MAWSON EXPEDITION.
ARRANGEMENTS NEARLY READY.
Hobart, November 28.
Dr. Mawson today received the following message from Lord Denman (Governor-General):—"I wish you and your comrades all good luck and success in the arduous enterprise which you are about to undertake, and which will, I am sure, bring honour to the Commonwealth."
The arrangements for the departure of the Aurora are now practically complete for December 2. A chartered steamer, Toroa, will leave on December 7, and will pick up the Antarctic steamer at Magic Island.

INSPECTOR JORDAN.
The Hon. A. H. PEAKE asked if it was correct, as stated in "The Advertiser" that morning, that Inspector Jordan, of the Education Department, had been asked to send in his resignation. If so, what was the reason for the Minister's action?
The MINISTER OF EDUCATION (Hon. F. W. Coneybeer) said Inspector Jordan had been respectfully asked to forward his resignation. He would rather not at that stage say anything further on the subject.
The Hon. A. H. PEAKE said as regards the Minister of Education having "respectfully" requested Inspector Jordan to resign his position—(The Attorney-General—"He says he didn't do it 'respectfully.'"—) he would ask whether the Minister was keeping back his reasons in the public interest, because if it was not so he would press for an answer as to what the reasons are.
The MINISTER OF EDUCATION thought it would be just as well to wait and see what action Mr. Jordan took as regards his resignation. He would be prepared to give the hon. member—(Mr. Peake—"You must have reasons for asking him;" and Mr. Ryan—"Of course he had.") He put it to the hon. member that, pending a reply from Mr. Jordan, he should not press him to answer any further question on the subject at present.
GOVERNMENT GEOLOGIST.
The TREASURER, in reply to Mr. Ryan, said Mr. Ward, of the Tasmania Geological Survey Department, had been chosen for the position of Government Geologist. The assistant geologist would be appointed in a day or two.

MAWSON EXPEDITION.
FAREWELL MESSAGES.
HOBART, November 28.
The work of loading the antarctic steamer Aurora is still being carried on. Coaling operations will commence to-morrow, and between 300 and 400 tons will be put aboard the vessel. The steamer Toroa, which has been chartered to go to Macquarie Island, will take about 100 tons of coal in bags. She will also carry stores and equipment, making about 150 tons in all. The Hobart Marine Board has decided to exempt her from port dues on this visit, as is being done in the case of the Aurora in connection with the work at the Queen's Pier.
Dr. Mawson has received the following telegram from the Governor-General (Lord Denman):—"Many thanks for your friendly message. I wish you and your comrades all good luck in the arduous enterprise which you are about to undertake, and which will, I am sure, bring honour to the Commonwealth." A cable message of a rather puzzling nature has been received. It bore the signature "Buckley," and purported to have been sent from "George Washington," via Cape Race, Newfoundland. It wished the expedition "Good luck and success." This message at first gave rise to much conjecture, and opinions were inclined to the conclusion that it was a hoax. The postal authorities were also inclined to accept this view. An investigation was made, and a satisfactory explanation offered. This is that the "George Washington" is a North German Lloyd liner running between Europe and America, that the message was sent from her to the wireless telegraph station by Mr. Buckley, who is one of the largest subscribers to the funds of the expedition.
