Conservatorium Concert.

The Elder Hall was well filled last night when the final recital for this year was given. Preceding the concert the diploma of associate in music was conferred on Miss Gladys Cilento (singing), Miss Muriel Day (singing), Mr. B. Evans (composition), and Miss d'Arcy Irvine (piano). Miss Dorothy Exton was the winner of the Robert Whinham prize for elocution, and Miss Mary Bottrill won the Brookman Scholarship for singing. Eider scholarships for 1913 were awarded to Miss Muriel Day, Mr. J. Fischer, Mr. H. Killicoat, Miss Lena McLeay, and Miss Paula Newkill.

The concert began with three numbers by the University Choral Class—Serenade, "O by rivers," by Bishop; madrigal, "Down in a flowery vale," by Festa and Glee; "The Bells of St. Michael's Tower," by Knyvett-Stewart. Honors for solo work in singing were divided by Miss Hilda Gill and Miss Simpson Pearse. Miss Gill has a beautiful contralto voice of power and equal tone. She sang Sullivan's "St. Agnes' Eve" with fine dramatic instinct. Another attraction in this first appearance was an unusually happy deportment. Miss Pearse sang Haydn's fine excerpt from "The Creation," "With verdure clad," winning admiration with finished interpretation of a trying number. Her voice is clear, ringing soprano, and the strongest points of her work are intonation and mature interpretation. Miss Gladys Evans has a soprano voice that should develop well. Her number was Handel's recitative and aria, "O didst thou know?" and "As when the dove." Miss Valerie Williams sang Chaminade's charming "Ritournelle." Miss Elsie Grant showed promise in Godard's "Angels guard thee," with violin obbligato by Miss Erica Chaplin. Miss Sylvia Whittington added another triumph to an already long list of violin solo work. Saint Saens' writings are quite safe in her capable hands. She played the "Introduction and Rondo capriccioso," which was a delight all through. Miss d'Arcy Irvine's piano work was of a high order in Chopin's difficult "Scherzo," op. 39, particularly in distinctive chord and arpeggio passages. Miss Hilda Joyce was entrusted with the last movement of Mendelssohn's "G minor concerto" for piano. There is a marked improvement in this student's work, and she is to be congratulated on excellent finger technique and good interpretation. The orchestral part was played on a second piano by Mr. Reimann. Miss Paula Newkill was the soloist in the "Andante" and "Allegro assai" from Bach's "A minor concerto" for violin. She did some good work, especially in the latter movement. The string orchestra played the accompaniment, but it is doubtful whether a comparatively new combination should have been asked to give this work. The orchestra were more conversant, and therefore a much better result was arrived at in the concluding numbers, "Andante" and "Scherzo" from Bantock's suite, "In the far west."

CONSERVATORIUM CONCERT.

A very satisfactory audience assembled at the Elder Hall last night to hear the final students' concert for the season. As is invariably the rule, the fixture was a great success, and the music of a high order. Choral items were contributed by the University choral class. Glorious music was voiced by the large body of vocalists, and they were enthusiastically called upon for repetitions. Amongst the numbers they essayed were Bishop's serenade, "Oh! By Rivers"; Constantius Festa's descriptive madrigal "Down in a Flow'ry Vale," and the popular glee, "The Bells of St. Michael's Tower" (Knyvett Stewart). The soloists were:—Miss Gladys Evans, who sang Handel's recitative and aria, "O Didst Thou Know" and "As when the Dove"; Miss Valerie Williams, "Ritournelle" (Chaminade); Miss Hilda Gill, "St. Agnes Eve" (Sullivan); Miss Elsie Grant, "Angels Guard Thee" (Benjamin Goddard), and Miss Simpson Pearse, recitation and air "And God Said" and "With Verdure Clad" (from Haydn's "The Creation"). Miss Grant's item was rendered especially effective by an artistic violin obbligato accompaniment by Miss Erica Chaplin. Two pianists were heard to great advantage, Miss Lalla d'Arcy Irvine, A.M.U.A., contributing Chopin's "Scherzo Op. 39" with delightful technique, and Miss Hilda Joyce interpreted Mendelssohn's "Concerto Op. 25" (last movement), with orchestral accompaniment on a second piano. Two beautifully conceived violin solos came from Miss Sylvia Whittington, A.M.U.A., "Introduction et Rondo Capriccioso" (Salut Saens), and Miss Paula Mewkill (elder scholar), "Andante and allegro, Assai from Concerto in A minor" (Bach). An orchestral string accompaniment added much to the charm of this item. The programme concluded with a harmonious and pleasing rendition of Bantock's "Scherzo Vivo" (from the suite, "In the Far West") by the Conservatorium String Orchestra. During the evening the diplomas and the Robert Whinham prize were presented to the successful students.
