My dear Leopold,

Further to my letter of 13th November, I should like to reiterate my suggestion that whether a highly mechanized computational service is employed or not, we should provide ourselves with means of ready access to the results of our enquiry in the utmost detail.

I am sure that this can be done by having about 5000 cards, which, if made for our purpose, would have 20 holes punched near each of two opposite edges, and marked as '+' or '-' with anti-A, anti-B, anti-D, anti-M, etc.

On the other hand it might be preferable to use the cards supplied by a commercial firm by the name of Copeland Chatterson, of which the London address is Gateway House, Watling Street, London, E.C.4, who probably have some patent rights in respect of the use of their methods, though this may not be valid in Belgium; so that the use of this established firm would perhaps save some legal anxiety, and possibly the expense of consultation.
