Hodge, the Registrar of the University, visited Clare this week, and formed a local Committee for the purpose of supervising local candidates in their examinations in connection with the University. This is a step in the right direction, as all arrangements can now be made for entering for exams. direct with the local Committee, the secretary of which is Mr. M. Badger. No charge will be made now other than the entrance fee. The movement should give an impetus to higher ecucation in this district, and we feel sure that the "permanent centre" now formed here will have the support of school teachers and all interested in the matter of education.

CLARE, July 22.—A meeting of prominent residents of Clare was held at the invitation of Mr. C. R. Hodge, the registrar of the University, in the Town Hall Chambers on Tuesday evening last. The inclement weather prevented some from attending, but nevertheless there was a representative gathering. Dr. Bain was voted to the chair, and he called upon Mr. Hodge to explain the object of the meeting. Mr. Hodge said the council of the University had thought it desirable, in order to afford greater convenience to students who desired to pass examinations, that permanent committees should be appointed in important centres, and that the examinations should be held under their supervision. The first of these committees was formed at Perth two years ago, and since then one had been formed at Port Pirie and also at Mount Gambier. It was now proposed to form one in Clare. A discussion then ensued, and on the motion of the Rev. Canon Webb, seconded by Mr. W. Kelly, it was resolved that a committee should be formed in Clare. On the motion of Mr. Hodge, seconded by Mr. Kelly, the following committee was appointed, with power to add to their number: - Mesdames J. Christison and H. E. Hodge, Revs. Canon Webb, Father Herden, and W. R. Milne, Dr. Bain, Messrs. T. Reed (Mayor of Clare), J. Christison, M. Badger, W. Kelly, R. Graham, H. E. Hodge, and R. H. Tilbrook. It was unanimously resolved that Dr. Bain should act as chairman, and Mr. M. Badger as secretary. Mr. C. R. Hodge then intimated to the meeting that three examinations would be held in Clare during the year, one in September and the remaining two at later periods. A vote of thanks was proposed to the chairman by Mr. C. R. Hodge, and the meeting closed.

MUSICAL NOTES.

The latest news from the old country states that Professor Ives has succeeded in earrying out the suggestion made in our article published in The Journal of March 13 last with regard to an additional Examiner for the musical tests of the Adelaide University. Some of our readers will recollect that in this article we pointed out that, as the associated Boards of Royal Academy and Royal College of Music were desirous of sending an Examiner to the colonies, and indeed had already made some preliminary arrangements for doing so, an excellent opportunity was afforded the Adelaide University of affiliating their examinations with those of the Colleges above mentioned. This Professor Ives has apparently brought about, and will conduct the examinations in November next, assisted by Mr. C. Lee Williams, Mus. Bac., Oxon, the representative of the

two Colleges. Mr. Williams is a well-known musician, who has already acquired considerable fame as a composer. His best-known works are "Bethany," a sacred cantata composed for the Gloucester Musical Festival of 1889, and "Gethsemane," another short work written for the succeeding Festival of 1892. Besides these, the new Examiner has written a large quantity of Church music, most of which has proved popular. For some years Mr. Williams was organist of Gloucester Cathedral, and conductor of the Gloucester Triennial Musical Festival. We believe, however, that he resigned the former position some little time ago on account of ill-health. This will probably account for his accepting the position of Colonial Examiner for the associated Colleges, for a long trip of many months' duration, in which he will visit Canada, Gibraltar, New Zealand, and all the Australian Colonies with the exception of Western Australia, should prove very beneficial to one who is suffering from the results of overwork.
