Professor R. L. Douglas, M.A., of the Adelaide University, left by the Omrah on Thursday for Italy. After transacting some business in London and Rome, he will repair to Siena, a city in Tuscany, about 30 miles south-west of Florence, and there he will devote himself to the completion of the history of the city, which he commenced some time ago. He has access to the city archives, and he hopes by close application to finish the work, and receive the first-proof from the publisher before he returns. The Siennese were the great rivals of the Florentines, in the 13th century, in the wars between the Imperial and Papal factions, and the most important of their battles was fought in 1260 at Montaperti. An account of the strife is given in the earlier part of Dante's "Inferno," upon which the professor will draw considerably in the compilation of his work. So far only fragmentary portions of the history of Siena have been published, but Mr. Douglas's volume will embrace its whole history to the present day. He has just completed his scrutiny of about 700 University examination papers, and will be well occupied during his "vacation." He expects to return at the beginning of the new term next March.

Mr. Stanley Herbert Skipper, who has completed his course for the degree of LL.B. at the University of Adelaide, has been recommended for the Stow Scholarship. This was founded in memory of the late Mr. Justice Stow. The first to win the coveted distinction was Mr. F. L. Stow, LL.B., and the only other winner previous to Mr. Skipper's success was Mr. W. J. Young, LL.B. To obtain the scholarship the Stow prize has to be won three times by a student during his law course. Mr. Skipper, who has had a brilliant career at the university, is the elder son of Mr. S. J. Skipper, of the Semaphore, and entered the university from St. Peter's College.

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THE UNIVERSITY AND COMMERCE.

To the Editor.

Sir—The university is to be congratulated on having arranged an examination for shorthand, &c., and its conditions seem to be all that can be desired. We trust that if they go another step, and arrange for the general public to study these requisite subjects at low fees at any of the Government institutions on North terrace, they will give the existing commercial schools a few years' notice before commencing to do so. As South Australia is so small, wherever Government takes up educational work private enterprise is no longer required or attracted. For instance, since the School of Design and Conservatorium have arranged their curricula to suit juniors, hundreds of pupils have been withdrawn from private teachers, and no musician or artist would probably think Adelaide a fair field for remunerative employment. In Government institutions also fees are supposed to be collected before the lessons are given; so that not only are the best pupils attracted, but those who are able to pay promptly. It is somewhat characteristic of this state that wherever private enterprise is successful Government steps in and seems to absorb the industry, while in most cases it has to levy increased taxes to do so. In all education except elementary instruction and degree work (where the expense of apparatus is so costly, and professor's salaries also, if they are competent), it would perhaps be wise if private enterprise were guided by the state, but the fullest encouragement given to invite all talent hither. Similarly in developing South Australia in other directions, we need capital and men of enterprise, and should do our utmost to attract them. The present policy is full of the best intentions, but is shortsighted, and is steadily increasing the expenses of the state and diminishing the quality of the people whom we attract to settle among us.
