Dear Mr Roberts,

An appointment which would only appeal to a limited class of men, and for which only an equally limited class would be suitable, will probably be soon made by the Eugenics Society, which has received recently a substantial legacy.

We propose to appoint a Secretary (male) who shall supersede and take control of, two ladies, who do not get on ^{very well} with each other, or make a very good use of their combined time, and who may ultimately be judged to be superfluous. We could spend annually about £400 rising to £600 by increments like a university appointment.

If we could find him, it would be very desirable to appoint a man of sufficient intelligence to make himself familiar at least with all that is known on a rather intricate subject; and who would think it worth while for its own sake to make himself such an authority. He should be able to understand statistical and genetical arguments.

I do not suppose we shall find the ideal man at all, but

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you might have someone to suggest.
