Coventry, and he hopes to have the gloves on with pupils and others many times more.

Some big prizes have fallen in his time to the lot of the old man who to-day is applying for an old age pension. In one fight in America he won £10,000, and he has known what it is to have £70,000 in the bank. 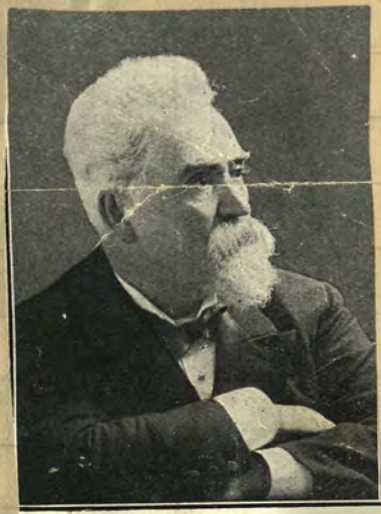

From this table it appears that London is now content with 1,055 fewer omnibuses than it possessed in 1904 and 621 fewer cabs. This diminution has undoubtedly been brought about by the increased rapidity of motor travel. A motor-omnibus, for example, makes two trips while a horsed omnibus makes one. The "tubes" and the electrification of the underground railway have also had a good deal to do with the reduction in the number of surface vehicles.

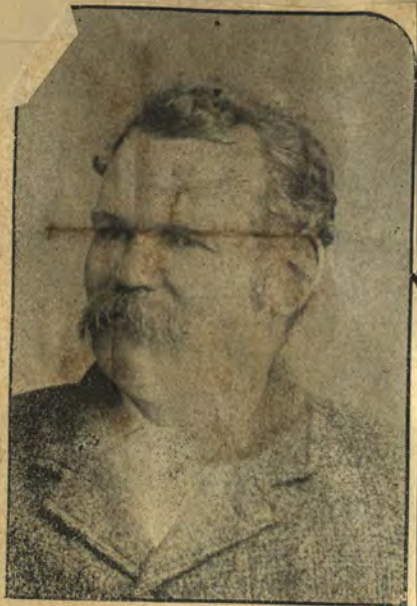

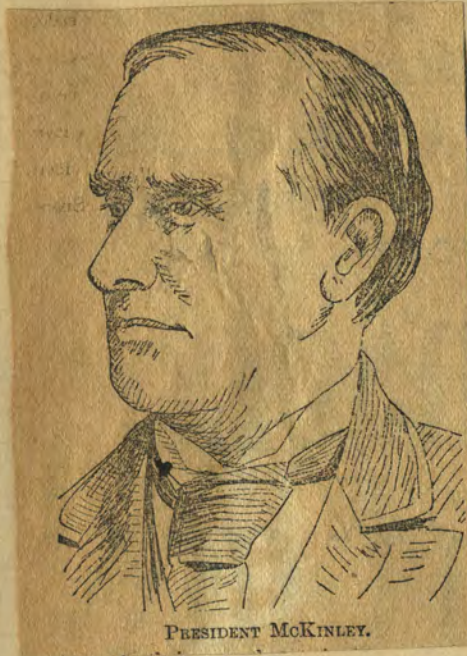

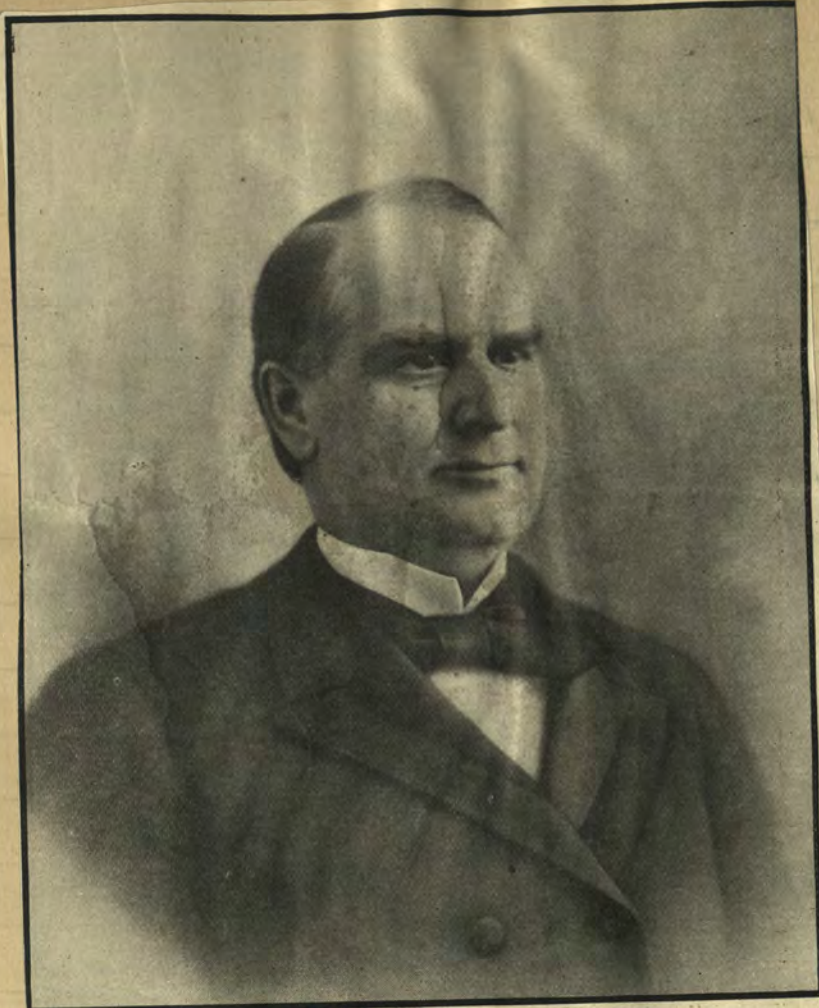
THE INVENTOR OF THE MACKINTOSH.

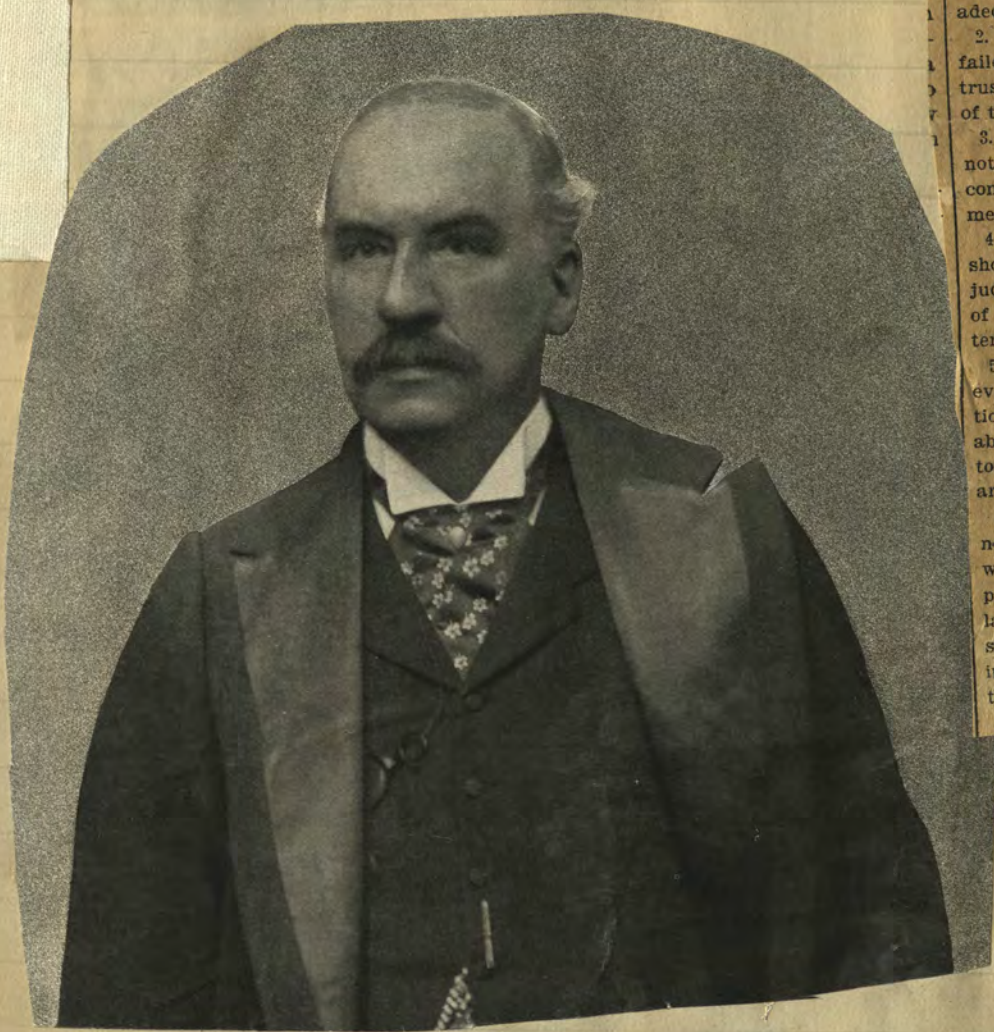

THE CONCLUSIONS.

Mr Madden presented the report of the committee, in the absence of the chairman, Mr Duffy.

Mr Bennett moved that, in view of the interest taken in the matter, the conclusions of the committee should be read.

The motion was agreed to, and the conclusions were read as follow:—

1. Your committee acquits Mr M'Kenzie of obtaining any grazing licence for himself or for any relative at an inadequate rental.
2. Your committee finds that he has failed to realise his true position as a trustee of the public lands for the people of the State.
3. Your committee finds that he should not have sub-let his grazing licenses, contrary to the practice of the department over which he presided.
4. Your committee considers that he should have refrained from acting as a judge in his own cause, or in the cause of his son, when other persons were interested.
5. Your committee is of opinion that even crediting him with the best intention, he entered upon a very objectionable course in using the names of agents to secure grazing licenses for himself and for his son.
6. Your committee regrets that he did not, in his own person, recognise the wholesome provision of the law which prohibits land officers from selecting land in their own districts, and abstain altogether from acquiring grazing rights over Crown lands during his term of office as Minister of Lands.



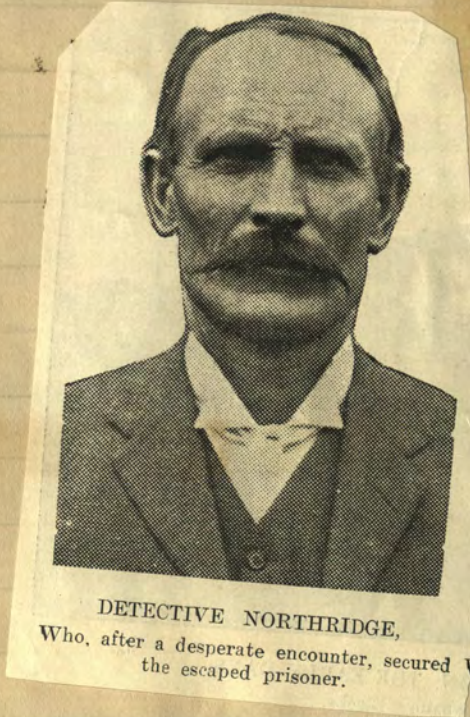

WHAT IS BEING SPENT.
LONDON, October 11.
The Admiralty has issued a return showing the naval expenditures for the current year of the different Powers. 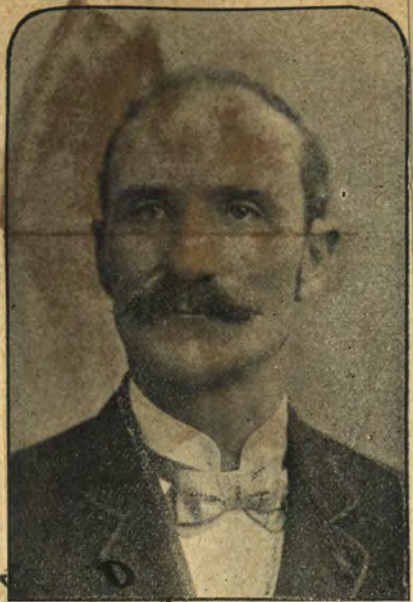

COLONEL PICQUART.

Colonel Picquart was born at Strasburg in 1854, and was educated at St. Cyr and the General Staff School. After serving in Africa with the Zouaves he entered the infantry, and gained his captaincy in 1880. In 1885 he was appointed to the War Office and in 1885-8 served in Tonquin, where he earned a decoration. Returning to France he became Professor at the Military School, and in 1893 rejoined the War Office, becoming in 1895 head of the Intelligence Department. The next year he was given the rank of lieutenant-colonel, but then he began his connection with the Dreyfus case, moved to by certain suspicious discoveries he made concerning Major Esterhazy. In this he was at first encouraged by his official superiors, but afterwards repented, and in January, 1897, he was sent to the most unhealthy part of the island of St. Helena. He returned to take a prominent part in the military and legal proceedings.

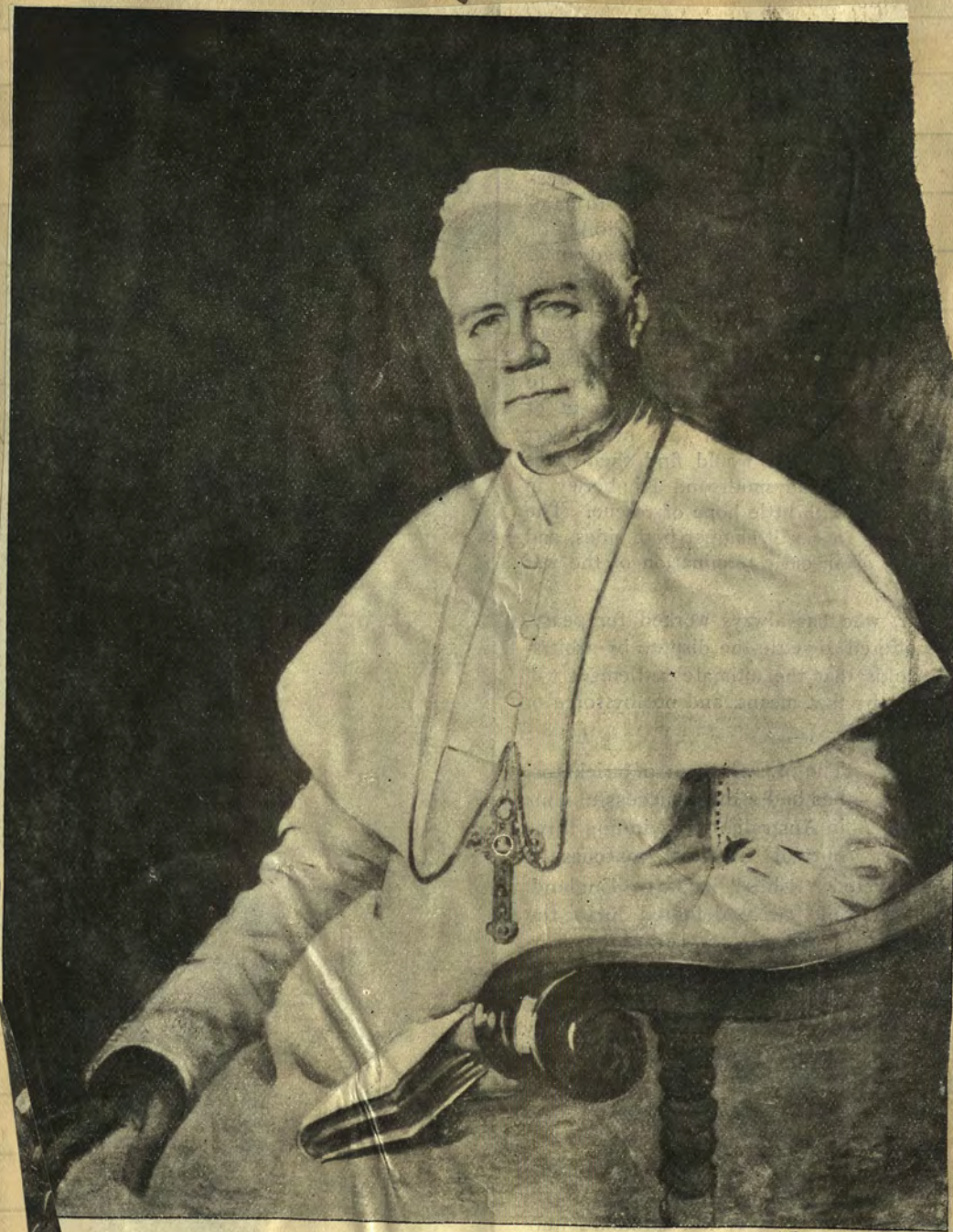

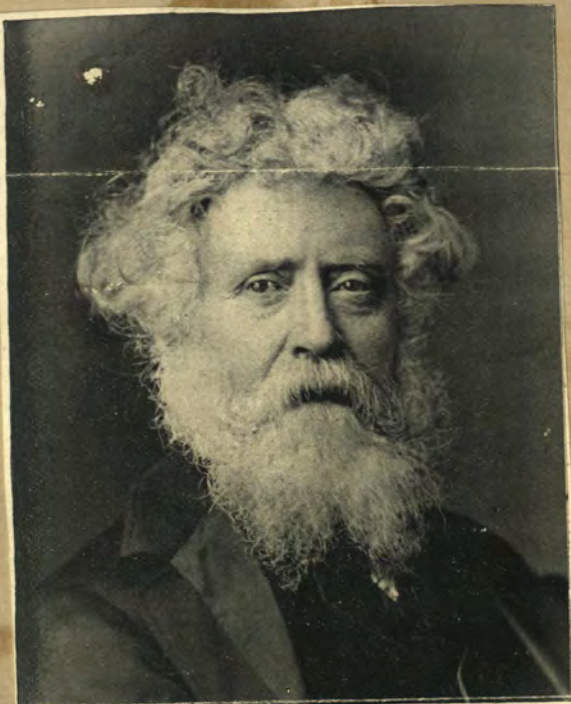

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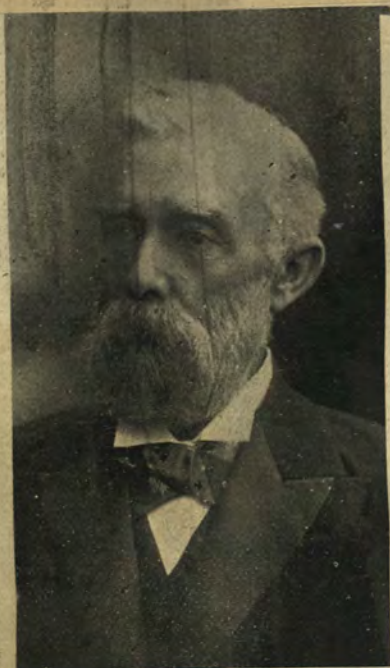

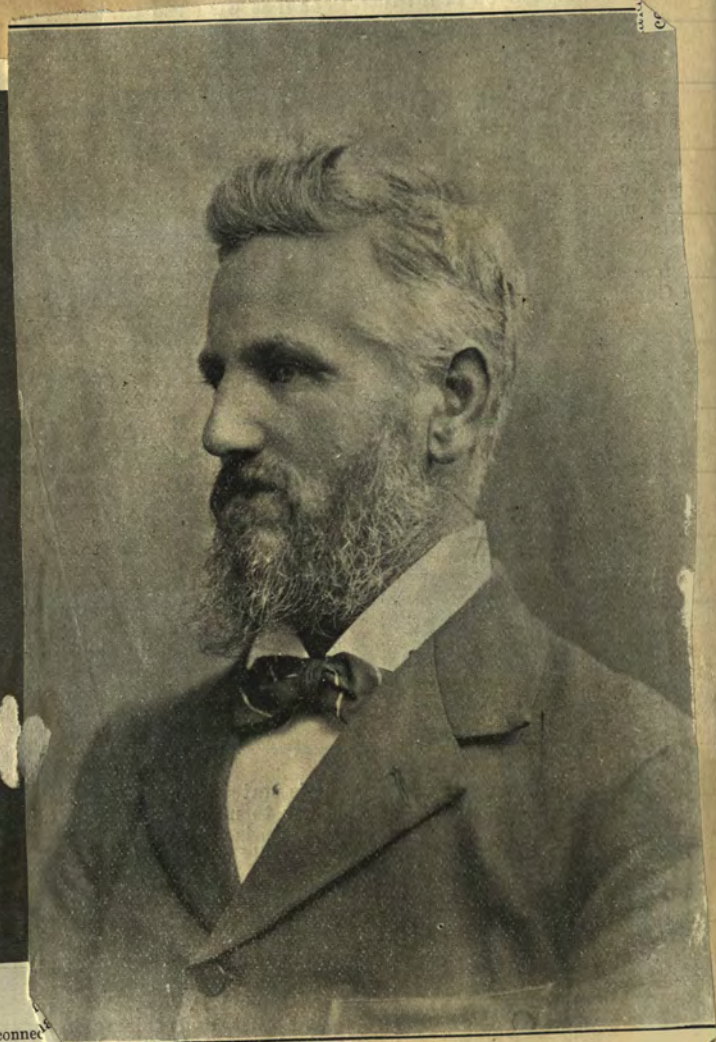

Total on June 30, 1905, £26,099,695 (S.A.), £2,628,200 (N.T.). Bonds redeemed during 1905-6, £37,500 (S.A.); Treasury bills redeemed during 1905-6, £385,159 (S.A.). Total, £422,650 (S.A.). Total on June 30, 1906, £25,677,045 (S.A.), £2,628,200 (N.T.). Treasury bills issued during year 1905-6, £1,213,375 (S.A.), £178,300 (N.T.); inscribed stock during year 1905-6, £358,035 (S.A.). Total, June 30, 1906, £27,226,485 (S.A.), £2,806,500 (N.T.). Grand total public debt June 30, 1906, £30,032,985; grand total public debt June 30, 1905, £28,727,899. Increase for year 1905-6, £1,305,090. The apparent increase in the public debt was owing to the issue of bills and stock of about one million to meet redemption of 4 per cent. bonds due on January 1 next, so that the public debt on June 30, 1906, was temporarily increased to that extent. As the balance of £305,000 included an issue of £178,300 Treasury bills for Northern Territory purposes, the actual increase during the year of the public debt of South Australia proper was approximately £127,000.

The death of MR. W. GIFFORD PALGRAVE, the British Minister at Montevideo, is announced. Mr. Palgrave, a son of the late Sir Francis Palgrave, was born in 1826. He was educated at the Charterhouse and at Trinity College, Oxford, where he took first-class honours in 1846. The following year he was appointed a second lieutenant in the 8th Bombay Native Infantry. After a short period of service he became connected with the Order of Jesuits, and in due course he was admitted to the priesthood. During his engagement with the Jesuits he lived in India till 1853, and after two years' residence at Rome he was sent to Syria and Palestine, where he was actively employed in the interests of the Order till 1860, during which time he acquired a thorough knowledge of Arabic. Mr. Palgrave was summoned to France in the summer of 1860 by Napoleon III. to give an account of the Syrian disturbances, and in the next year he returned to Syria charged with the task of exploring Central and Eastern Arabia. This he accomplished in the years 1862 and 1863. During his prolonged residence in the East, Mr. Palgrave acquired such a familiarity with the Arabs that he was looked upon as one of their sheikhs, and on several occasions acted as "Imam" and "Khutub" in their mosques. In 1865 Mr. Palgrave published some account of his wanderings in Central Arabia. Having returned to England, he was sent out by the English Government on special service for the release of the late Consul Cameron and the other prisoners from Abyssinia in July, 1865. He remained in Egypt by order till June, 1866. Subsequently he served as Consul at Trebizond, at St. Thomas and St. Croix, and at the Philippine Islands. In 1878 he became Consul-General to Bulgaria, was transferred to Bangkok in November, 1879, and was finally appointed Minister-Resident and Consul-General to the Republic of Uruguay in 1884. Mr. Palgrave, who was the author of several other works, was a member of the Royal Geographical and Royal Asiatic Societies.

THE COMMISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS.

The Hon. W. B. Rounsevell, the Commissioner of Public Works, is a native of South Australia, and the second son of the late Mr. W. Rounsevell, who established the coaching business now carried on by John Hill & Co. He was born in Adelaide in 1842, and was educated at St. Peter's College. He was elected for the Burra in 1875, which district he represented till when he was returned at Port Adelaide. When Mr. G. S. Fowler resigned his position as Treasurer in the Morgan Ministry in 1881 Mr. Rounsevell took his place. He was a prominent member of the Opposition to the Bray Government, and when John Colton formed his Administration in 1884 Mr. Rounsevell accepted the position of Treasurer. He retired in June, 1885, when Mr. Playford formed his second Government in August, 1890, he became Commissioner of Public Works, and subsequently Treasurer. As Commissioner of Public Works he moved the second reading of the Bill for the construction of the Happy Valley Waterworks. He was elected for the Burra District at the late elections.

Mr. Walter Rupert Reynell, the third South Australian Rhodes scholar, comes of a very ancient English family. The first of his ancestors on record was Sir Richard Reynell, of Pytney (or Petteney), in the county of Somerset, who flourished in the reigns of Henry II. and Richard I., and who, during the absence of King Richard in the Holy Land, had the custody of the Castles of Exeter and Lanncoston delivered into his hands in 1191. These castles he stoutly defended against John Earl of Moreton, the King's brother, who in his absence endeavored to usurp the sovereign power. Walter is the family name, and there have been many successive Walter Reynells during the last 800 years. The original estates of the family were in the counties of Cambridge, York, Warwick, Somerset, and Devon, and the Duchy of Cornwall.

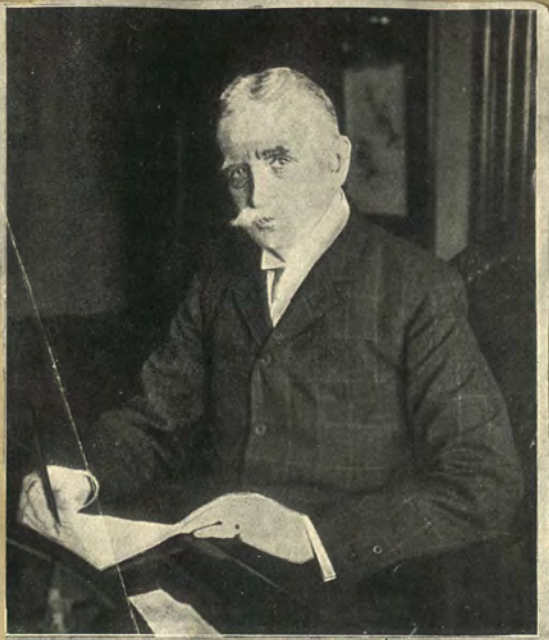

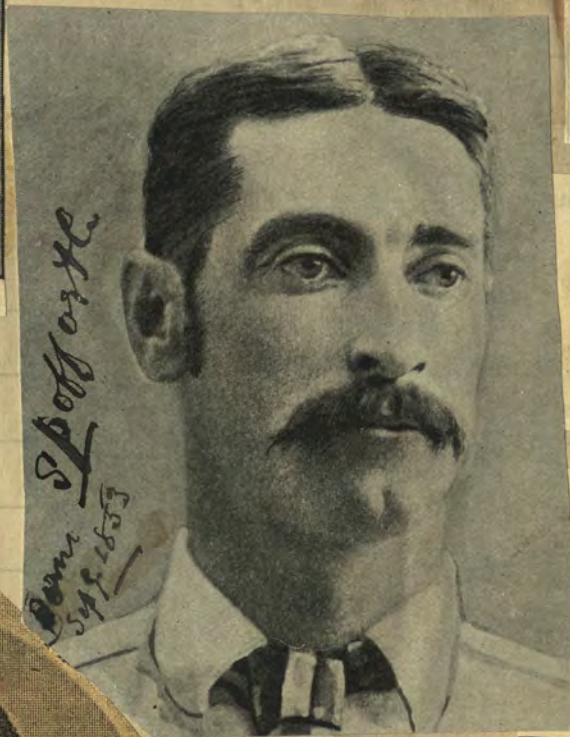

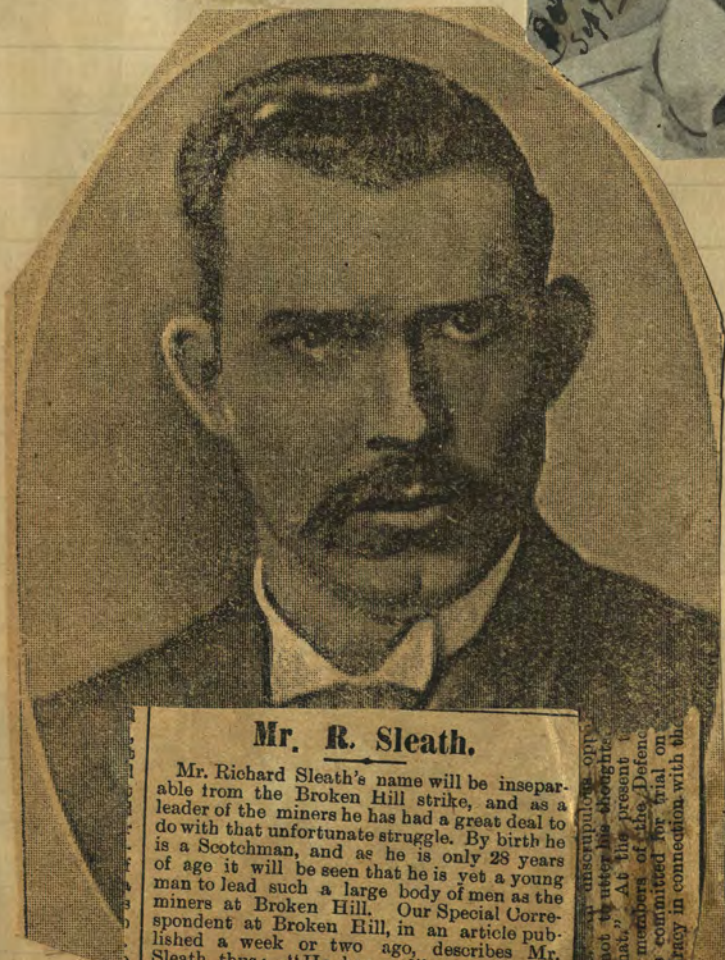

MISS C. H. SPENCE

Miss Catherine H. Spence, herewith depicted, is one of the foremost women in Australia to-day. She also is one of our keenest political economists, and has led an exceedingly busy life. Miss Spence's name is inseparably linked with that of South Australia in every walk of life.

Miss Spence was born at Melrose, Scotland, in 1825, and came to South Australia with her parents in 1839, her father, Mr. David Spence, solicitor, being Town Clerk of the first Corporation of Adelaide, and died in 1846. Miss Spence soon showed herself to be possessed of fine literary attainments, and in 1854 published her first book, 'Clare Morrison: A Tale of the S.A. Gold Fever.' This was followed by 'Tender and True,' 'Mr. Hogarth's Will,' 'The Author's Daughter,' 'Gathered In,' and in London anonymously, 'An Agnostic's Progress,' written from a theistic point of view. THE CHIEF SECRETARY. 1899

The Hon. John Lancelot Stirling, the Chief Secretary, is a native of South Australia, being the second son of the late Hon. Edward Stirling, one of the four nominated non-official members of the Legislative Council in 1855-6 when the Constitution Act was passed, who continued to sit in the Upper House till 1865. Born at "The Lodge," Strathalbyn, in 1849, Mr. Stirling entered St. Peter's College, Adelaide, and afterwards went to Trinity College, Cambridge, where he graduated B.A. and LL.B., in 1871, being admitted to the Bar at the Inner Temple in the following year. He was elected, in 1881, with Mr. A. H. Landseer, M.P., to represent the Mount Barker District in the House of Assembly. At the general elections of 1884 he was returned at the head of the poll for the same district, and sat for another three years. Defeated for Mount Barker in 1887 by his old colleague (Mr. Landseer) and the Hon. Dr. Cockburn, he was out of the House until May, 1888. The electors of Gumeracha selected him from several candidates to supply the vacancy in the Assembly caused through the death of Sir R. D. Ross. This constituency Mr. Stirling represented through the Parliament; but he was defeated in the general elections of 1890. The next year he was returned to the Legislative Council for the Southern District. In 1892-3 he was Chairman of Committees, and since then he has been Leader of the Opposition in the Council.



THE PREMIER-TREASURER.

Mr. V. L. Solomon, the head of the new administration, was appointed Leader of the Opposition this year. He is a read and effective Parliamentary debater, and one of the most popular members of the House. He is a son of the late Hon. Judah Moss Solomon, and was born in Waymouth-street, Adelaide, in May, 1852. He was educated at the late Hon. J. I. Young's school and at the Scotch College, Melbourne. He accompanied a prospecting party to the Northern Territory, but at the end of a twelvemonth returned to Adelaide and shortly afterwards made another trip to the Territory, and settled at Palmerston. For many years he carried on business as a merchant, and conducted the "Northern Territory Times and Gazette." In April, 1890, the Northern Territory voted for the first time as a separate constituency, and Mr. Solomon was returned as one of the representatives, having for his colleague the Hon. J. L. Parsons. He has since held office as a Minister of the Crown, and he was Whip of the second Playford and the second Downer Administrations.

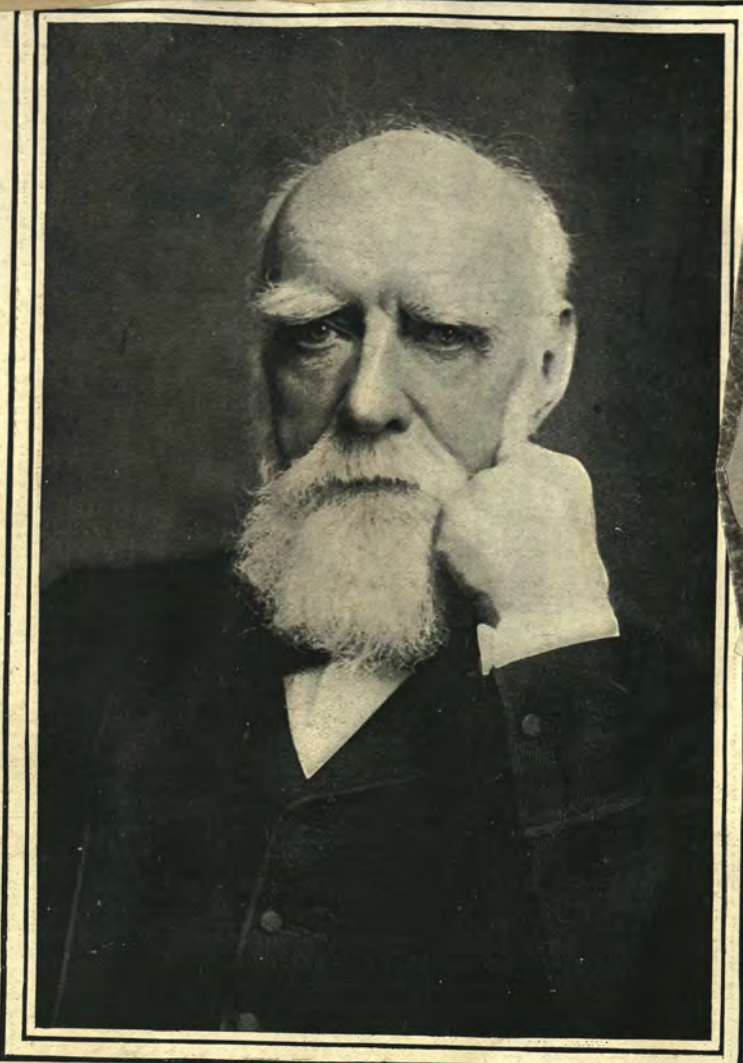

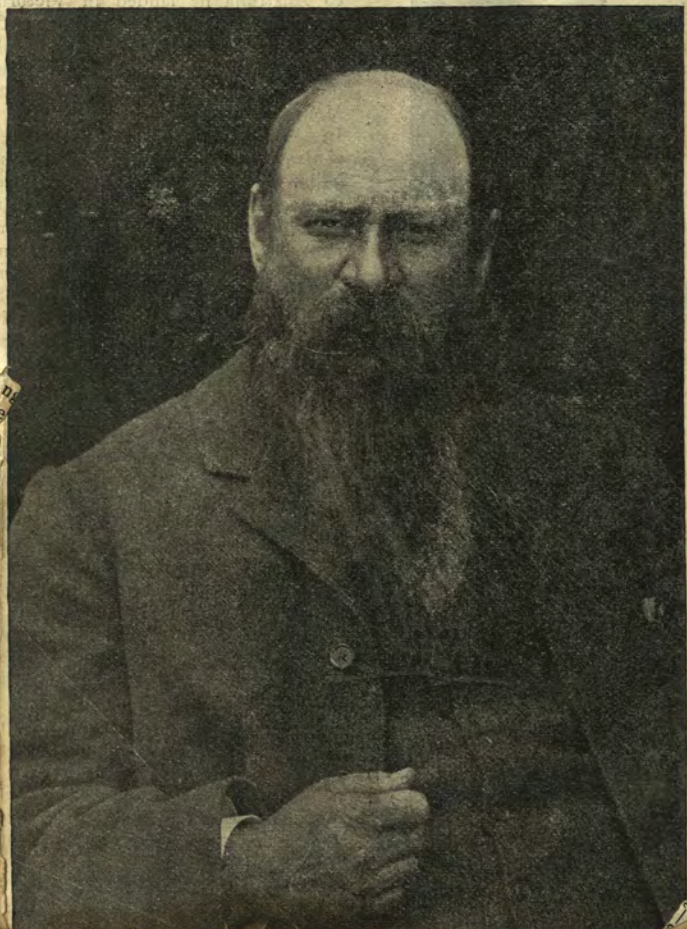

DANGERS OF SOCIALISM

'ATHEISM, THEFT, AND IMMORALITY'

A NOVEL CAMPAIGN

LONDON, October 9.

At the end of last month as a result of a by-election for the Kirkdale Division of Liverpool, Mr. Charles McArthur (Unionist) was returned to the House of Commons with a majority of 670 votes over Mr. John Hill, the Labour candidate. The Liberal executive declined to officially support Mr. Hill's candidature owing to his extreme socialistic views, but it passed a resolution expressing the hope that Liberal electors would vote for him.

Appropos of this election the Duke of Rutland strongly urges Unionists to actively fight socialism, which he describes as the vilest of political creeds. "The leaders," he says, "ought to take off the gloves and show the hopeless dangers awaiting a country which countenances its loathsome objects of undiluted atheism, theft, and immorality." When Englishmen recognise, adds the Duke, that the Liberals are only kept in power by a party of Socialists, they will make a clearance of Messrs. Grayson and Keir Hardie's National Union.

The Conservative associations are equipping 20 vans to accommodate peripatetic trade union speakers who have arranged to address working men in the streets and at the mill gates, and distribute literature calculated to counteract the advance of socialism.

The Duke of Rutland, who succeeded to the title on the death of his father last year, is 57 years of age, and was principal private secretary to the late Marquis of Salisbury for three years. From 1888-1895 he represented the Melton division of Leicestershire in the House of Commons. He owns about 62,000 acres.

RULING SURNAME IN THE UNITED KINGDOM.

Analysing the surnames in Ireland and comparing them with those in England and Scotland, Sir Robert E. Matheson, LL.D., Registrar-General for Ireland, makes some very interesting discoveries in a special report just issued by his Majesty's Stationery Office, Dublin.

From the births indexes of 1853 Sir Robert found that in England, with an estimated population of 18,404,421, the most common surnames were:

A doctor at the Royal College of Surgeons decided to perform an operation, and what was his astonishment to find that the extraction did not stop at six nails. He persevered with the forceps, and eventually removed 42 cast iron garden nails, 13 in., 93 brass and tin tacks from 1/4 to 1 in., 12 large nails, some brass-headed, three collar-studs, a safety pin, and a sewing needle. The day after the operation three more garden nails were vomited and two tin-tacks. The third day following a feather, and within a month 30 other garden nails, eight tacks, a needle, and a J pen. This story is seriously vouched for, and at the Royal College of Surgeons may be seen a glass case containing the 200 articles which the girl had "bolted." Those who cannot swallow the story, therefore, had better go and see for themselves the articles which the girl swallowed.

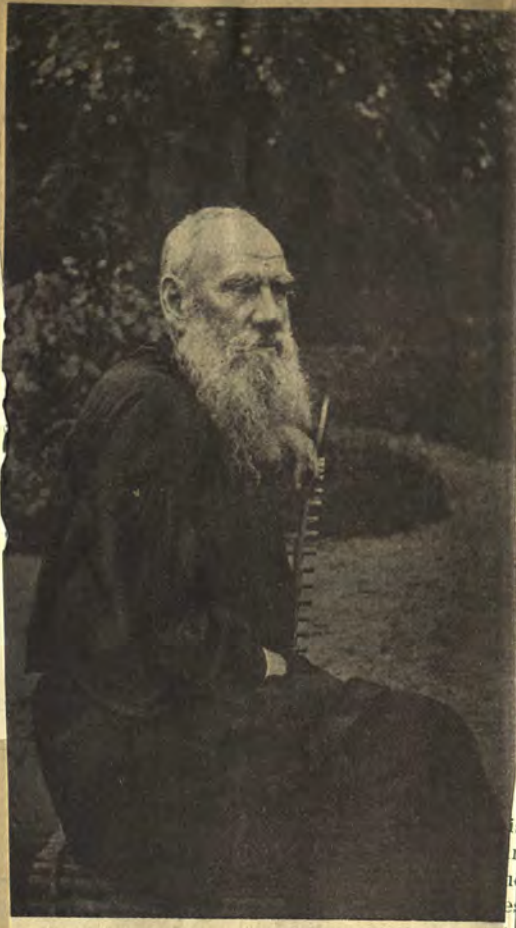

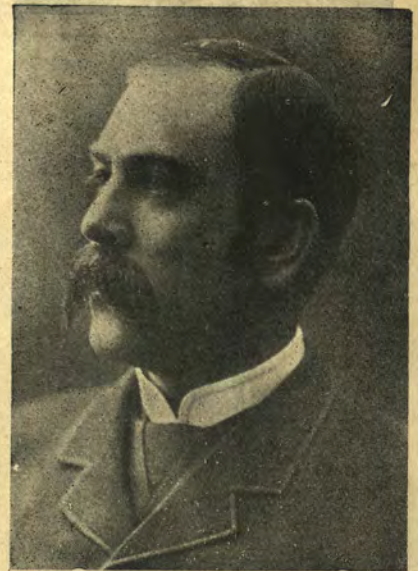

**DEATH OF MR. ANDREW
TENNANT.**

**A PROMINENT PASTO-
RALIST.**

After an illness which had extended over several weeks Mr. Andrew Tennant died at Glenelg at a quarter to 2 this afternoon, and there thus has passed away one of the few remaining links with the very early days of South Australia, and one of the most prominent pastoralists in the State.

Mr. Tennant was born in Dumfriesshire in 1835. His father, Mr. John Tennant, was one of the earliest pioneers of South Australia, arriving here in 1838, when Andrew was only three years old. Pastoral operations were commenced immediately on arrival, at Dry Creek. Carefully husbanding his stock Mr. Tennant, sen., extended his operations, and acquired properties at Chain of Ponds, Lyndoch Valley, and the Burra, the advent of the copper mines having caused an exodus to that part of the State. Subsequently the adventurous Scot determined to establish a station at Port Lincoln, and in travelling his flocks and cattle to that district met with dangers and difficulties that thoroughly tested the courage and persistency of the energetic pathfinders. But the venture was crowned with ultimate success, and the Tennants settled down for some years at Tallala Station, 15 miles from Port Lincoln. It was under such stirring conditions that young Andrew grew up. At 18 years of age he took sheep further west, on the shores of Lake Newland, near to Port Elliston, taking possession of a property formerly owned by Mr. Pinkerton, but which had been devastated by the ravages of the blacks. Andrew Tennant successfully held his own, and afterwards became the owner of stations at Coffin Bay, Wedge Bay, and Streaky Bay.

From 1866 until his death the name of Mr. Andrew Tennant was associated with the leasing or purchase of large tracts of country. The Udulya Station at Alice Springs carried 11,000 head of cattle, and other stations, of which he was the owner, such as Willipa, Moolooloo, and Yardea, were equally imposing in their vast extent. The late Mr. Tennant was the owner of considerable freehold property in the city, as well as being intimately identified with its commercial interests. He was one of the first directors of the Adelaide Steamship Company, and served on several other directorates.

From 1881 to 1887 Mr. Tennant represented the Flinders District in the House of Assembly, and in 1898 was returned as member of the Northern District in the Legislative Council, and he represented it for some years. The Pastoral Commission which sat during 1897-8 found the late Mr. Tennant one of its ablest members, and his valued treasury of pastoral knowledge was freely placed at the disposal of the commission. When in Parliament Mr. Tennant was a forcible, if not prolific speaker, chiefly on subjects relating to the settlement of the wide spaces in the country. The deceased was also a member of the Masonic fraternity.

Mr. Tennant has left three sons—Mr. John Tennant, of Princess Royal Station; Mr. W. Tennant, of Point Lowly Station, Port Augusta West; and Mr. Fred Tennant, solicitor, of Adelaide—and three daughters—Mrs. W. T. Mortlock, Mr. Anstruther Thompson-Gray, and Mrs. R. M. Hawker.

The funeral will take place on Monday.

**THE LOSS OF THE "TITANIC."
COST OF THE INQUIRY.**

A return was issued yesterday—the first anniversary of the loss of the *Titanic*—showing the expenses incurred by the Board of Trade and other Government Departments in connection with the inquiry into the loss of the vessel. The total expense was £20,549 5s. 10d., made up as follows: (1) Paid by the Board of Trade, £16,331 16s. 6d.; (2) paid by the Treasury from the miscellaneous expenses vote, £3,282 16s. 4d.; and (3) charges for stationery and printing, £934 13s. The question as to the fees of counsel and certain other points has already been before Parliament, but some of the items as now set out in the return may be given.

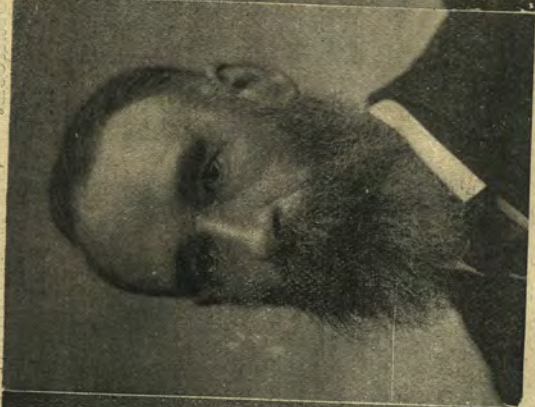

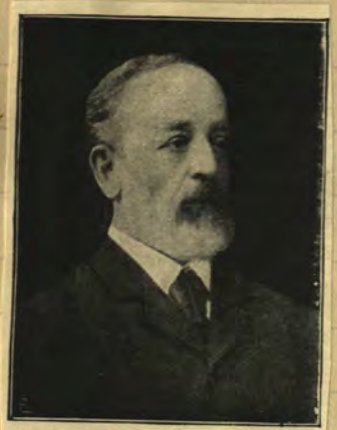

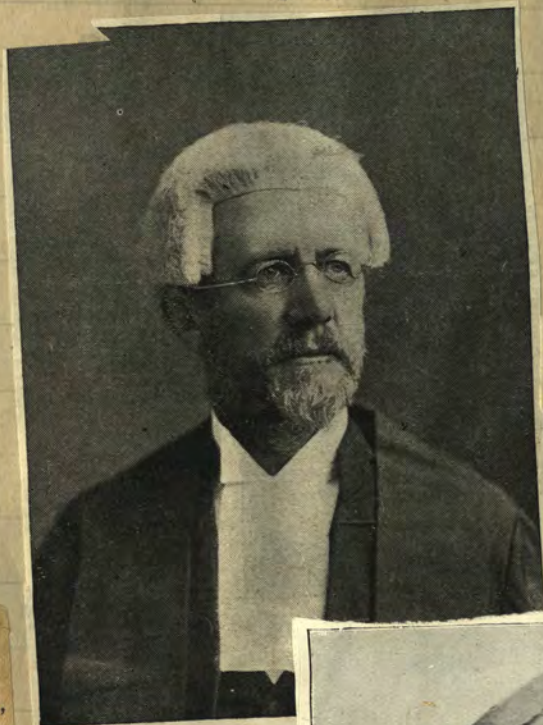

A GREAT WALKER. An Eight Hours' Stroll.

(From our Special Correspondent.)

London, June 16, 1905.
"Come!" Let us take a walk down Fleet-street," but not at the pace that Mr. J. Butler took his 50-mile stroll round and round the Putney Velodrome last Monday, if you please. It is all very well, once in a way, to do a mile in under 10 minutes en route to the railway-station as you go to business in the morning, but to keep up that gait for 50 miles on end is beyond the ability of, I should say, about 999,999 people out of every million. Butler is the millionth man, and he kept up a better pace than 9½ minutes per mile for 50 miles at the hair-dressers' sports on Whit Monday, lowering every path record from 21 miles onward—not by seconds, but by minutes—and completing the full 50 miles in 7 hours 52 min. 27 sec., against the previous record of 7 hours 57 min. 38 sec., and then, just to show that he was not "done up" did an extra 1,190 yards before the eighth hour was called. It was a wonderful performance, and some of his intermediate times may interest Adelaide athletes generally and your pedestrians in particular:—

The previous record from 14 to 30 miles was held by Butler, and those from 30 to 50 by F. B. Thompson. Butler en route also beat his own four hours' walk figures of 26 miles 500 yards, for in 4 hours 25 sec. he covered 27 miles on Monday, and he beat F. B. Thompson's 8-hours' record by 753 yards.

This emblematic figure well survey;

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The tomb—for it is a tomb and not a
"monumental marble"—which Mr. Jacob
Epstein has carved for the sepulchre of Oscar
Wilde in the cemetery of Père La Chaise, is
now completed. Timid visitors who know
much or little about sculpture have been pop-
ping in and out of Mr. Epstein's studio in
Cheyne Walk during the past week, and have
been retiring again in ecstasy or bewilder-
ment, according to their temperament or
their preconceived ideas of mausoleums and
tombstones. For undoubtedly Mr. Epstein's
notions of mortuary memorials are unconven-
tional and quite likely to shock people who
associate Gothic art so closely with religious
ceremonial that a Pagan or Archaic formula
becomes an offence when applied to the com-
memoration of the dead.

So it is certain that whatever virtues Mr.
Epstein's art may possess, it cannot be popu-
lar, and one was both surprised and amused
to notice a table of Press cuttings in a corner
of the studio, a delightful reminder that even
so isolated a genius as Mr. Epstein was still
susceptible to public opinion, expressed in the
most vulgar and common of all ways. Here
he shows himself an artist of the twentieth
century, and not, as one might have sus-
pected, an Assyrian or Egyptian Little Master
newly unearthed by Dr. Flinders Petrie. One
makes no charge of affectation against the
archaism of Mr. Epstein, but this quite
modern and very human weakness is worth
noting.

A Sculptor in Revolt.

For Mr. Epstein is not only a real sculptor
—a carver, not a modeller—but he is also a
Sculptor in Revolt, who is in deadly conflict
with the ideas of current sculpture, and who
believes that it is on the wrong tack
altogether. And one would be bold in deny-
ing that he may be right. Imitation of
Nature, either in bronze or marble, becomes
mere futility and ape-work unless it be illu-
minated by a plastic idea, not only closely
associated with and deriving all its beauty
from the medium in which it is worked, but
suggested by it. As the painter's idea lies, not
in literary suggestion or imitation, but in the
perfection of the paint, so the carver's idea
must be born in the marble and spring
directly from it. It is obvious that Mr.
Epstein did not propose to be either a literary
or a moral critic of Oscar Wilde. This brood-
ing, winged figure, born long ago in primi-
tive passions, complex and yet incomplete, is
a child of the marble, and is not an enlarged
copy by some other hand of a highly-finished
plaster model. It has been created in
anguish under the driving obsession of an
idea. The hand of the sculptor has groped
in the block of marble impelled to the ex-
pression, without words or definitions, of the
haunting tragedy of a great career. How
you are to apply this figure to the facts of
Oscar Wilde's life—to his work or his char-
acter—is not a question that arises. You
might as well seek for the character of the
departed hero in the Funeral March. This is
only Mr. Epstein's commentary, serious and
profound, unobscured by conventional
formulas, and inspired by an acute necessity
for utterance. "Go and see it at once," is
my urgent advice to all who are interested
in sculpture, and think of it, if you can, on a
hill top in Père La Chaise, dominating all
those tawdry memorials of the easily-for-
gotten dead.
