My dear Tedin,

Many thanks for your letter. I am glad you think that there is nothing to stop the simultaneous examination of the data here and at Landskrona. There is of course no question, if separate publication seems desirable, of our publishing before you, and as I said, whether or not your name were included in our paper, you would also publish separately the work initiated by yourself.

You mention 270 F₂ families, and of these several will be segregations. Consequently there should be about 500 or 600 separate series of height, since three separate series will be wanted in the segregating families. We should in any case calculate the means and variances, and these might be a useful check on your work, (and also on the accuracy of our copy). I expect also to try to examine certain statistics of the 3rd. degree, of which there is at present no proper theory, but which I am convinced may ultimately provide a key to questions involving dominance

in quantitative characters.

If you could send copies in batches as they are done, we could start right away with the primary calculations. I am glad the new "n" seems to clear up the discrepancy you found.
