the front and fighting for the Empire. Four members of the University staff have gone to help. First there is Professor Watson. I think he is a major, but he might well be a field-marshal. (Applause.) Then there is that brilliant young surgeon, of whom we are all proud, Major Dr. Newland. Another brilliant graduate and teacher of this University is Captain Dr. Cavanagh-Mainwaring, and I must also mention Major Dr. T. G. Wilson, who is on the staff of the Adelaide Hospital, and one of the lecturers for the University. The graduates are 42 in number, nearly all of whom have studied at our University. A few of them have done us the honor to accept ad eundem degrees. There are 36 students at the front. The list I have here is, I know, not complete, but it is as complete as we could make it. The careers of these men, their self-sacrifice, and patriotism will be sacred memories to us all. (Applause.) The list includes 16 students in arts. Professor Darnley Naylor must be indeed gratified to note that the study of the classics is not destructive of either courage or patriotism. (Applause.) There are four students in science, four in engineering, and four in law. I wish there were 16 in law, but I daresay there will be before it is all over. I would like to see law topping the list. In medicine there are five, and on the commercial side three. That makes 82 members of the staff, graduates, and students who have gone to the front to fight for their country. (Applause.) The list includes five Rhodes scholars. One notes with pleasure the name of Mr. Walter Rupert Reynell. If it came to a fight with the bayonet I should feel sorry for the German in front of Mr. Reynell. (Applause.) Then there is Captain H. K. Fry, Lieutenant Cecil Madigan (whom I have already mentioned), Lieutenant-Surgeon E. Britten Jones, and Mr. Alan W. Morey (who was appointed Rhodes scholar before his graduation). I congratulate Mr. Talbot Smith, M.A., who is doing valuable, although unobtrusive work for this University. He bears an honored name, for his father, Sir Edwin Smith, is one of the grand old men of South Australia." (Applause.) I think if I were in Mr. Talbot Smith's place, even better than being a son of Sir Edwin, I should be proud to have two sons who are risking their lives at the front for their country." (Applause.)

He adds—"I may say that we have taken every means of obtaining the names of those who enlist, but it is very seldom that the men themselves communicate with us. For months I have had notices at the University asking that all enrolments should be reported, and that anyone who was aware of graduates or students enlisting would be good enough to let me have their names."

THE JOHN LORENZO YOUNG
SCHOLARSHIP FUND.

From E. S. Hughes, Hon. Secretary:—
“It is very gratifying to the committee of the above, and to the old scholars generally, of the late Adelaide Educational Institution, which many years ago was conducted with such great success by the late Mr. J. L. Young, to know, by the announcement in The Register, that the late Mr. J. H. Finlayson has so generously assisted the movement to perpetuate the memory of one who has done so much in educational interests, and has bequeathed £200 towards the fund, which will bring the total amount contributed to approximately £630. At a meeting of the scholarship committee a few days ago (prior to the late Mr. Finlayson's bequest being known), and attended by Dr. J. C. Verco, Messrs. W. Herbert Phillipps, F. G. Scammell, and the Treasurers (Messrs. F. W. Bullock and J. T. Fitch), and the Hon. Secretary (Mr. E. S. Hughes), it was resolved at once to confer with the University authorities to arrange definitely for the establishment of the proposed scholarship, and it was reported at the meeting that one old scholar had offered to give £100 to the fund conditionally upon three others doing the same. It is hoped that this offer will be taken up, so that the fund may reach £1,000 at least. Several subscribers have intimated their willingness to double their donations. It is therefore expected that the efforts of the committee to establish a scholarship worthy of competition will be accomplished.”
