Davies-Thomas has given the sum of £400 for the present purpose of founding two scholarships to be called after the late Dr. Davies-

Thomas, and the Council of the University of Adelaide have agreed to invest that sum and to apply the income thereof in the manner

specified in these statutes: It is hereby provided that in consideration of the receipt by the University of the above-mentioned sum :-1. The scholarships shall be called the Dr. Davies-Thomas Scholarships, and shall be competed for annually. 2. Each scholarship shall be of the value of £10, and shall be awarded to the best student in each of the third and fourth years of the M.B. course who shall be placed in the first class. 3. Each scholar shall be credited with the said sum of £10 towards payment of his or her fees."
