IMPRESSIVE FUNERALS.

Tribute to the late Dr. Barlow.

The remains of the late Dr. Barlow, C.M.G. (Vice-Chancellor of the University of Adelaide) were laid to rest in the North Road Cemetery on Wednesday. The funeral indicated in striking manner the widespread esteem in which the deceased was beld. There was a profusion of florel tributes, and the cortege which journeyed to the graveside was long. The procession left Dr. Barlow's late residence, Lefevre terrace, North Adelnide, at half-past two in the afternoon. The chief monraers were Messes. J. R. Baker, T. O'Halloran Giles (members of the firm of Baker and Barlow, in which the late Dr. Barlow was once a member, in partnership with the late Sir R. C. Baker), and Mr. C. Horrocks, who for many years had been accountant with the firm. In the second coach were the members of his household staff. His Excellency the Governor was represented by Mir. B. S. Connor, Hon. A.D.C., and the Chancellor (Sir Samuel Way) followed in his curriage. The members of the council, the staff, and the senate of the University and the undergraduates in academic robes formed in procession at the house and walked in double file to Christ Church, North Adelaide. Later they led the cortege upon the last stage of the journey from the church into the cemetery. They were headed by the Warden of the Senate (Mr. F. Chapple, C.M.G.) and Professor Stirling, C.M.G.
