

BRITISH SCIENTISTS.

CONTINGENT THAT WILL VISIT AUSTRALIA.

Melbourne, January 16.

At a meeting of the Federal Council appointed to make arrangements for the visit in August next year of a large number of members of the British Association for the Advancement of Science, it was stated that the High Commissioner had been officially informed that the Commonwealth Government's grant of £15,000 was intended to cover the passages of no fewer than 150 official representatives, including selected Dominion and foreign scientists, and that the Government would offer facilities for specialists to prolong their visit. A free railway pass had been granted to Mr. A. C. Rivett, the organising secretary, by the Victorian Government, but no reply had yet been received from the other States. It was decided to ask the British Associations to name 25 members of the official party who would extend their visit to New Zealand, the Government of the Dominion to contribute £30 towards the expenses of each member. An effort is to be made to organise a party to visit Tasmania. The question of issuing an invitation to visit the Northern Territory was referred to the executive council. The Governor-General has granted his patronage to the visit of the association.

ELDER SCHOLARSHIPS.

Four Elder scholarships are being offered by the University for competition in March in connection with the Conservatorium—one for violin playing, one for pianoforte playing, and two for singing. It is quite exceptional to provide more than one singing scholarship—the second is offered as the result of the resignation of one of the scholars. The extra opportunity is expected to be eagerly availed of. The Elder scholarships in music are tenable for three years at the Elder Conservatorium, with free tuition during that period. Each scholarship is worth at least £14 a year.

TEACHERS WANTED.

The Education Department is offering opportunities for boy and girls to enter their service. To young people who have passed the senior examination, an opening is afforded for entrance to a preliminary course of training to test whether the candidates give any promise of becoming successful teachers. A maintenance allowance is granted during this preliminary trial. Those whom the department is prepared to accept as teachers will be appointed as fourth grade junior teachers, boys at £60 per annum, and girls at £48 per annum. In January, 1914, those junior teachers who have shown some skill in their practical work may be admitted to the University Training College.
