My dear Frank,

I have decided to add a short paragraph on page 7, and enclose you the whole page retyped. In its new form it was effective enough to convert George Barnard from his doubts, and he recognized for himself the equivalence of the criticism I make in this case with that which I made of his now abandoned tests of the 2x2 table.

On a wider scale, I take it to be an intrinsic part of the meaning of the word 'probability' when applied to any particular case that it refers to the smallest recognizable sub-set of cases to which the case in question refers. As you know, I have been stressing this partly forgotten aspect of the meaning which the word 'probability' must have to all who use it in practice.

I am anxious to get your reaction as I ought soon to be sending it on for publication.
