-University and Country Children .-

The position of country children under the New South Wales Government's proposed university reform proposals was releared to by Mr. Carmichael (Minister of Public Instruction), at Tamworth, last week. "If parents cannot afford to keep their boys during their university career," He said, "they will get a living allowance under the Bursaries Act from the Government. Under ordinary conditions the country child would not be able to compete equally with the city child, who has better chances of tuition and facilities. The Government has met this difficulty with a special provision that the children in country centres will compete one with the other, and not with children taught in the schools in the cities and larger towns. In a word, the new arrangement works out that the child of a parent attending the smallest out-back school will, if he shows the ability, be able to pass from that school tree of all cost to the high school, and from there again free of all cost to the university, thus gaining all the advantages of the highest education."

The contemplated retirement of Mr. F. Chapple, B.A., B.Sc., from the head mastership of Prince Alfred College, in which capacity be has done such distinguished work for education in South Australia since 1876, has been known for some time, and it has now been definitely announced that Mr. Chapple will retire at the end of 1914. He will thus complete his thirty-ninth year of service at the college, and have his fortieth on leave. The close of his almost umque term of activity as the head master of a great public school will be an oceasion of widespread regret, and it will mark the termination of a memorable epoch in the history of Prince Alfred College, Few

educationists in the Commonwealth have

established so excellent a reputation as Mr.

Chapple. He was born in London in 1845.

and came to Adelaide in April, 1876, after

a distinguished career at the London Uni-

versity, and with teaching experience gained

as a master of Westminster Training Col-

lege. He at once entered upon his duties

as Principal of Prince Alfred College. which had achieved a high position under Mr. Fiddian and Mr. Hartley (afterwards Inspector-General of State Schools). In addition to his immediate work at the col lege Mr. Chapple has interested himself in education generally, and was one of the foundation members of the Council of the Adelaide University. The college committee, in acceding to Mr. Chapple's request that he should retire at the end of 1914, adopted the following resolution:-"While granting the request of Me Chapple to retire from the head master ship of Prince Alfred College at the ent of 1914, this committee place on recor their devout gratitude to Almighty God fo the blessings which have accompanied hi labours. They desire to testify to the admiration of the noble work which the head master has accomplished during to tenure of his high office for the past 3. years. The college buildings, which during those years have been tripled in size at a cost of between £35,000 and £40,000 towards which gifts and endowments amounting to £20,000 have been receivedare Mr. Chapple's visible material monument. A more precious memorial is to be found in the training-physical, mental, moral, and religious-received by the 4.70 boys who have come under his caretraining which has uplifted and influence for good the life of this State. More than 250 of these scholars have graduated at the University, many with distinction ar carrying off its highest rewards. Whi preserving the distinctive character of Methodist college, the head master leadership has always been on broad ar Catholic lines, and consequently the institu tion has commanded the confidence as support of members of all other denomin tions. We are proud to record that M Chapple's qualities as an educationic have been recognised in his election for many years past as a member of the com cil of the University, and in his beit chosen ever since 1883 as warden of the University. This committee trust that M Chapple may long enjoy his well-carned to tirement, and that he may have the hapi ness of witnessing the continued and panding usefulness of the college to white he has ungrudgingly devoted the best yes of his life and the welfare of which is near his heart."
