SIR DOUGLAS MAWSON HONORED.

At the annual meeting of the Boy Scouts' Association State council on Thursday, Sir Douglas Mawson was invested with the distinction of the "Silver Wolf." Commander O. Burford (the acting State commissioner) had been asked to introduce the formal motion, but as his duties prevented him from attending, his Excellency the Governor, who presided, read a message. "The preparation for duty in the trying climate of the Antarctic is not a matter of weeks or months, but of years," wrote Commander Burford. "It required a strong constitution that can come only of clean living and careful training, a study of the methods of former expeditions, and a certain amount of courage that only comes from confidence in one's self. Physical fitness and an endurance of a most singular nature, which Sir Douglas Mawson displayed, merit the honor the council is conferring upon him. In view of the great hardships and feats of endurance which Sir Douglas Mawson has faced, the executive feel that his example to the boys in South Australia is worthy of recognition, and they have resolved to award him the honor of the 'Silver Wolf,' which is the highest honor that may be bestowed on a scout. It affords me great pleasure to move that the order be conferred upon Sir Douglas Mawson, feeling that his example and heroic attainments in Antarctica may be reflected in no small measure in the Boy Scouts of this State, as an ideal test of resourcefulness, nerve, and unquestionable endurance."

Mr. W. Herbert Phillips seconded, and the motion was carried. Sir Henry Galway placed the decoration upon Sir Douglas with expressions of pleasure. He remarked:—"You possess those four great qualities which we try to imbue in the scout—discipline, obedience, resourcefulness, and self-reliance. The obedience which you must have inspired upon shows you to be a disciplinarian of the highest order. You imposed discipline with such marked success that your work will go down in history, and

will be an illuminating example to all boy scouts. I congratulate you most heartily, and I am delighted to know you are now a member of the Scout movement."

Sir Douglas Mawson, in acknowledging the honor, said he was very glad to be connected with the movement, and to help it for the young boys. The movement had always been wanted, and it would in the moral character of the boys.
