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# MANY CHANGES

"A two year Associate Dimploma in Farming starting in 1976-78trienniumwill enable farmers to come to Roseworthy at times when they are not needed on their farms for peak seasonal operations, such as cropping, shearing and harvesting; to learn things they need to know to be successful farmers, and presented in a way which encourages them to act as individuals seeking out information and making best use of it." Dr. D.B. Williams, Director of the Roseworthy Agricultural College said when presenting his report at the 1975 Graduation Day.

He said,"since March 14, 1974 when the Roseworthy Agricultural College Act 1973 was proclaimed there have been many changes. From 1975, Oenology will be a year course separate from the Diplomas of Agriculture. In addition the associate Diploma in Wine Production and Marketing stated in 1975. A two year course, with subjects in Viticulture, Wine making, Wine Quality and Evaluation, Wine Marketing, Business Psychology and Production Management."

Dr Williams acknowledged the guidance in these changes from the representatives of the Wine industry and especially the South Australian Branch of the Wine and Brandy Producers Association.

Plans for introduction of a 3 year Diploma of Resource Managementare to be submitted to the Board of Advanced Education and the Australian Commission on advanced Education for approval. It will provide training in technology for those seeking careers in management of native flora and fauna as well as the management of introduced species in Australian ecosystems. It is planned to start in 1976, be post secondary, and at a comparable standard to our Diploma in agriculture.

The College Council has resolved that Roseworthy should establish an Agricultural Museum to include machinery and equipment used on farms in past days. Dr. Williams said further progress depends on getting funds to appoint a professionally trained historian to provide the necessary guidance and leadership for this task.

June 1975

In 1974 we had 164 Students and in 1975 we have enrolled 245, Dr. Williams said by increasing student numbers we are meeting a growing demand and making better use of our scarce and costly teaching facilities. The extra 80 represents almost 50% increase in student numbers consisting of 18 in Oenology I; 20 in the Associate Diploma in Wine Production and Marketing and on additional 40 students in the RDA Course. We have also granted 9 deferrals. In 1975, all new students have completed secondary School, or have been accepted as adult entrants.



Accommodation fees for 1975 have been set at \$800 and to keep residential costs at levels corresponding to these fees restraint will need to be exercised.

In 1974 supplementary examinations were abandoned with the introduction of the "Year Pass" which enables a student to gain a year pass for subjects failed provided there is sufficient surplus of marks in those Page 8 R.O.C.A. DIGEST June 1975 subjects passed to offset the deficit of marks in failed subjects.

In 1974 ten young ladies enrolled in 1 year RDA this has been boosted by 12 ladies in 1975 RDAI. In 1974 with staff and staff wives the ladies entered the Mid North Womens Hockey Association and won the 1974 Grand Final in their first year in the association.

Dr. Williams, "said the essence of our purpose is to teach information and attitudes in such a way that Diplomates learn to think and act for themselves, based on the knowledge imparted to them, and to know how, and when, to seek additional information and to interpret it."

## AGRICULTURAL COMMUNITY

The Minister of Education, Mr. Hudson was invited to present the Diplomas and prizes at the Roseworthy Agricultural College Graduation Day on February 25th 1975.

In his address he announced that Mrs. Lydia Crawford has recently approached the College and offered to establish a substantial fund to commemmorate the work of Walter and Carew Reynell. Mrs. Crawford is a direct descendant of Walter Reynell one of the pioneers of the wine industry at McLaren Vale, whose family estiblished the first Cellar in Australia. Carew Reynell, Mrs. Crawford's father, was killed at Gallipoli.

Mr. Hudson said "the Walter and Carew Reynell Fellowship is to provide for a person with international standing and authority in the wine industry to visit Roseworthy for a period, to become familiar with the Australian wine industry and to contribute to activities at Roseworthy. Initially the Fellows will be international visitors".

The Rudi Buring Award, endowed by the late Mrs. H.S. Buring for a Scholarship for post-diploma studies in Oenology, Viticulture on the Wine Industry Business and Economics is awarded every five years. Mr.Hudson announced this years winner as Mr. Phillip Shaw, who gained a Roseworthy Diploma of Oenology in 1969. He will use the scholarship for four months, studying various harvesting techniques and grape handling methods of Wineries in San Joaquin Valley of California.

Councils decision to modify the terms of the John Ridley Memorial Scholarship was explained by Mr. Hudson. He siad since it was established in 1915 it enabled Diplomates of Roseworthy to enrol at the Faculty of Agricultural Science at the University of Adelaide but not many Diplomates choose this course and so the award will now be presented to a diplomate in Agriculture who proceeds to the Roseworthy Diploma of Agricultural Technology Course. An account of academic record, financial need and contribution to the life of the College will be taken into account for the award of \$600.

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Mr. Hudson said the Board of Advanced Education and the Commonwealth Commission on advanced Education have statutory responsibility for determining priorities in development in the advanced education sector at State and Federal levels. The more we as a community think through our own priorities the better will be the cases presented to the Board and the commission and the more we will be able to ensure the future development of the Colleges in the way we as a community would wish. Mr. Hudson went on to say that the plans the Director has outlined for further development at Roseworthy are geared very closely to the needs of the South Australian Agricultural Community, and offer an example of the thought that Colleges, such as Roseworthy, need to be putting into their own futures.

## COLLEGE ROUNDUP REG HUTCHINSON

On Graduation Day, the Minister of Education Mr. Hudson presented diplomas to 21 RDA graduates and 15 RDAT graduates. Dick Wilson Dux of the RDAT Course made history by being the first student to win for the second time the Gramp, Hardy, Smith Memorial Prize for manliness, leadership, sportsmandship, and scholarship. Gold medalist in Third year was Greg Sheehy and the R.O.C.A. award for second position went to Scott Sandeman. The new R.O.C.A. sports award was presented to Warwick Shipway.

Mr. R.I. Herriot returned to the College for the first time in two years to officially open the new Library Block, situated on the corner where the pre-fab Judo hut used to be.

There has been a substantial increase in staff numbers as indicated by the numerous advertisements recently. With over 12 vacancies yet to fill, staff numbers presently stand at 30 Academic and 80 Ancilliary.

Gabe McGahn retired last year due to ill health after 28 years at the College. The relatively new Vet, Phil Hentschke resigned to take up practice at Kapunda. He is replaced by Phill Stott who has had practices at Victor Harbour and on Kangaroo Island. Staff at the winery have been increased, with the addition of a Winemaker, Richard Warland (R.D.O. 1971) and Dr. Roger Harlow as lecturer in Bio chemistry.

Derek Sutcliffe has been transferred to the instructional side of Agricultural Engineering and a Maintenance Officer, Charles Goodchild, has been employed to supervise Workshops and building maintenance.

The emphasis on practical work has changed. Each student now spends one third of First year and one sixth of Second year on outside work with equivalent time on practicals and demonstrations. The outside sections have been put under the charge of Senior Lecturers " to facilitate the closest possible links between teaching activities in the classroom, laboratory and field". To also serve this end, Reg Hutchinson has been transferred from Farm Manager to assisting Ken Leske in Farm Management and the Assistant Director in practical work allocation; while the Farm is now managed by Agronomy Lecturer Hugh Reimers(subsequently promoted to Senior Lecturer) assisted by an instructor Robert Groom a Longerenong Graduate. (Incidentally the Farm is now called the Agronomy Section).

The Intercollegiate Sports held at Hawkesbury last year resulted in second position in Tennis and third in Basketball for R.A.C. Roseworthy will be host to Intercol in early September 1975.

1974/75 was another successful seasons for the College. Barley averaged 2.8 Tonnes per hectare (or 17 bags per acre) to yield 650 Tonnes. Top yield was 3.6 T/Ha (21 bags) and nearly 140 Tonnes of malting grade barley were delivered. Wheat averaged 2.4T/Ha (12 bags) to yield 400 Tonnes. The new wheat varieties Condor and Kite yielded well, producing 2.6 T/Ha (13 bags) and 3.2 T/Ha (16 bags) respectively. Peas were exceptionally good averaging 2.2 T/Ha (11 bags) to yield nearly 100 Tonnes. A successful yield from oilseed crops, Rape and Linseed (grown on a small area for demonstration purposes) was also experienced. However, this ought to viewed with caution having been a year with rainfall well above average during the growing season and future plantings of these crops will have to be watched under normal Roseworthy conditions.

Two Doreset Stud Rams were purchased from the Kenttish Downs Stud at Yankallila last November to try and improve the confirmation and type of the Dorets at RAL. Elsinora Lustres a Roan Poll Shorthorn Bull was purchased from the parent stud "Gundalin", Hay N.S.W. as a Stud replacement for Roseworthy Napoleon who was sold last year to Bill Nankaville. Last years shearing tallied 88 bales.

With student numbers increasing the resources of the vegetable garden are close to its limits for supply to the Kitchen the size of orders are now at the stage where Motorized transport is required. The Apricot block planting in 1952 has been taken over by the disease Gumosis and will soon be removed. In the line of new plantings, Peach; Apricot; Apples; Pears have been planted where the home Grenache vine and variety vineyard used to be. The winery has been remodelled and expanded over the last 4 years and this vintage received 160 tonnes from Loxton; Renmark; Clare; Nunootpa besides RAC.

The majority of students have recently visited the nearby Angle Vale Vineyards managed by Don Rice (R.D.A. 1959) to inspect the operation of a mechanised grape harvester.

Ray Norton, now Farm Manager at the Waite Institute brought his class of students studying the S.A.I.T. Diploma in Valuation to visit the College and inspect the livestock sections as an introduction to rural valuation.

Following the success of joy flights over the College on Open Day, a day of flights over the College was arranged with Graham Treloar (R.D.A. 1956) of Rossair. This was to enable students and staff to engage in aerial observation of agricultural aspects not seen from the ground.

Greg Symes (RDAT 1973) visited the College in March. Greg with other RDAT 1973 graduates Bruce Sawyer and Roger Haensel worked in N.T. last year. Greg is now with Reid Irrigation (Iplex Plastics) on drip irrigation and the Company are sending him on a world trip this year including London and the Middle - East. One of his tasks will be to relieve another Roseworthy graduate Phil Smith at Abudabi while Phil returns to Australia for the conference on Drip Irrigation at Tanunda later this year.

Bruce Sawyer is still in N.T. while Roger Haensel is now in Broken Hill working on parasite in cattle.

Ashley Barnes RDAT 1972 and Graeme Rady RDA 1970 called recently after spending two years in New Guinea. They have toured S.E. Asia on their way home for holidays. Ian Pickett RDAT 1971 has left the Department of Agriculture and has joined the department of Further Education.
