My dear Henry,

Many thanks for your letter which I am particularly glad to have in view of the visit you have arranged to Cambridge. I am sure it will be invaluable for you to have a good talk with Taylor and Race about it. I think Taylor is rather liable to be discouraged by initial difficulties and had begun to feel that the Radcliffe work was not going well.

It is particularly good to hear that the samples are coming in from expectant mothers, and it will be important for you to talk over the procedure of relating these with material some months later from their infants.

It is so good of you to look after the lantern-slide for me; it will just make it possible to put across a practical method which I think will be found useful in a good deal of genetic work.

I expect to be going away after primroses soon after the Genetical meeting on the 1st. I wonder whether you would find it convenient or possible to spend a week-end with me, say 27-29th March
