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classics this year. He was gratified in being able to confer the ordinary degree upon Mr. Eardley, who for the past 12 or 13 years had been a member of the clerical staff of the University. The institution offered facilities for its clerical staff to take degrees. It had been a long journey for Mr. Eardley, since he had efficiently carried out onerous official duties while at the same time studying.

The Chancellor said Mr. Corbin was a Bachelor of Science of the Universities of London and Edinburgh, and now held with credit the position of Government Lecturer in Forestry at the Adelaide University. Mr. Wheatley had graduated with the degree of Bachelor of Science, obtaining first-class honours in physics in 1890. He had subsequently held masterships at Way and Prince Alfred Colleges, and had graduated as Bachelor of Arts in 1904. Later he accepted the position of head master of the Kockhampton Grammar School, but had since left in order to pursue his studies for the degree of Doctor of Science. He had been doing research work at Oxford. Mr. Dawkins was the Hartley student in 1908, and this year he gained first class honours in chemistry, and was awarded the David Murray Scholarship in science, for chemistry. Mr. Hardy won second class honours in chemistry this year. Mr. Jack had done distinguished work at Sydney, where he won the Sade Prize. He was appointed Assistant Government Geologist of South Australia in 1911. In the Government Geologist, Mr. Ward, they had another graduate of the Sydney University, who had won honours in chemistry, metallurgy, assaying, and ore dressing, mining, and engineering. He congratulated Messrs. Brookman and Espie upon being the first graduates of the University to be awarded the new degree of Bachelor of Engineering. Both gentlemen, as students, had received the diploma and fellowship of the School of Mines. Each had since qualified for the engineering degree. The other candidates for the degree had become eligible by surrendering the degree of Bachelor of Science.

AFTER 25 YEARS.

PRESENTATION TO MR. C. R. HODGE.

A pleasing personal incident marked the conclusion of the University commemoration proceedings at the Elder Hall on Wednesday afternoon, when Mr. C. R. Hodge (Registrar of the University of Adelaide) was presented with a handsome address and a purse of sovereigns.

Dr. R. H. Pulleine, as Secretary and Treasurer, announced that he was the medium of a highly interesting function. As Mr. Hodge had completed a term of more than 25 years in the service of the University, a number of old-time graduates considered that that day would be a fitting occasion to offer him a testimonial of the confidence in which he was held by students past and present. The text of the testimonial, which was embellished by a replica of the entrance to the University, set forth:—"We, the graduates and one-time students of the University of Adelaide, feel great pleasure in presenting you with this memento of your activities on behalf of our alma mater. During your official connection with the University—a period of 25 years—you have endeared yourself to the students and gained the confidence of the governing body and professional teaching staff. You have witnessed the University from its early youth grow to its present proud position of influence, and have seen many men, now famous, receive its degrees and rewards. We hope you may for many years continue to fill the position you have so long occupied, to the great advantage of the University, and enjoy the respect due to your sterling character." He had an accompanimental gift to offer in the shape of a purse of sovereigns.

The Chancellor (Sir Samuel Way), in support, said that if Mr. Hodge had not graduated as a member of the University, he had at any rate graduated with first-class honours in the love and admiration of those who had so numerously affixed their signatures to the testimonial. Although the address referred to a quarter of a century's service, Mr. Hodge had actually been connected with the institution for almost 30 years. In those days there was only the Faculty of Art, and only 17 graduates had obtained their degrees with the University of Adelaide. To-day the number of graduates (including ad eundem gradum) amounted to more than 900. Mr. Hodge had therefore had the distinction of personally taking part in the conferring of degrees upon all but 17 of the 900 graduates of the University. (Applause.) It was a very high and rare distinction.

Mr. Hodge briefly and feelingly responded. The presentation was one which he was naturally very proud to have received. It was only the more welcome because it was unexpected. It was true that he had seen the better part of a thousand degrees conferred, and, although he had never had the hope of obtaining a degree himself, he now realized that during those 30 years he had been graduating in the esteem and affection of so many of the alumni. (Applause.) He was conscious of having done his duty as thoroughly and well as lay in his power, but he was not conscious that he had done anything to deserve so high an honour as the present.

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UNIVERSITY STATUTES AND REGULATIONS.

The Executive Council on Wednesday approved of statutes and regulations made by the University Council and affirmed by the Senate dealing with the Angus Engineering Scholarship, Angus Engineering Exhibition, academic dress, Hartley Studentship, the John Cresswell Scholarships, the degree of B.Sc., the diploma of associate in music, and the junior commercial examination.
