Copy of instructions given to John Brown
master of the Prince Victor to procure Native
Labourers on this voyage.

Your instructions with regard to procuring Native
Labourers are, to proceed from this Island to Atiu
and thence or from other Islands in the Cook's
group engage, to be conveyed to Malden to be
employed in collecting and shipping Guano,
not more than 30 men. On terms as before viz;
for a period of from one or two years dating
from time of arrival at Malden. Wages at the
rate of (2d) Two pounds per month during the
time they are employed, with eatine as per
scale. One month's wages to be paid in advance
to each labourer before departing. At the
expiry of the term of agreement all to be
returned to their respective former place of
abode. Wages to be paid in cash or Trade
at their option before leaving Malden.

each set of men from their respective homes
and reads to them eveyng service
daily. A Doctor is always kept on
the Island. Those who are incapable
of performing their duties from ill
health are sent home on the first
opportunity.

MALDEN ISLAND

In 1873 Greci Sunnari the Subiector General of Victoria pointed out that in his opinion (as he had pointed out in a previous case) "a permit or license can only apply to the conveyance of passengers from one place to another" whereas the application made by Greci Sunnari and Co. was for their conveyance from various islands and therefore not within the Act.

By letter dated 12.6.74 G.S. ad c., re their application for the longue Ancestral to carry native laborers from Rotorua, Hawke or Matros to Holden "the while from me or a partner from each as they could be engaged", which had been construed as a revenue Commission and thus contrary to the principles of the Kidnapping Act of 1872, pointed out that to restrict (as had been done) the license to one island only (in this instance Hawke) would cause great inconvenience and loss "as there is invariably a long negotiation with the Chiefs as to the payment of the pay the men are to give them for their permission to engage for the service. If it were known that the ship was only allowed to take men from the Island the license was issued for, the demands of the Chiefs upon the men would be so exorbitant that they would not accept service, and in such case the Captain must either proceed to Holden Island without laborers or else return to Melbourne for a license to another Island where the same disappointment might be repeated, and the operators on Holden Island thus suddenly brought to a standstill and ships arriving there destined to load would subject us to heavy damage".

The term of agreement with the natives is for one year, the wages they receive £ 2 per month during the time they are employed on the Island with a liberal allowance of food and a free passage both ways.

We have had no difficulty thus far in procuring all the labor we required and until the application of the Act in its present interpretation, our practice was to get a few men from each of the Islands in Cooks Group from time to time instead of all from one Island and by this means a better control has been maintained and a spirit of rivalry engendered between the different sets of men in performing their work.

The natives of the Cook Group are regarded as the same race and speak the same language and many of the men on different Islands are known to each other and frequently pass from one to another in their canoes.

Under these circumstances and in consideration of the fact that the men are taken on board from one destination by us as Tenants of the Crown only to be employed on Noddon Island of which place we are the sole occupiers, and as each set of men is accompanied by a Native Missionary who can generally speak a little English and whose duties are to act as head man and read their daily religious service there would be no difficulty in the way of any officer of Her Majesty's Navy on visiting Noddon ascertaining from the missionaries the condition of the men and when and how engaged."

Works that as Act and to (not part read) to subject him

"... there would be no difficulty in proceeding on application of men if left to their own desires for the duly appropriate treatment and liberal wages they receive. No men have ever been employed on Holden Island except of their own free will, ad under written agreement ..." Island labourers essential to operation let and say for said island required no. of men can be obtained.

"We venture to suggest that as Treaty of the Involvement our case is exceptional, and was not foreseen or provided for in the Act..."

"Our dealings with the natives of the Islands will bear the strictest scrutiny and it has ever been and will be our practice to treat them with the utmost consideration and kindness and any Board or material guarantee to this intent will be given if required".

Attorney General observed by Memorandum of 13.6.74 to H.E. that license issued on Dec, 1873 was for carriage of not more than 30 labourers from Rarotonga to Holden and ditto back but license now applied for is for same no. from Raro, Cooki or Matoato to Holden, the rule to be taken from one a letter from Cook as follows may be able to enlarge them, and also to recover 34 from Holden to Atiu.

Advice tendered in case of W. W. Ladd & Co. should therefore apply.

Statute 35 & 36 Vict. c. 19 affers ad consideration of Preamble necessary and also particular words used in Schedule 3. Preamble shows object of act to admit of one kind of inspector or supervisor over vessels engaged for protection of outlay and punishment of offenders & therefore essential that port of departure of vessel with passengers & port of destination should appear in a definite form or license "with a view to enabling inquiries to be made as to the character of the trade in which vessels may be engaged". If license so large as to cover number of islands difficulty of inspector or supervisor will be increased and object of Statute defeated.

In preamble & Schedule B include that license must be of a more restricted character than sought for. Voyage means "the passage of a ship upon the sea from one port to another" and license shd not be converted into a running commission. More ready to s.o.s. as the administration of the Act is a local matter [ad possibly advice of his legal advisers cochne]

In 1874 & early 1875 licenses seen to have been issued only to and from one island but ~~from~~ the license issued to the Delmuid on 4.8.75 is to carry not more than 40 laborers "from Cork Islands to Haldon Island" & return 37 to Antofagasta, and this was the practice thereafter.

What seems to have happened is that the Gov. proceeded to grant the Licences in the old form without referring them to the A.-G., for on or 10.2.76 when the license applied for in respect of the San Diego's voyage was again referred to the A.-G. by ^{S.F.} [Early Gov.] Bowen he wrote:-

"During Sir William Stowell's term of office cases of this kind were not referred for my advice and I believe Sir William Stowell dealt with such cases without advice. I shall be glad of course to continue the practice which formerly obtained if so desired at the same time as this is an Imperial matter I think Sir William Stowell was justified in the course he took". . . Keford (?)
A.-G. 14.2.76.

Bowen said that he would prefer to receive advice as before since there are Colonial and legal questions involved and the A.-G. therefor insisted that:-

"Section 10 of the Imperial Statute 38 & 39 Vict C 51 indeed necessary a slight alteration in the form" ^{of the law}, and Q.S. also accordingly made out a new one, which read "Where it is enacted under the Pacific Islanders' Protection Acts of 1872 and 1875" instead of just "Act of 1875". Q.S. also pointed out that the 1872 Act appeared to have relevance only to natives employed on vessels employed as vessels and not to those being carried.

Sir,

Adverting to my dispatch No. 14 of the 25th of March on the subject of certain applications which you had received for leases to occupy certain Islands supposed to contain Guano I enclose for your information the copy of two Reports which I have received from the Law offices of the Crown as to the extent of your jurisdiction over the Islands in the sea adjacent to Queensland.

It appears clear from these opinions that the Islands now occupied for by D^r Crowther which are specified in an Indenture signed by him & sent home through the Governor of Tasmania, all islands which not having been occupied by British subjects prior to the date of Sir Will^m Denison's Commission do not fall within the limits of any Australian Government and, this being the case I have thought it best (with a single exception not worth noticing) to secure uniformity of dealing in such cases by

placing the whole of the agreements respecting
Guans Islands within the Australian Seas
& not within the limits of my Colonial Government
in the hands of the present Governor of N.S.W.
to whom it will be necessary that all
applications for the occupation of such
islands should hereafter be made.

By the Australian Seas I mean those
Seas which under instructions from the Lords
of the Admiralty are comprised in the
"Australian Station" which is bounded as follows:-

To the North by the 10th parallel of South
Latitude, to the East by the 170th Meridian
of West Longitude, to the South by the Antarctic
Circle, to the West by the 70th Meridian of
East Longitude.

My Lord Duke.

We are honoured with Y. C.'s command, signified in Sir Frederick Rogers' letter of 1st Ap. ultmo., stating that he was desired by Y. C. to transmit to us, for our joint consideration the annexed copy of a dispatch from the Govr. of Queensland respecting the extent of his jurisdiction over the Islands in the seas adjacent to that Colony.

Sir F. Rogers was also pleased to state that by Royal Letters Patent dated 8.1.55 the Colony of N.S.W. was defined as 'comprising with certain exceptions, which do not affect the present question, "all that portion of our Territory of Australia or New Holland lying between the 129th & 151st degrees of E. Long. & Northward of the 40th degree of S. Lat. including all the Islands adjacent in the Pacific Ocean within the long. & lat. aforesaid."

That these Letters Patent (being the Commission of Genl Sir W. Denison) remained generally in force till the appointment of his successor in 1855, but in the meantime, that is to say, on the 6.6.55. other Letters Patent were issued

separating the Colony of N.S.W. & extending into the Colony of Queensland "so much of the Territory thereof" (of N.S.W.) "as lies to the N of a line commencing on the Sea Coast at Point Danger, in Lat. about $28^{\circ} 8' S.$ (and running W. by a course described in the said Letters Patent to the 141^{st} Meridian of E. Long) "together with all & every the adjacent islands their members & appurtenances in the Pacific Ocean.

That by subsequent Letters Patent, dated 3. 3. 62. the W. Boundary of Queensland was extended from the 141^{st} to the 138^{th} Meridian of E. Long. "together with all & every the adjacent Islands their members & appurtenances in the Gulf of Carpentaria".

Sir F. Rogers was pleased to annex Extracts of these several Letters Patent & further stated that we would not fail to observe that the original jurisdiction of the Government of N.S.W. was not bounded to the N by a parallel of Lat. & that in that direction "adjacency" in the usual sense of the word is the only quality capable of bringing an Island within that jurisdiction. but that the Letters Patent of 1850 might be alleged to furnish definition

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of "adjacency" to the E. of New Holland + to include within that term all Islands to the W. of the 154th meridian of E. long.

That under these circumstances, H. G. wished to be informed what instructions should be given to the Gov. of Queensland with regard to the extent of his jurisdiction.

That the question is of some practical importance as it would appear that various Islands alleged to contain Guano lie about + are on both sides of the 154th meridian.

.... we have taken this matter into our consideration + have done so Report:

That, in our opinion, the present jurisdiction of the Gov. of Q. includes all Islands in the Pac. Ocean, & in the Gulf of Cap + Torres Straits, E of the 138th meridian of E. long, + N. of an imaginary line drawn from E. to W. through Point Danger, which were originally included in the Colony of N.S.W as defined in the letters Pat. granted to Sir W. Denison on the 8.9.55.

And we are of opinion, that all the Islands in the Pacific Ocean, lying N. of the 140th

Parallel of S. lat., between the E. coast of Aust. (as far as Torres Straits) & the 15th Meridian of E. Long., & also all the Islands in the Gulf of Carpentaria, & such (if any there be) of the Islands in Torres Straits as might from their position, properly to be regarded as dependencies of the mainland of Australia; were originally included in the Colony of N.S.W. as defined in the Letters Patent of 2.9.35.

Prima facie, all Islands in Torres Straits within three miles of the mainland of Aust., or within 3 miles from any other Island. Those in British occupation, or in the British territorial waters, would be dependencies of Aust.: & no Islands beyond that distance, & not de facto occupied by Great Britain would possess that character.

We are of opinion, that no Island lying E. of the 154th meridian of E. Long., or otherwise beyond the limits above mentioned, can be regarded as within the jurisdiction of the Governor of Queensland.

It is hardly necessary to add, that, although the definition of the Colony under the Letters Patent extends E. to the 154th meridian of E. Long., it would be requisite, in order to give a title to Great Britain, as against a claim by any other country, to any Island within those limits, lying more than 3 miles from any territory in the actual occupation

of Great Britain (& not included within any Bays or indentations of the British Coasts), that such Island should be actually taken possession of, or in some manner occupied, by His country.

G. to acknowledge the receipt of the report (bearing date the 26th ult.) with which we had favored Y. G. respecting the jurisdiction of the Legislature of Queensland over Islands in the Aust Seas.

And that Y. G. understood from that letter that the jurisdiction of Queensland extends, (within certain limits as to N. & S.) to all Islands lying between the 138th + 154th degrees of E. Long., which were at the date of Sir W. Denison's Commission in the de facto occupation of Great Britain, or

But that Y.G. would be glad to be informed whether an Island lying within the above limits but not occupied by Great Britain at the date of Sir W. Denison's Commission, & therefore not then within the jurisdiction of N.S.W., would fall within the jurisdiction of N.S.W. or Queensland (as the case may be) if now occupied by British Subjects under British Authority.

Sir Frederick Rogers was also pleased to state that he was directed by Y.G. to ask this question because the case appears likely to arise.

In obedience to Y.G.'s commands we have taken this matter into our consideration & have the honor to Report.

That our Report, of the 26th Ult., has been correctly understood by Y.G., & that, in the event of any island lying within the specified limits, which did not belong to Great Britain at the date of Sir W. Denison's Commission, being now, or having been for the first time after that date, occupied by British Subjects under British Authority, such islands would not, in our opinion, fall within the jurisdiction of N.S.W. or of Queensland, without further letters Patent from Her Majesty, annexing the same thereto.

Another very old colonist has passed away.
M^r Theodosius John Sumner, the senior partner in the well-known & old established firm of Geice, Sumner & Co., having died at his residence, Stoney Park, Beaumaris, at an early hour yesterday morning. The deceased gentleman had been for the last two years confined to his bed, but his naturally fine constitution withstood all attacks of disease, & until recently he was, though an invalid, in fair health. A few weeks ago, however, his state became such as to indicate to his medical attendants, D^r James & D^r Charles Ryan, that he would not live much longer. For some 3 weeks his death was expected to take place any day, but he rallied wonderfully several times. During last week, however, he gradually sank, & ultimately peacefully breathed his last at a quarter past twelve on Sunday morning. M^r Sumner was born in 1820 & was 63 years old at the time of his death. By birth he was an Englishman, but he had been a resident in Melbourne for upwards of 40 years. He came originally to Tasmania, but after remaining there for a brief period came over to Victoria, & went into partnership with the late M^r Richard Geice, from whose original firm of Geice & Geice the present firms of Geice, Sumner & Co. & Connell, Hogarth & Co. have developed, & prospered.

with the growth of the city & the Colony. W⁸ Summer took great interest in agricultural affairs, & many years ago became the owner of a property near Snapper Point. On this place, known as Anniesleigh, he spent large sums of money in transforming a wilderness into a model farm. The quality of the land was, however, found to be such that cropping would not pay, & the farm has since been devoted to grazing purposes. At his residence at Bemwick W⁸ Summer engaged in farming to a limited extent. He imported some of the first Alderney cattle which came to this colony, & up to the time of his death took the greatest pride in the possession of the purest strain in the colony of these valuable dairy cattle. He also imported livestock of all descriptions for the farm, & was noted for having none but the best examples of any breed he might fancy. W⁸ Summer was one of the Trustees of the National Agricultural Society of Victoria, & he was also for many years one of the commissioners of the Savings Bank in Victoria. He took no active part in politics until 1873, when on the retirement of W⁸ Archibald Michie from the Legislative Council he contested the

Central Province with the late Mr H. K. Smith, whom he defeated. Even as a member Mr. Sumner never threw himself into party warfare, but always maintained a quiet, unobtrusive demeanor. Owing to failing health he did not seek re-election when the seat became vacant. In private life the gentleman was generally liked, being unswearingly upright + straight forward in all his dealings, & of a genial & kind-hearted temperament. He leaves a widow & family of one son & several daughters, one of whom is married to Mr. James Price, & another to Dr. Charles Ryom. Mr. Sumner's remains will be interred in the Melbourne General Cemetery at 3 o'clock this afternoon.

The late Mr R. Grice.

The subject of our sketch was a gentleman, who, though occupied entirely in business pursuits, & consequently but little before the public, was universally esteemed both on account of his high standard of honor & his general & unobtrusive charity. Mr Grice was born at Booth, in Cumberland, in 1813, & came to the colony in 1839, when he entered upon pastoral pursuits, forming a station at Mount Alexander in 1840. At that time the blacks were very troublesome, & on a neighbouring station killed a gentleman named Adler. The same tribe attacked Mr Grice & speared him in 3 places, surrounding him with the intention of murdering him. He, however, managed to reach his hut & perceived his gun, when the blacks dispersed. He came to town for medical attention & then entered into business with Mr Heape, as merchants. The partnership was carried on till 1853, when Mr Heape retired, & the firm of Grice, Sumner & Co. was formed. Mr G. visited England in 1846, & returned to the colony in 1847. For the last 22 years he has resided at his country residence at Mornington, & lived a very quiet life, taking little or no interest in public affairs. The only position held by him was director of the Union Bank. He died etc. PTO

Death of R. Grice - 1882

Mr R. Grice, the head of the well known mercantile house of Grice, Sumner and Co., died at his residence, Victoria Parade, on Saturday morning. Mr Grice, who was 69 years of age at the time of his death, arrived in the colony many years ago, and had, within the past few years, entirely devoted his attention to business, in which he was more than usually successful, soon taking any prominent part in politics. Mr Grice always evinced a particular interest in church matters, and was a generous benefactor to the Church of England, to which he belonged. He leaves a grown up family of three sons and two daughters, one of the latter having recently married Mr. J. A. Levey, of the Crown Lands department.

All 4 miles in circumference & has now been naked and robbled to the rest of £100 £ a. for 10 years let to give time to explore deposits & ascertain if guano will shipping & if safe anchorage ask that rent for 1st year be £20 & that they have the option to cancel lease at end of 1st year without further payment if island cannot be profitably worked.

On 27.10.75 G.S. & Co. note that the Don Diego (Capt. Francis) was sent to explore Surprise and the Huon Gulf with Sewald (a Chemist) and Mr. Brunton, & took possession in name of H.M. by hoisting a national flag, by reason of anchorage and dangerous navigation due to reefs surrounding stay stayed a few hours. Report not encouraging but could request opportunity for further investigation

I have the honour to forward herewith the copy of a letter addressed to me by Mr Benjamin Barnard Nicholson, a merchant of Melbourne stating the circumstances under which he is desirous of obtaining a lease of an Island known as Independence or Malden Island but which being situated within the Antarctic Circle is not included in the limits to which jurisdiction is granted to the Governor of New South Wales as notified by the Duke of Newcastle's Despatch to me of the 27th July last '70.

proposals and that the Report of a competent
Chemist upon the specimens of Guano which
were brought to Melbourne by the Master

the belief that the deposit possesses
considerable agricultural value.

Sir,

I have the honor to inform you of the existence of an Island in the South Pacific on which Guano has been deposited in considerable quantities. It is situated in or about 6° 45' South Latitude and 160° 40' West Longitude. The Island is not marked on the Charts or distinguished by any name. It is close to the Island named Dudson which is placed on some of the recent charts. The Island in question is not so large as Malden Island nor are the deposits of such extent. It is without inhabitants, quite barren and not yet taken up by any recognised state or foreign power.

As will be seen from the position given above it is only two degrees distant from Malden Island. I have instructed the Captain of a Vessel recently despatched by me, to take possession in the name of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, to name it Victoria Island and to leave a party of men in possession.

Having taken these steps I have now the honor to request a recognition of the act of taking possession, and a license to remove Guano therefrom, on the same terms as are contained in the license for Malden Island.

As the successful carrying out of these enterprises would give a revenue to your Government, and confer a great benefit upon Agriculturists by supplying phosphorus in the most available form.

I most respectfully hope therefore I may be favored with the protection of a license.

I have the honor to submit to your Excellency that having heard of the existence of Guano Islands in the Southern Pacific Ocean I was induced to fit out the Barque "Benjamin Beape" to go on a voyage of discovery. - after a search of some months the Captain landed on an Island situated $4^{\circ} 0' 45''$ degrees South latitude and $154^{\circ} 22'$ degrees West longitude and known as Independence or Malden Island. there he found Guano deposited in considerable quantities sufficient he thinks to pay the cost of working : but to make it available a large outlay would be necessary in erecting buildings for the labourers employed in making a tram way, Wharf &c for the purpose of shipping it. Before venturing upon such an expenditure I am desirous of obtaining a lease for a term of years, to secure some prospect of repayment. I am not aware if your Excellency has the power of granting such a lease and what I would respectfully ask is that if you have not the power you would be good enough to forward my application to His Majestys Government recommending it for favorable consideration.

Your Excellency will be aware that leases have already been granted for Bird Island Lady Isabella Percy Island, and others. Further that a proclamation was lately issued by the Governor of New South Wales offering to grant leases of Guano Islands

Guano Islands within the following boundaries vizt.
"On the North by the tenth Parallel of south latitude
on the East by the 170° meridian of West longitude.
on the South by the Antarctic circle and on the West
by the seventy fifth meridian of East longitude."

Independence or Malden Island as will be seen
by reference to the position given above is not included
within those degrees, but that I apprehend would
form no objection to the granting of such a lease
as is offered for those that are, the Island in
question being only a few degrees further North
I may mention that I have taken possession of
the Island which is otherwise uninhabited and
wholly a Guano Island in the name of Her
Majesty Queen Victoria and require a lease for
no other purpose than that of removing the Guano
thereon, also that several Islands in that direction
have been taken possession of and are being worked
by an American Company known as the New York
Guano Company who are likely to take possession
of all others in that direction, if unoccupied —

The guano contains a large amount of phosphates
and the use of this description of manure, is
yearly becoming more general and necessary in
the Australian Colonies, therefore the carrying out
of any undertaking likely to facilitate the
introduction of it, at a low cost would supply
a present want. — It is also intended to make
shipments of it to England.

I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of your Excellency's letter of 17th ultimo accompanied by a License to remove Guano from Independence or Malden Island.

Referring to the instructions conveyed in your Excellency's letter, I beg to state, that on the 22nd ultimo I dispatched a vessel for Malden Island, having previously authorized by Power of Attorney the Master, Walter J. Readell to carry out your directions to me viz: "To declare on the behalf of His Majesty's confirmation of the act of your Captain in taking possession of the Island and the consequent establishment of her Majesty's sovereignty thereon"

This declaration he has been instructed to make in the presence of as many of the officers and crew as can safely leave the ship, all of whom are to sign a document, drawn up by my solicitor, containing the usual form of Proclamation as attesting witnesses.

Referring to the License; clause 4 requires the licensee to properly treat all labourers &c. I have given very strict instructions to the Resident Manager to see the men employed (who are chiefly natives from Coo-ee Group and the adjacent Islands) with kindness, to allow them ample rations, to rest on Sundays and Holidays, and neither to give

or allow the use of spirituous liquors amongst them. The Wages paid to these men varies from Two to three pounds per month exclusive of rations, which is double in quantity to what is provided by the Government scale for English slaves of ~~growing~~^{young} plants, Cocoa Nut Trees, &c. Shortly after taking possession, a considerable number of Cocoa Nut Trees were planted, and by a vessel lately sailing for the Island I was enabled through the kindness of Dr. Mueller, the German Botanist who is ever ready to aid, to work faithfully, to send seeds, of upwards of seventy varieties of trees and shrubs, some of which are to be left with the Missionaries at the different Islands, touched at on the voyage up; and some of all are to be sown on Malvern Island. I am also trying to introduce Bananas, Yams, Sweet Potatoes, and Breadfruit as a means of providing food the Islanders are most accustomed to.

The license also required that I should build a Deacon on some prominent part of the island not less than Ten feet square at the base and not less than Twenty feet high. I may state for your Excellency's information that the elevation of the Island is near thirty feet and that there are Trees already growing there fully 20 $\frac{1}{2}$ high. The Island is visible for about fifteen Miles in ordinary weather. The Guano is not scattered over the whole surface and none upon the highest ground. I shall not therefore interfere in any way with the elevation of the Island by removing it. Should your Excellency however consider it necessary to carry out this condition of the license, I will do so. To place the Island in working order, get vessels to load at such an unknown place, and the Guano introduced and tested in Europe will probably occupy considerable

time, besides costing much trouble and expense
I beg therefore to ask through your
excellency for either an extension of the term
of the License, or a renewal for a further term
of Seven Years. : for although I feel confident
the Venture will prove remunerative eventually,
a considerable period of the License must
lapse, before it becomes so, and the remainder
of the seven years may likely prove too short to
allow of repayment of the Capital and labour
expended upon the enterprise being had.

As the Guano contains a very large
per. centage of Phosphates. (a description of
Manure much wanted at present in England)
the introduction will be the means of supplying
that want at a very low cost.

As one who has incurred great risks
in the introduction of this article, I hope I
may be allowed to ask for a favourable consideration
of my request for an extension of the term
of the License above referred to.

Dear Sir,

In Mr. Charleston's letter of the 28th June you were informed that your request for assistance in recovering diaries of Abraham McCullough which were stated in a press report to have been found in a hut on Malden Island had been referred to the Ministry of Supply in London.

The Ministry of Supply and the Air Ministry have investigated the press reports and they have told us that there was no foundation for the story that officers found diaries on the island. When the first party landed on Malden Island, one house, almost certainly that of the old manager, was standing. It was very seriously damaged both by exposure to the weather and apparent bombardment from a passing ship.

There was a large quantity of old documents. There were bills or records of stores delivered and supplied, time sheets for native labourers, etc. In addition, there were a few letters addressed to the manager from his Company Headquarters in Australia and copies of his replies. All were dated in the period covering the First World War, long after the date when Abraham McCullough had died in 1897. There were also a few books and periodicals of the same period.

The remains of the house were destroyed by fire to prevent their use as a sty by the wild pigs running loose on the Island. Before this was done the senior officers had a good look through the building and personally satisfied themselves that nothing remained in it of any real historical value.
