He congratulated them on having secured the services of Mr. Arthur as the head of the preparatory school, and on retaining the valuable services of Messrs. Wheatley, Grasby, and Hollidge, and in conclusion wished them a merry Christmas and hoped they would enjoy their holidays. (Cheers.)

Lady VICTORIA BUXTON then presented to the boys the prizes won during the year. At the call of the CHIEF JUSTICE Lady Victoria was heartily thanked by the applause of the audience for her presence, and the boys, at the instance of his honor, gave three ringing cheers for her ladyship. A vote of thanks to the chairman, and the singing of "Auld Lang Syne" closed the proceedings. During the evening the school rendered the choruses "Jingle bells," "The holiday," and "Good night." Professor Grigg's pupils contributed the orchestral number Mendelssohn's "War march of the priests," and Mr. G. A. Randle the "Marche Hongroise." The singing of the school was led by Mr. F. W. Wheatley, B.Sc., and Mr. W. R. Knox acted as accompanist. In the hall were on view excellent specimens of sheaves of grain grown on the school agronomical plots and various products of the manual school, which is under the care of Mr. W. C. Grasby. These consisted of farm iron-work and saddlery, and the quality of the workmanship testified eloquently to the character of the instruction imparted at the college.

THE MEDICAL SCHOOL.

A meeting of the sub-committee appointed by the University Council and the Adelaide Hospital Board to confer on the subject of the re-establishment of the Medical School for the fourth and fifth year students was held on Thursday afternoon. The representative of the University submitted a scheme, but as the hospital sub-committee had no power to act no decision was arrived at. The latter will report to the board at the next meeting.

THE CONSERVATORIUM OF MUSIC.

It has been definitely settled that the Conservatorium of Music in connection with the Adelaide University shall be opened on March 7 next. Professor Ives will be the director. Herr Reimann has been appointed principal teacher of the pianoforte with a seat on the board of musical studies. Herr Heinicke has been selected as teacher of the violin, and he will also be the conductor of the University orchestra, which is to be formed almost immediately. Herr Kugelberg has received the appointment of teacher of the violincello and pianoforte. Other posts will be filled at about the end of January. The Adelaide College of Music is to be absorbed by the new institution, and its rooms will be used temporarily pending the completion of the new concert hall and teaching-rooms for the conservatorium.

The final results of the medical examinations in Melbourne are to hand. In addition to those already published Christina Love Goode and Charles Ernest Cameron Wilson, both of Adelaide, have completed their fourth year. Of South Australian students 13 out of 16 have been successful—seven out of nine in the fifth year, five out of six in the fourth, and one in the third year.
