At the Elder Conservatorium on Saturday afternoon eight candidates were examined by Mr. Howard Hadley (at present in South Australia as examiner for the Associated Board) for the three-years' scholarship tenable at the Royal College of Music, London. This award was founded by the late Sir Thomas Elder, and the present holder is Miss Clara Kleinschmidt, who has done so well that the period of study has been extended to four years, which will terminate in February. The examiner gave his judgment in favour of Miss Kathleen O'Dea, a vocal student at the Elder Conservatorium. Miss Irene Kemp, a pianoforte pupil of Mr. William



Silver, was highly commended. The successful student is in her nineteenth year. She placed herself under the tuition of Miss Guli Hack at the Conservatorium about two and a half years ago. Subsequently Mr. Winsloe Hall was her teacher, and has since guided her studies. Miss O'Dea won the local (vocal) Elder Scholarship last year. The possessor of an exceptionally fine soprano voice, of good range and unusual dramatic quality, Miss O'Dea has received many commendatory notices both from the press and distinguished visiting singers before whom she has appeared.

UNIVERSITY SENATE.
NEW REGULATIONS AND STATUTE.

A meeting of the University Senate was held at the University on Wednesday afternoon. There was a moderate attendance, over which the Warden (Mr. F. Chapple) presided. The following officers were elected:—Members of the Council, His Honor Mr. Justice Murray, Professor E. C. Stirling, C.M.G., and Messrs. G. Brookman, J. R. Fowler, and W. T. Hayward; Warden, Mr. F. Chapple; Clerk, Mr. T. A. Caterer.

The University has received from Mrs. John Bagot £500 for the purpose of founding a scholarship and medal in botany in the memory of her late husband. The senate approved the following statute to deal with the endowment:—

1. There shall be an annual scholarship and medal, to be called the John Bagot Botany Scholarship and Medal. 2. The John Bagot Scholarship and Medal in bronze shall be awarded to the student placed first in the first class in the annual examination in elementary botany, in the B.Sc. course. Should he decline to accept the scholarship he shall be entitled to receive the medal, and the scholarship may then be awarded to the next in order of merit in the first class, who may be willing to comply with the prescribed conditions. Should no candidate be adjudged of sufficient merit, no scholarship shall be awarded for that year, but the value of the scholarship shall be devoted to a fund to provide other prizes in botany. 3. The scholar shall be exempt from payment of fees for the study of botany in the University for the ensuing year, and, if his conduct and work be considered satisfactory to the faculty of science, for a second year following the award, provided that the total fees for which exemption is granted shall not exceed £20. 4. Should the scholar be already in receipt of a scholarship or prize exempting him from payment of his fees for the study of botany in the University the John Bagot Botany Scholarship shall be awarded in the form of books, instruments, or money, to the value of £20, at the option of the student, on the completion of his course in botany to the satisfaction of the faculty of science. 5. This statute may be varied from time to time, but the title and purpose of this scholarship shall not be changed.

Regulation 3 of the degrees of Bachelor and Master of Arts were replaced and new ones inserted.

Music teachers and students will be greatly interested in two sets of regulations which were passed. One set has to do with two music scholarships, each tenable for three years. One exempts the holder from payment during its tenure of fees for tuition and examination for the degree of Bachelor of Music, and the other exempts the holder from the payment during its tenure of fees for tuition or examination for the diploma of Associate of Music. These scholarships will be offered annually at the public examinations in music held in South Australia and Broken Hill in September. The other regulations in regard to music deal with teachers' certificates, and state:—

The University shall issue a certificate of competence in the art of teaching music in any of the following branches:—(a) Pianoforte playing; (b) organ playing; (c) violin playing; (d) Violoncello playing; and (e) singing. To obtain such certificate a candidate must:—(a) Pass the examination in theory, grade I, or grade II, of the public examinations in music, or complete the first year of the Mus. Bac. course; and (b) pass the examination in practice, grade I, or grade II, in the branch of music for which he presents himself; and (c) pass an examination in the following subjects:—The art of teaching the particular branch or branches of music for which he presents himself; general and detailed knowledge of musical literature; and performance of pieces guaranteed to have been learned by the candidate without assistance. Candidates who have obtained the diploma of associate in music shall be exempt from the requirements in (a) and (b) of this regulation.

Other business was in connection with the repeal and replacement of regulations 2 and 4 of the diploma in commerce.

UNIVERSITY SENATE.

CERTIFICATES FOR MUSIC-TEACHERS.

A meeting of the University Senate was held at the University on Wednesday afternoon, when the warden (Mr. F. Chapple) presided. Only one nomination having been received for the office of warden, Mr. Chapple was re-elected. His Honor Mr. Justice Murray, Professor Stirling, and Messrs. G. Brookman, J. R. Fowler, W. T. Hayward were appointed members of the council, and Mr. T. A. Caterer clerk.

The University having received from Mrs. John Bagot the sum of £500 for the purpose of founding a scholarship and medal in botany in memory of the late husband, provisions were approved for the John Bagot Botany Scholarship and Medal. It is to be awarded to the student placed first in the first class in the annual examination in elementary botany, in the B.Sc. course. The scholar is to be exempt from payment of fees for the study of botany in the University for the ensuing year, and, if his conduct and work be considered satisfactory to the Faculty of Science, for a second year following the award, provided that the total fees for which exemption is granted shall not exceed £20. Should the scholar be already in receipt of a scholarship or prize exempting him from payment of his fees for the study of botany in the University the John Bagot Botany Scholarship will be awarded in the form of books, instruments, or money to the value of £20, at the option of the student, on the completion of his course in botany to the satisfaction of the Faculty of Science.

Regulation 3 of the Degree of Bachelor of Arts, and regulation 3 of the Degree of Master of Arts, were repealed and others substituted.

It was decided to issue a certificate of competence in the art of teaching music in any of the following branches:—(a) Pianoforte playing, (b) organ playing, (c) violin playing, (d) violoncello playing, (e) singing. New regulations for public examinations (music) scholarships were decided upon.

A regulation to permit of the holding of supplementary examinations in subjects connected with the Diploma of Commerce was passed.
