The practice of singing a victim to death and other remarkable customs of Northern Kimberley, blacks were described by Dr. A. Capell, who is at pre-sent engaged in anthropological in-vestigations in this area.

Dr. Capell said that the North Kimberley native believed that when a person died, he ceased, strictly speak-ing, to be a person at all. This was accompanied by the belief that a per-son could not become incarnate a second time. However, in the western tribes, reincarnaion was accepted as possible.

A being whom the natives called "Wolaro" was the leading mythological character of the Northern Kimberley native, Mr. Capel continued. Wolaro was the creator of heaven and earth and all that was in them. They believed that Wolaro told them to do certain things and that, while they did those things, they did so as his representatives.
