My dear Salisbury,

I was delighted to see from your letter that what I had been doing with the frequency classes for seed weights had not been a mere nuisance to you; but rather, as I had hoped, of some help. I have been reading on, bit by bit, but rather slowly, for I am constantly astonished by the quantity of data you have collected, and like to take my time to think of its relevance to the very diverse points you take up in succession for discussion.
