My dear Henry,

I was glad to see the outcome of all the work you have been putting into the question of genetic notation in serology. It is really a development, is it not, of the proposals you made earlier in respect of Landsteiner's <u>OAE</u> and Landsteiner and Levine's <u>M</u> and <u>M</u>. I see you have retained <u>G</u> for the former and <u>L</u> for the Sanger sorum, with <u>AM</u> for Landsteiner and Levine's <u>M</u> and <u>M</u>.

You have made it all splendidly logical, but at the expense of smoothing off many of the peculiarities of notation which are, in fact, aids to memory. In fact while I believe that you have given a foretaste of an efficient notation for the future, I doubt whether any rapid change is either to be desired or anticipated. In the meanwhile, however, good luck to your efforts.
