LIEUTENANT BRUNS.

Lieutenant E. O. A. Bruns, whose death in action has been announced, began his public service in the professional ranks of the Education Department. He went through the training course at the Pupil Teachers' College, and afterwards took a course at the University. His last appointment in the education service was as an assistant at the Gawler Public School. He remained there for two years and then resigned about 15

months ago to enter the defence service. He was gazetted to a lieutenantcy in the 79th Infantry, and from that unit was seconded for duty as area officer at Kadina. He volunteered for service abroad when the war began and was accepted.

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THE RECRUITING MOVEMENT.

To the Editor.

Sir—His Honor Sir John Gordon's remarks regarding the enlistment of law students and students in general at the University of Adelaide, call for comment. While I agree with our learned judge that every man is needed, and while I also deplore the present state of war, still his Honor's remarks would better be directed towards the councils of our two higher educational institutions, namely, the University of Adelaide and the South Australian School of Mines and Industries, in the form of the interrogation, "What are you doing to assist and to encourage your students to enlist for active service?" There are to-day numbers of eligible students, who are ready and willing, aye, eager to do their share towards the emancipation of the world from a common foe, yet they are debarred from doing so. Take the case of a student who is hopeful of completing his course this year. Should he forsake his all, after years of solid work, patience, and perseverance, to perhaps never again be able to compete in the world's work? I commend the suggestion to the council and senate of the University of Adelaide, and to the council of the Adelaide School of Mines, that they unite and agree to grant to those students who will volunteer for active service, passes in those subjects upon which they are now engaged; thereby releasing them for service, and at the same time helping them to overcome the enormous disadvantages under which they are placed.—I am, &c.,

THIRD AUSTRALIAN HOSPITAL.

DR. A. M. CUDMORE.

Dr. A. M. Cudmore will leave South Australia to-morrow with the other members of the staff of the Third Australian Hospital. The other South Australian doctors who are on the staff are Drs. Russell, W. T. Hayward, and De Crespigny. This hospital will have 32 medical men, and 1,000 beds. A recent cablegram suggested that the third hospital would go to Europe to supplement the Australian voluntary hospital, and make it up to 1,500 beds.

Dr. Cudmore is one of the most eminent surgeons in Adelaide, and will be much missed both from the Adelaide Hospital and the University. He is a son of the late Mr. James Francis Cudmore, and was born at Paringa, River Murray. He was educated at St. Peter's College, and took his degree in medicine and surgery at the University of Adelaide in 1894. Going to the old land he distinguished himself in taking F.R.C.S. in 1900. Since then he has been on the Adelaide Hospital staff. He married a daughter of the late Hon. Wentworth Cavanagh-Mainwaring, who represented the district of Yatala for over 20 years. Dr. Cudmore was lecturer in clinical surgery at the University of Adelaide for the last six years, and has been surgeon at the Adelaide Hospital for 11 years.

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Sir Douglas Mawson, who has just concluded a lecturing tour in England, Canada, United States, and New Zealand, returned to Adelaide by the Melbourne express on Wednesday, and will resume his duties as lecturer on petrology and kindred subjects at the Adelaide University on May 31, at the beginning of the second term. Sir Douglas was everywhere well received on his tour, and while in America gathered much valuable information regarding the lines on which the universities in the United States are conducted. He visited many of the principal universities, and lectured to the students. Regarding his expedition, the explorer stated that the published account of his work was only a popular narrative, and that the scientific account had still to be prepared from the data and specimens he had secured. At the present time about 70 experts were engaged in classifying and examining the specimens, and when the volume did appear it would be the production of men who were famous for their knowledge in the various sections. The scientific account would occupy 15 large volumes, and would be classified in the following divisions:—Zoology and botany, 5; geography, 1; deep sea work, 1; bacteriology, 1; meteorology, 2; magnetics and physics, 2; glaciology, 1; geology, 2. It would probably be several years before the complete account would be placed upon the market. Regarding the feeling of America in connection with the war, Sir Douglas stated that the possibility of America taking any definite action was now very slight, on account of the strength of the pro-German party. The general opinion of the populace of the American Republic, regarding the attitude of the President and his advisers, was that they had failed in their duties when they had not protested against the violation of Belgium's neutrality by the Germans. In every direction the popularity of the cause of the Allies was strikingly apparent. In fact, he thought that the Americans were assisting the Allies as much as they possibly could do without becoming involved in the actual struggle. The women were making clothing and other articles for the Belgians, and these were being sent to Europe for distribution. Lady Mawson did not accompany her husband to Adelaide on Wednesday, but she will arrive in the course of a few days.
