My dear Gray,

Many thanks for your note. I shall be bothering you a good deal, I'm afraid, getting a beginning fixed up this summer. I was Cathenide yesterday, but he knows nothing of any land or buildings which my Department can claim. He felt it possible that I should be allowed to erect an animal-house and field-laboratory on the Rockefeller field, which would be handy for gas, water, etc., also that I could borrow a lot of a few sleds for immediate use in the neighbourhood. I did not particularly discuss dog-pens with him but I suppose they also might be obtained at or near the same site. He suggested I could keep experimental dogs in your laboratory at Cambridge, but I think this would not be too good for either of us, and even the mice I should rather have in a field laboratory.

With an effort I can be in Cambridge from about 11 to half past 3, so will you make me a date next week so that I can take up at once any suggestions which you may think sensible.
