The visit of Mr. C. R. Hodge, the Registrar of the Adelaide University, to Broken Hill for the purpose of arranging a local examining centre in music, proved eminently successful. A large meeting was held in the local Town Hall at which a Committee, Secretary, and Chairman were elected. The following are the names of the gentlemen who consented to act:—The Revs. A. J. Wheeler, W. H. Connelly, A. Hodge, and Messrs. Von Rieben, Prior, M'Carthy, Eaton, Maclaren, Southcombe, Rhys, Francis, and Holdsworth. Mr. Von Rieben was elected Permanent Chairman, and Mr. M'Carthy Hon. Secretary. The first examinations in the new centre will be held in June next, when candidates for the primary certificates will be examined.

Professor Ives, who has been granted six months' leave of absence from the University, left by the Ville de la Ciotat on Monday for Europe. As his leave dates from March 1 he should be in Adelaide early in next September. Mr. T. H. Jones, Mus. Bac., who is lecturing during Professor Ives' absence, entered upon his full duties on Monday last, April 26.

At a meeting of the Council of the University, held on Friday afternoon, Mr. Hermann Schrader, of Melbourne, was chosen as the examiner for the forthcoming primary examinations in music, to be held in June next. The theoretical paper was set by Professor Ives, previous to his departure for Europe, so in this case it will only fall to the lot of Mr. Schrader to examine the papers. At the same meeting it was decided to form a musical examining centre at Port Pirie, with a committee, Chairman, and Secretary, as had been done at Broken Hill. Mr. C. R. Hodge, the Registrar of the University, will shortly visit Port Pirie in order to make the necessary arrangements.

University Examinations.

A representative meeting was held last night at the Town Clerk's Office last night for the purpose of appointing a Committee and local Secretary to conduct examinations in connection with the University of Adelaide.

His Worship the Mayor (Mr J. C. Haslam) presided.

Mr C. R. HODGE (Registrar of the University) stated that the Council of the University were desirous of meeting the wants of local candidates who desired to present themselves for the various public examinations, but who were unable to go to the city. With that object in view he had been sent down for the purpose of establishing a permanent centre in Port Pirie, and appointing a good representative Committee, with a local Secretary, so that students and teachers would have the satisfaction of knowing that the Preliminary, Junior Public and Senior Public, as well as the various public examinations in music, could be held locally. The under-mentioned Committee was then appointed—The Mayor, Rev. L. Durno, Rev. Father O'Connor, Rev. J. Chapman, Rev. S. Rossiter, Captain R. B. Williams, Dr. Walker, B.A., Dr. Stewart, Dr. Hamilton, Messrs. D. C. Scott, LL.B., R. M. Bertram, G. F. Claridge, J. Grose, F. S. Delano, W. K. Mallyon, K. W. Duncan, W. T. Gronow, J. Forsaith, and W. Goode.

Mr Haslam was appointed permanent Chairman of the Committee, and Mr K. W. Duncan honorary secretary.

After several other items of formal business had been disposed of, the Rev. J. Chapman proposed, and the Rev. T. O'Connor seconded a resolution expressing appreciation of the action of the University authorities and directing that the warmest thanks of this meeting be conveyed to the University Council. The resolution was carried unanimously.

On the motion of Mr Hodge, who expressed his great satisfaction at the earnest manner in which this matter had been taken up, a hearty vote of thanks to the Mayor for granting the use of the room for presiding, was carried.
