My dear Chester,

Thanks for your letter of August 30th. Many thanks for sending me the cutting on my talk at the C.A.E.S. I have written the lecture out now a little more orderly than I could deliver it, and with more complete information ⁱⁿ and detail, and am sending it off, probably today, to Baitsell. If I am to get offprints I shall have to pay for them in dollars, and the same difficulty has arisen in respect to a paper of mine in the American Naturalist.
