

PROFESSOR DAVID ILL

Book on Geology Delayed (SPECIAL TO "THE MAIL")

First South Australian Scholar

Forty-seven years ago the University of Adelaide selected the first holder of what was known for many years as the Souta Australian Scholarship. The choice fell upon Thomas Hudson Beare, a young man of 20, who proceeded to University College, London, where he distinguished himself by winning the Gilchrist Engineering Scholarship and the B.Sc. degree in pure science.

For 12 years from 1889 Beare was Professor of Engineering at University Col-

Adelaide, on June 30, 1859, and his father out from England in the first ship that brought settlers to South Australia. That vessel was the Duke of York, which dropped anchor in the vicinity of Kingscote, Kangaroo Island, in July, 1836.

The pioneer Beare lost his first wife during his short stay at Kingscote. He was the father of the professor by his second marriage, and died at Myponga on November 7, 1861, aged 63, when the proiessor was in his third year. Fifty-three years after his death the celebrated son visited his native land as one of the British Science Association delegates, He went down to Myponga, a township in the south, where his father was buried. expecting to see his grave, but there was no tombstone, and he failed to discover the old pioneer's last resting place.
