A NOTE ON THE AUTHOR AND THE PLAY

Henrik Johan Ibsen, Norwegian dramatic poet, was born in 1828. Between 1850 and 1899, he was the author of more than 20 dramatic works. Two of them, *Brand* and *Peer Gynt*, are great poetic dramas, very different in manner from the seemingly prosaic pictures of small-town life with which his name is almost exclusively associated in English-speaking countries.

Ibsen was in his early days a professional man of the theatre. For more than ten years he was assistant manager of the theatre at Bergen and then of that at Christiania (Oslo). Apart from the wonderful Peer Gynt, the best known plays are perhaps The Doll's House, Ghosts, An Enemy of the People, and The Wild Duck.

Hedda Gabler, first produced in 1890, though it bears the unmistakable imprint of Ibsen in every scene, is not at first sight a play with a social message. It is an almost clinical study of a young woman, the product of an artificial society, amoral, craving sensation, completely self-centred, with, as she says herself, but one aptitude — for being bored to death. Alongside Hedda we are given an ironical but not unkind portrait of her husband, showing in contrast the value of the less romantic virtues of kindness and normality.

Ibsen has now taken his place as one of the great writers of the world. But perhaps we are still inclined to forget that he was a poet, as well as the dramatist who so insistently demanded that we face facts. He died in April, 1905.
